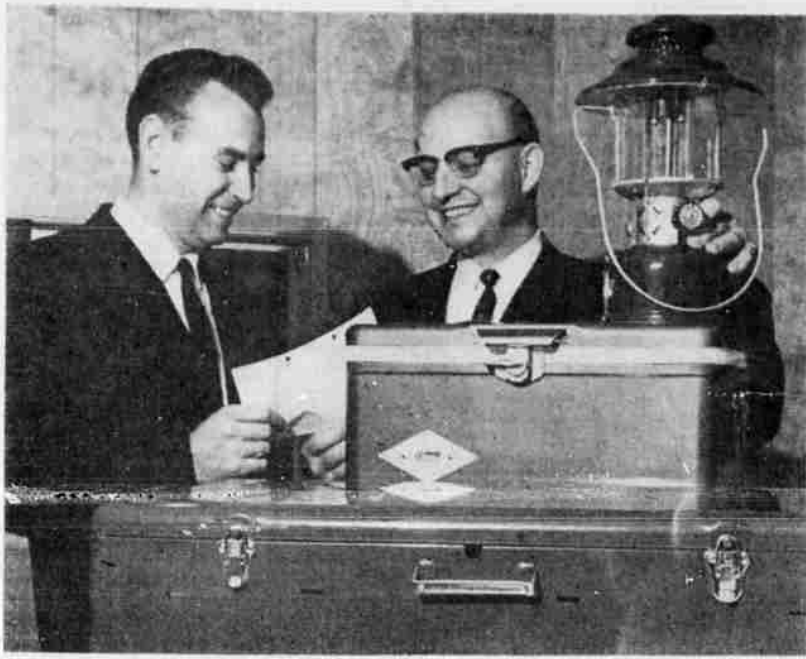

Veteran Information Officer To Retire At Weyerhaeuser

TACOMA—Retirement of Walter J. DeLong, veteran director of public information and advertising for Weyerhaeuser Company, was announced effective March 21.

DeLong is a veteran of both military service and the forest products industry. Raised in Newport, Wash., his first job was that of water boy for the Fidelity Lumber Company in 1911. He served with the American Expeditionary Forces during World War I. Returning to civilian life, he joined the Washington National Guard and worked for the Hill-

yard Lumber Company and other Spokane, Wash., firms.

DeLong's military career spans a period ranging from 1918 to 1947 and from private in World War I to brigadier general as Washington State Adjutant General during World War II. He attended the Army Service School, Ft. Benning, Ga., in 1925 and was ordered to active duty with the infantry in 1939 and detailed to the Command and General Staff School, Ft. Leavenworth, Kan.

During World War II he also served as Washington state director of selective service. He

was awarded the Legion of Merit for his World War II efforts.

Upon his release from active duty he joined Weyerhaeuser Company in Tacoma as director of public information. One of his many contributions was development of Weyerhaeuser Company's nationally-recognized wildlife advertisements. This campaign has been honored seven times, including three first place awards in the Saturday Review magazine's annual advertising awards.

Numerous personal commendations were also accorded DeLong on the eve of his retirement.

F. K. Weyerhaeuser, chairman of the company's board of directors, hailed him as a "loyal and competent Weyerhaeuser veteran and also as a man who has contributed enormously to good government in the Northwest." President Norton Clapp cited him for the many memorable and worthwhile contributions, not only to this company and to its success, but to the stature of the forest industry in the Northwest.

California Pair Open Victorian Restaurant

MOUNT SHASTA—A charming, early 1900 atmosphere, congenial hosts, and good food make up the Red House in Mount Shasta, far removed from the rip-roaring Log Cabin Saloon it was in former days.

The Log Cabin Saloon was owned and operated by Mike Clark and Jack Gingham, two colorful miners in the early days of California. They mined in the Redding, Keswick, and Deadfall areas. They had one claim of gold, silver, and copper on Mt. Eddy which assayed \$16 a ton on the old price of gold. The ore was quartz base ore and too expensive to work, so they gave it up and started their saloon. Mike and Jack were two well-liked Irishmen and they prospered, but the lure of gold was still in their veins. While being saloon keepers, they also had pack burros and would head for the hills occasionally to prospect.

After several years of operation the Log Cabin Saloon, which was located on Whisky Row, was moved south on Walnut Street and used as a residence by Mrs. Charles Klein, a retired cigar maker.

Many families lived in it in ensuing years until Bob Barry from the Bay Area and Ron Cook from Southern California spotted it and visualized a new type of eating place for Mount Shasta. Remodeling was no small job. They ran into 12 foot ceilings, which were retained, and three floors in the building. The 15 by 30 foot dining room was once a hall, living room, and two bedrooms. The old log siding has been recovered and painted a bright red.

The decor is Victorian with red carpeting, red velvet flock old fashioned wall paper, shutters, and a European crystal chandelier which retains 99 per cent of its originality, some of the crystal having been replaced due to breakage. It has been converted from gas to candle to electricity. The fireplace in the dining room reflects a quiet feeling and with soft music, all combine to make a delightful experience in dining.

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
