Curtain Washing

If summer breezes have left curtains dingy, follow easy ways of laundering them suggested by Mrs. Frances C. Hall, county extension agent.

Sheer curtains of man-made fabrics—nylon or dacron polyester—collect dust but do not absorb soil readily. Before laundering, tumble curtains in a cool dryer to whisk away dust and soil, or shake outside.

Curtains are then ready to wash in warm water, advises the home economist. Wash five minutes with a generous amount of all-purpose detergent. If curtains are badly soiled, stop the washer after two minutes and allow a 10-minute soak before completing the cycle.

A fabric softener added to the final rinse will help eliminate static.
