

In The Legislature

Tax proposals continue to be studied in the House Taxation Committee. One of the latest is H.B. 1332, introduced by Representative Joe Rogers of Polk County.

If his plan is adopted by the legislature and approved by the governor, a special election will be called to submit the measure to the voters. It will consist of two distinct portions:

1. The voter will first have the opportunity to decide whether or not he wishes to change the present tax structure.

2. Regardless of how he votes on the first part, he will have a second choice of deciding on which of two new tax measures he would prefer—if his taxes are to be raised!

Assuming the voters decide to change our existing tax structure this change under the Rogers proposal would take one of two routes:

1. The first will be Rogers' sales tax plan which calls for a general sales tax of three per cent on all sales of tangible property and changes for transient lodging, with exemptions to include seed, feed, insecticides, fertilizer and drugs; reduction of personal income tax rates and increase in amount of personal exemptions; and distribution of sales tax proceeds in a manner designed to provide property tax relief.

2. The other alternative would be the adoption of the governor's so-called "net receipts" income tax plan.

The final details of Rogers' sales tax proposal remain to be worked out in the taxation committee. According to Rogers, he chose not to spell out the complete details of his plan until

such time as the taxation committee expresses a desire to use his method. There is considerable evidence on hand at this time which indicates that the taxation committee is more inclined towards the income tax revision route, so it would appear that the Rogers proposal is destined to remain dormant—unless the voters throughout the state decide to put on an intensive mail campaign in favor of a sales tax.

Tax Feeling Told House

SALEM (UPI)—The people would be more likely to support tax increases if they were paralleled by substantial increases in state school support, the House Education Committee was told Monday.

A stream of witnesses urged increases above the \$130 per census child recommended by the governor. The current sum contributed by the state is based on an appropriation of \$120 per census child.

The present state contribution now amounts to about 34 per cent of school costs. The rest is paid by property taxpayers.

Lou Norris of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation said he would like to see the amount raised to 70 per cent. He said farmers would support new taxes to support such an increase, if a corresponding limit was put on property taxes.

Francis Smith, member of the State Board of Education for 12 years, said Oregon's present vocational-technical training programs are inadequate. He said they could be expanded in existing community colleges.

At another hearing, the State Department of Education began defending its budget and community college program before a Ways and Means subcommittee.

Red Cross Declines Fund Drive

There will be no Red Cross campaign for Klamath County in 1963 within Klamath County, according to Dr. George R. Nicholson, chairman of the local chapter.

"Our chapter raises its funds jointly with the United Fund campaign each fall," Dr. Nicholson said. "The entire Klamath County budget for the Red Cross is included in the United Fund goal, and we believe that the goal of one-campaign for major health and welfare agencies represents the wish of this community. We are encouraged by the increase in the amount obtained this year over the past two years and feel that the efforts of fund drive workers would be impeded in future campaigns if the Red Cross conducted a March campaign this year at a time when community effort is centered on other fund raising projects. It will be necessary to make budget adjustments for us to operate within the 93 per cent of goal attained, as our original budget represented our basic needs; however we have faith in the future of the one-campaign effort in Klamath County and wish to lend it our support."
