Owl Mat Team Has Fine Season Mark

The Oregon Tech Owl wrestlers wrapped the 1963 collegiate season up this past weekend by participating in the Oregon Collegiate Conference Tournament held at Monmouth.

Milo Crumrine, Klamath Falls, captured the 115-pound crown and Ver Miller, a Burns product, the 167-pound championship. Four Owls were runners-up, these being: Dennis Sather at 133, Hank Lambart at 137, John Norton at 157, and Ed Appleman at 191. Ken Kimear was the only guest from the Mile High Campus not making the finals.

Teamwise the Owls finished third behind Portland State and Southern Oregon. Tournament results were: Portland State 100 points, Southern Oregon 37 points, Oregon Technical Institute 56 points, Eastern Oregon 33 points, and Oregon College 22 points.

The Tech duel season was very satisfactorily completed with wins against Southern Oregon (16-13), OCE (24-8), Lewis and Clark (24-10), and Pacific University (23-10). The victories the past week completed a nine win, one loss season. The only loss was to Portland State who has impressive wins over some very fine teams.

The outstanding series, without a doubt, was that with Southern Oregon which found the Owls winning two close ones.

Milo Crumrine finished the season undefeated with only a draw with Portland State's Bob Wong to mar his record. Crumrine defeated Wong for the conference championship last week. Dennis Sather and Ed Appleman finished the duel season undefeated but were on the short end of the score in the tournament finals.

Before the Owl grapplers stow their gear for the year they have the following items on the agenda: First, the banquet honoring Oregon Tech wrestling and basketball teams is Tuesday at 6:30. Trophies will be presented to the team captain, the outstanding wrestler, and the most inspirational wrestler. 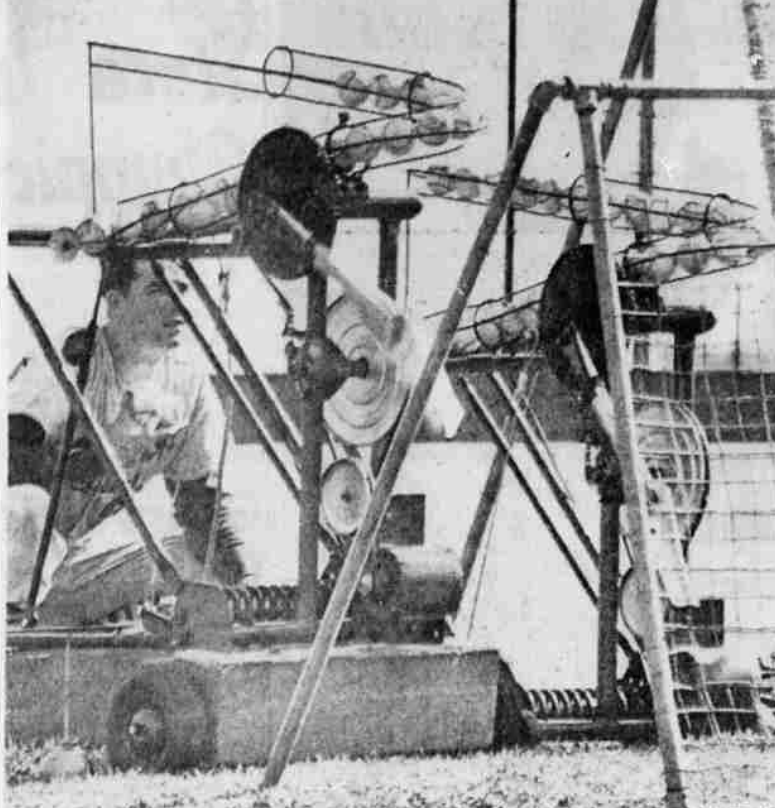

The Huskies have an 11-2 league record while Chiloquin is 12-1. The Huskies have a game remaining on it and the Huskies actually won the game with a good second period of 20 points to only 11 for the Grizzlies. The Huskies went to half time leading by 29-23. Duke Tips N.C. Five Handily

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI)—The Duke Blue Devils, with forward Art Heyman collecting a career-high total of 40 points, completed their uninterrupted victory march through the Atlantic Coast Conference Saturday with a 106-92 triumph over the University of North Carolina here.

All-America Heyman played his last home game for Duke and turned in a brilliant performance to the delight of a capacity crowd of 9,000 fans who gave him a three-minute standing ovation when he left the game with 22 seconds left to play.

The curtain closer brought Duke's ACC win record to 14 without a loss this season and gave the nation's 2nd ranked team a 21-2 overall record. North Carolina finished regular season play with a 10-4 conference sheet and 14-5 in all games.

Heyman's performance overshadowed outstanding games by players on both squads. Jeff Mullins, Duke's other forward, collected 22 points although it was not known until Saturday morning if he would be able to play because of a pulled muscle.

Bill Cunningham, second only to Heyman in conference scoring, collected 31 points and his teammate Larry Brown collected 27 points.
