

SALEM (UPI) — A mutually acceptable plan for summarily halting "flagrant" air and water pollution was requested today from the State Sanitary Authority and industry.

The Senate Committee on Local Government asked the state anti-pollution agency and the industries it regulates to report back March 12.

The request came as the SSA presented its case for SB239, which would empower the agency to get a court injunction to halt pollution without going through court.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Joseph C. Swidler today denied the Federal Power Commission against charges of bias by Vice Chairman Howard Morgan, and accused him of damaging the reputation of the agency.

The House commerce investigating subcommittee began hearings on the Morgan charges earlier this week. It took testimony from Morgan for two days.

Morgan charged Thursday that because of "corrosive, malicious attacks" on his part of the subcommittee, the SSA and some members of the committee clashed on a section of the bill to let the agency inspect plants during operating hours without notice.

Swidler told a congressional committee that a letter written by Morgan to President Kennedy to say he did not want reappointment to the FPC was not intended to help the President but to embarrass him.

"This was not an honest letter," Swidler said.

In his letter, Morgan also strongly criticized some decisions of the commission as pro-industry.

Dixon Scott of the Daily Mirror described the Polaris subs at Holy Loch as "nine atomic-powered monsters capable of wiping out the world."

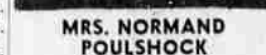
Scott said that during the cruise he saw U.S. sailors making popcorn, eating ice cream and drink-

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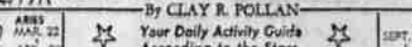
