High Country Aberdeen Angus Sale Bids Total \$28,945 For 53 Animals

One of the most successful High Country Aberdeen Angus show and sales was held Saturday, March 2, at the Klamath County Fairgrounds.

In all, 53 animals, 42 bulls and 11 females went on the block and brought a total of \$28,945 in bids.

Crop Insurance Plan Is Offered In Region

Klamath Basin potato and grain producers will be able to obtain Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance to guarantee their production costs, according to word from an FCIC representative.

Peyton R. Winn, district director for the USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, has been in the area recently with other agency officials. They have been reviewing crop history, weather data, quality grading and land productivity to determine amounts of possible insurance coverage and rate which can be offered on 1963 spring crops.

"Farmers in this area are above-average producers," said Winn, "and their production records certainly show this." Weather conditions last fall, however, emphasized the hazardous nature of farming, he added. The risks encountered daily from planting to harvest prompted local farmers to ask for an FCIC survey of the area for the purpose of obtaining its nationwide program for the Klamath Basin, said Winn. He stressed the fact that this all-risk coverage does not compete with private fire and hail underwriters, and will not interfere with farmers freedom to produce and market their crops.
