Compassion Day Marks Remembrance Of Needy

Rev. C. O. Tremain, pastor of the Free Methodist Church, 1918 Oregon Ave., has announced the observance of Compassion Sunday on March 10. On this day, the local church will join with the entire denomination to remember the needy peoples of the world.

During the past year, the Free Methodist Church sent emergency relief to victims of Typhoon Wanda, which swept through Hong Kong, and to flood and famine areas in Formosa and Africa. Milk, food, and clothing for the destitute is distributed through missionaries.

On Compassion Sunday the church will remember its 36 doctors and nurses at mission hospitals and dispensaries around the world with a special offering. This group of men and women, with their staffs, administered more than 400,000 treatments last year. Because the medical teams live on a minimum salary, and in some cases receive partial assistance from the governments and patients themselves, a medical treatment can be given for approximately 10 cents.

Rev. Tremain invites friends of the church to join with the members in observing the special day.

Shower Set For Couple

An active member of the church, Mrs. Colman has been a Sunday School teacher at First Baptist for many years and also serves as chairman of the flower committee.

All friends of the couple are invited to attend the shower, which was arranged by the church benevolence committee. Gifts of clothing, linens, bedding, kitchen utensils, and other essential household items will be welcomed.

Aid Offered To Smokers

A live-evening group therapy course, sponsored by the Klamath Falls Seventh-day Adventist Church, will be offered free of charge to members of the community who wish to quit smoking.

Starting March 17, the sessions will be conducted from 7:30 to 9 p.m. in the Green Room of the Winema Hotel.

The Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking consists of group therapy, lectures, films, and a daily personal control booklet, which is given to each participant to enable him to follow the plan while at work. The course is not a religious program.

Already held in many eastern cities of the United States, the plan features such topics as the psychological and physical aspects of the habit, how craving can be lessened, how will power can be strengthened, physical effects of smoking, organization of a buddy system, and other techniques designed to break the habit within a five-day period.

Under the direction of Elder Kenneth H. McVay, local minister, and Dr. Robert W. Graham, Klamath Falls physician, the course is given as a non-denominational community service.

NPC Baptists Host Evangelists

NEW PINE CREEK — A series of evangelistic meetings began March 3 at the New Pine Creek Baptist Church and will continue through Saturday, March 16. Evangelist Lester R. Noles of Bend is conducting the meetings which are held each evening at 7:30.

Lester Noles is regarded as a powerful, dynamic speaker who speaks with strong conviction from the Bible but interweaves his sermons with realistic humor, sufficiently sophisticated at times to capture the interest of all while conveying his message," said Rev. Gordon Harris, local minister.

Noles was converted to the Baptist faith in June, 1924, while living in Carroll County, Tenn. Soon afterward he began studying part-time at Bethel College at McKenzie, Tenn., where he remained for three years before moving to Little Rock, Ark. There he combined his studies at the Missionary Baptist Seminary with pastoral duties for two more years.

Upon completion of his work at the seminary, Noles was called to Southern California and was engaged in evangelistic work in various communities for five years. He later spent three years in Colorado but returned to Southern California.

In 1954 he accepted the position of minister at Victory Missionary Baptist Church in Walla Walla, Wash., and served there until October, 1961, when he came to the First Missionary Baptist Church at Bend, Ore.

Only A Bent Nail

LENTEN LIFELINES

This is the story of a man who used a bent nail to keep his sanity.

During the Nazi madness, many people suffered because of their faith, among them a Bishop of the Lutheran Church named Hans Lilje. Dr. Lilje discovered himself in a cell, devoid of every comfort, windowless except for a slit high on one wall. Not only were the prisoners stripped of their familiar possessions, but their jailers also tortured them with a kind of horror by attempting to confuse their sense of time. Dates, the days of the week and the identifying familiarity to time were blotted out. Monday was called Thursday and Tuesday became Saturday. Yet, when Sunday came, even when the jailers denied the day the Bishop would call out verses of Scripture and lead his fellow prisoners in singing some ancient chorale.

What the guards had overlooked in their tactics was simply a bent nail. The Bishop had used it to draw a circle on the dirt-covered floor. He had drawn a circle, divided into seven sections, and when a ray of morning light fought its fitful way through the little slit at the top of the wall, he moved his strange "sun dial" to a new day. It was a little thing; it was a method of defiance. More than this, it became a way by which these prisoners could hang on to a sense of dignity.

A cross, high and lifted up, may seem to be a very weak weapon with which to do battle with today's demonic forces. It is a lifeline of Lent that this same cross can help man to remember his true worth. We live in a time when the tactics of the enemy are to strip man of his meaning.

The added problem is that our own gadgets do the same. Our very success poses a threat. Suppose that our economy becomes
