Teach Bridge To Teen-agers

Introduce your youngsters to the game of bridge as family entertainment on a winter's evening. If they take to the game, you'll have a built-in foursome ready for play whenever time permits.

Although bridge stimulates thought and concentration, mother also knows that a working knowledge of the game, like dancing, singing or piano playing, is a valuable social asset to a son or daughter.

I've known family foursomes who have been playing since the youngsters were 11 and 12. At least one expert, William Root, of the Association of American Playing Card Manufacturers, thinks 15 or 16 is the best age to teach.

I asked Root for some suggestions on how to proceed. His first suggestion: Get a good bridge rule book. His second: Don't overwhelm with rules at first. Take one step at a time.

I found his sequence of steps most interesting. They are based on his own teen-age classroom instruction. These steps will take about one hour.

1—Deal out four hands, face up. Go through motions of playing. Explain mechanics of play and "trump" and "trick."

2—Emphasize partnership qual-

- ity of game and teach 15-word vocabulary needed to exchange information: no - trump, spades, hearts, diamonds, clubs, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, double, redouble and pass.
 - 3—Explain rank of suits.
 - 4—Explain objectives of bidding: to determine trump suit and to decide on how high to bid.
 - 5—Write down and memorize point-count system of valuing a hand.
 - 6—Write down and memorize the minimum point requirements in the combined hands to bid games and slams. (Refresh your own memory, too, by referring to the bridge book.)
 - 7—Explain that any strong four-card, five-card or longer suit is biddable.
 - 8—Explain the opening bid.
 - 9—Explain bidding responses from other players.
 - 10—Touch on overcalls. Requirements to overcall depend on level of bidding.
- And now you're ready to play a few hands, answering questions as they arise.

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
