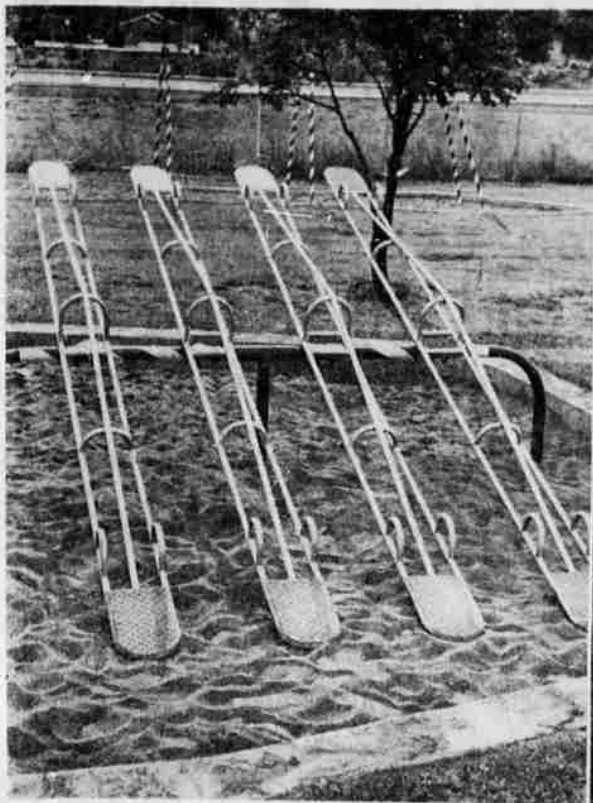

concrete boat ramp was installed at the marina site and in August a 14 by 24 foot addition to the ramp was poured.

The banks at the marina were back sloped in August in preparation for rip-rapping which was completed in September to prevent further bank erosion.

Other work accomplished at the park included tree planting at the bird sanctuary and nature trail and a \$2,386 road resurfacing project at the park entrance.

A total of \$610 was collected from admission charged at the ice rink this winter. The money will be added to a fund that was established by Council Resolution 1159 for improvements at the ice rink.

A cost account system was established in July so the exact cost of labor and materials for each maintenance or development project could be determined. The cost of recreation programs, administration, zoo operation, and equipment and vehicle replacement and maintenance can also be determined through the use of the account system.

"Aside from this past year's accomplishments, the five-year plan has given the department a good foundation for planned and orderly development in the future," Woodring said.

Many Youngsters Enjoy YMCA Camping Program

one adult leader returned to the wilderness area this winter on Jan. 28 for a two-day winter camping trip. The boys enjoyed the new and rugged experience of living in the harsher elements and endured the 15 and 29 degree temperatures well.

Continual expansion of the trail trip program each year is planned to keep up with the enthusiastic demands of teen-age outdoorsmen.

Two trail trips this summer are tentatively scheduled for Aug. 2 to 4 and 9 to 11 with the destinations to be determined by the campers.

On Labor Day weekend the annual "Y" family camp was held at Camp McLoughlin at Lake of the Woods. Meals were prepared at the camp giving mom a brief respite from her usual chores. McLoughlin is a scout camp and all its facilities, including boats, were used. This summer the outing will be held at Diamond Lake.

The "Y" sponsored six fun club outings last year to various points of educational and scenic interest. These fun trips are one-day excursions limited to 14 boys (per outing) between 9 and 13 years old.

Last summer boys went to Collier Park, Denton Park, Jacksonville, the Lava Beds, Camp Toton, and the Cable Corral on the J. S. Flagg Ranch. At Camp Toton fishing was the order of the day in Denny Creek and horseback riding was the main activity at the Cable Corral.

A fee of \$6.50 was charged for participation in five outings and \$2.75 paid for two sessions. Fees have not been determined for the trips slated this summer.

The YMCA hopes that the fees charged for camping activities will not prevent any boy from enjoying a summer of fun in the woods and to make sure the staff set up a program which enables both members and non-members alike to earn all or part of the camp fees.

The "Y" provides boxes of taffee peanuts for the boys to sell before the camping sessions begin. Boys may register and pick up their peanuts at the YMCA office. The "Y" will announce when the peanut sale will begin at a later date.

The "Y" camps and trips are primarily staffed with volunteer help; fathers, teachers and civic minded residents of Klamath Falls who are interested in seeing that boys get out in the woods to enjoy themselves during the time-laden summer months.

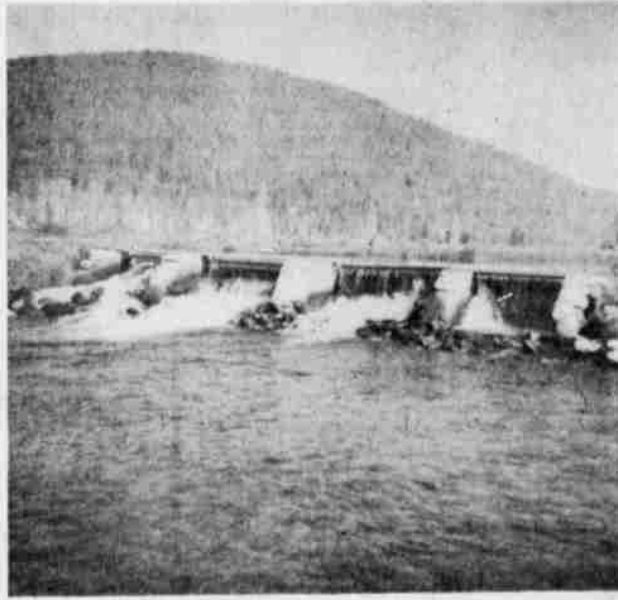
