AAUW Group Makes Report

The higher education study report with one exception and the executive committee recommendation on higher education was accepted by the legislative committee of the Oregon State Division, American Association of University Women.

The executive recommendation was that the Oregon State Division express to the legislature its interest in maintaining high standards for higher education in Oregon by (1) careful scrutiny for greatest efficiency in use of state funds; (2) adequate taxation, not increasing property taxes for quality education; (3) if there is not adequate financing for high standard education, that tuition be increased rather than quality decreased.

Jewelry Highlights

But the three worn together, in related but not necessarily matching designs, are the glamour trio of the season.

Softness is a word much used in spring jewelry fashion reports, and it applies principally to the new gold jewelry, whether it is real or costume. Tiny, delicate chains, looped many times over and often held by elaborate, beautiful clasps make necklaces that have the same feeling of softness as many of the new clothes. Fringe and mesh also star in the newest gold jewelry. Contrasting finishes, florentine with bright, give a look of airy dimension to many new pins, and tiny gold beads and fine gold wire are also used in pins and earrings to create a new, light, dimensional look. Color always scores for spring, and this season pink seems to have captured first place honors, with yellows, beiges and black - and white color combinations following close behind.

The precious look - which has been gaining in strength for several seasons - is still top jewelry news for spring. Wonderful new combinations of colors in stones and brilliants give a slight Oriental ease to many necklace clasps. Real or unreal is a hard mystery to solve with many of the newest pins, and gold bangle bracelets get the fashion nod, whether they are costume or carat variety.

At-home clothes have sparked a lot of jewelry expressly designed to give fun, color and glamour to these exciting new long shifts and slacks. Long, lovely, colorful earrings; swinging multi-colored ropes; lariats sporting easy, soft tassels; big, bold beautiful rings; bracelets to be worn above the elbow—all are designed to star at home.

Necklaces are longer—from 22 to 28 inches this season, the Institute reports - to lend the right accent and feeling to the overblouse and the skimmer shift.

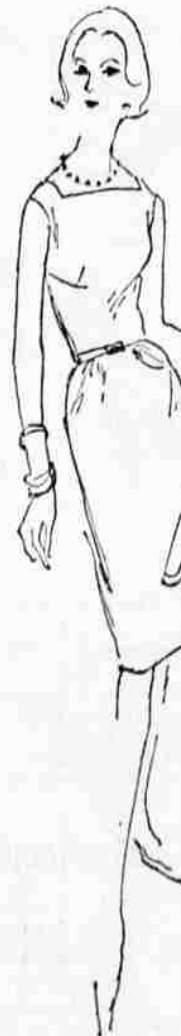
