Henley's Gooding Wins Scoring Crown

Henley's Kent Gooding, the 6-7 giant senior, walked away with the 1962-63 season despite having missed one of the Hornets' 14 games, when he tallied 313 points in 13 games for a brilliant 24.5 average to lead the Hornets to the league crown.

The Hornets now sport a 29-0 record for the season and rank as the state's top Class A-2 team. Their next action will be in the playoff tournament with the second place Rogue League team and the top two teams from the Umpqua League. Eagle Point and Illinois Valley will have to play for the second place spot at a site and date yet undetermined.

The winner of this playoff tournament goes to the state tournament.

Gooding far outdistanced the rest of the field in scoring despite the league having one of its better years, scoring-wise. Eagle Point's Charles Pomeroy, who pushed Gooding most of the season, finished with 264 points and an 18.9 average. Then came Illinois Valley's Darrell Gellert with 241 points, Dan Leahy of Lakeview with 238 points, Lakeview's Larry Samples with 234 points and Mike Beymer of Henley in sixth with 205 points.

NEW YORK (UPI)—It's just a suggestion, but perhaps track meet promoters should ask muscle man Gary Gubner to send them his towel.

At least it was Gubner's towel that was responsible, he says, for the outstanding performance in Friday night's New York K. of C. meet—a 64 feet, 6 1/2 inches meet record in the shot put.

"My only competition was the towel," explained the 20-year-old 272-pounder from NYU. "There was no one in the field to beat me, so I set the towel out there at 64 feet, 6 inches and tried to beat that. I aimed at it as a target."

Gubner practically kerplunked his target with his last throw of the night, and that gave him a meet record even if it still left him looking for history's first indoor 65-footer.

Gubner's coach says he's met that 65-footer when he "gets mad at somebody or at himself." But the New York strong boy figures he'll do only about 62 feet in next Saturday's NCAA meet in the Garden because for that one they switch from the indoor leather-covered shot to the outdoor iron ball.

"I haven't worked out much with the iron ball, and I won't be used to it," he explained.

There were only two other meet records Friday night, both in relays, and pre-meet predictions there would be no world records held up. Those forecasts probably also helped hold down the crowd to 10,746, more than 5,000 under the capacity sellout that the Garden meets usually draw.

The relay meet records were set by Fordham in the two-mile relay with 7:33.6 and by Morgan State in the one-mile relay in 1:17.8.
