Modoc Junior Livestock Show Scheduled June 5-7

ALTURAS—Robert Savage, 4-H adviser of Modoc County, announced this week that June 5-7 has been set for the 15th annual Junior Livestock Show to be held in Alturas.

Savage said the junior show, which is a coordinated effort of 4-H and FFA members and adult leaders, gives every indication of again taking a big leap in interest and stock as it has every year since its beginning.

In 1949 the show had 38 fat animals and no breeding stock. By 1959 there were 119 fat animals and 65 breeding animals. Last year the breeding animals made bid for supremacy, with 114 breeding animals being shown by the young stockmen, and 113 fat animals. The three-day show features judging of the breeding and fat animals on conformation; showmanship for the junior stockmen; two night horse shows; and the final evening of a barbecue and fat stock sale. Horses, swine, sheep and cattle will all be included in the show.

This year, Savage said, the show will kick off Wednesday afternoon, June 5, with halter classes and showmanship classes for the newly organized groups of horse projects in Modoc County 4-H.

The Senior Horse Show for boys and girls 13 and older will be Wednesday evening; breeding classes, Thursday; Junior Horse Show for 12 and under, Thursday evening; grading of fat stock and showmanship, Friday afternoon; and the barbecue and fat stock sale, Friday evening.

The Alturas Rotary Club will again sponsor and put on the beef barbecue and the sheriff's posse will sponsor the horse shows.

Savage emphasized that the "kids are the ones that put on the show with just assistance from the adults." The 4-H and FFA members handle all the clerking, the public address system, make stall assignments, and do the clean-up detail. This is accomplished through most of the young people have stock to show in various classes. The Girl Scouts will run the snack stand on the fairgrounds the three days of the show.

The governing boards of the show include a board of adults and a junior board of representatives of 4-H and FFA, and these coordinate the activities.

Woman Leaves Husband In Attempt To Reduce

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Mrs. Mary Ferguson, 36, is leaving her husband, not because she doesn't love him, but because she wants to get her weight down to 200 pounds.

The 244-pound woman said Thursday she will move into a hotel room to begin a two-week "medically approved" fast so she can fit into new clothes she wants for Easter.

"I just can't maintain a girlish figure at home," Mrs. Ferguson said. "My husband likes rich food. He's a slim man and a big eater and he never puts on weight. I can't stand not to eat when he does."

During the two weeks she will have no solid food, only coffee, tea, bouillon and vitamin pills. Her doctor, who asked not to be named, approved of the crash program. He said she would be under medical supervision all the time.

Mrs. Ferguson's husband, Arthur, 46, an advertising salesman, will remain at home. They have no children. They were married 13 years ago when she weighed only 115 pounds.

"He's dying to see me lose weight," she said, insisting she's not a compulsive eater. "It's just that I have no will power at home."

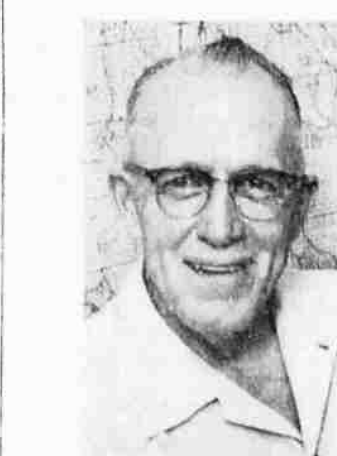
Her doctor said that Mrs. Ferguson should not experience any hunger after the first 48 hours of the fast.

Ordinarily, he said, such a fast should be carried out in a hospital. But he added that Mrs. Ferguson has fasted before without any ill effects and should be able to do it again.
