

Britons Stall On Common Mart Plans

LONDON (UPI) — Britain has decided to shelve indefinitely plans for any association with the European Common Market and is settling down for a long period of alternative policies, authoritative sources said today.

The decision follows extensive soundings with the "friendly" five members of the European community — Italy, West Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

Formal Line Doubtful

The soundings have shown that at present the chances for any formal association with the trade group — from which Britain was shut out by a French veto last Jan. 29 — are near zero.

No sign has reached Britain or other members of the community that France would facilitate co-operation of the community with Britain.

Britain, therefore, is dropping plans for any alternative alignment with the European community.

This does not mean that Britain is turning its back on Europe. It remains anxious to join but sees no prospect of doing so in any acceptable form for some time.

Agriculture Bypassed

Among various unacceptable ideas is one for some form of an industrial customs union between Britain and the Common Market, leaving aside the controversial agricultural issue.

French President Charles de Gaulle suggested associated British membership but even this has not been pushed lately by Paris. Britain will take no initiative toward the Common Market. Rather it will pursue the following alternative course:

—A progressive tightening of the British-led, seven-nation European Free Trade Association (EFTA).

—Systematic development of bilateral trade arrangements with the "friendly" five member nations of the Common Market.

—Efforts to expand trade on a global basis through progressive trade liberalization moves, especially through reciprocal tariff cuts by the Europeans and the United States.

Senate Supports House In Olympic Game Boost

SALEM (UPI)—The Senate Saturday suspended rules and gave immediate passage to a House memorial promoting Portland as the site of the 1968 Olympic Summer Games.

It was the third major action this week to boost Portland as the Olympic Games site. Final passage was given earlier to a bill which would allow Portland to build an Olympic stadium outside its city limits.

And on Wednesday Gov. Mark Hatfield flew to New York to explain Portland's advantages to Sen. Douglas MacArthur, who will make America's pitch for the games.

Legislative leaders have publicly indicated they would support Portland's bid in every possible way.

In another action, the Senate recalled a bill passed Thursday, Sen. John Inskip, R-Oregon City, moved for recall of SB301 so a technical error could be corrected. After the bill was approved it was discovered the wording of the bill posed a threat to all of the state's water laws.

Sen. Arthur Ireland, R - Forest Grove, told the Senate "this is a good bill, but we've got to change one word."

The bill was referred back to the Senate Natural Resources Committee for correction. The Senate also voted to change the speed limit on passenger

1963 Fish Rule Books Available

The Oregon State Game Commission released the 1963 angling regulations last week and the booklets are available in local sporting goods stores.

Fishermen in Oregon are confronted with a mass of regulations and an angler is safe only when he consults the booklet each time he fishes a different body of water or in a different zone. The daily bag limit for trout consists of 10 fish. In zone six, which includes waters in Klamath County, not more than two fish in the daily limit may be over 20 inches. An angler is now allowed to take more than five fish over 12 inches.

Waters open to fishing the entire year that are within reach of Klamath County anglers include: Thompson Valley Reservoir (trout), Friday Reservoir (trout), Lost River (crappies, bass, catfish etc.), Gerber Reservoir (crappie, bass), southern portion of Upper Klamath Lake (trout), Link River (trout), Lake Ewauna, Emigrant Reservoir (trout), Klamath River (trout), and Sprague River (catfish, not trout).

Waters in the area that open April 29 include Spring Creek (from a point 100 yards upstream from mouth), Seven Mile Creek, Sycan River, Sprague River, Agency Lake, Lake of the Woods, Howard Prairie Reservoir and Fish Lake. Other lakes and streams open May 25.

Recalling the Seaside riots last Labor Day weekend, the House passed a bill to clarify the penalties for misuse of the liquor purchase identification permits for persons aged 21-26.

Rep. Grace Peck, D - Portland, said the riots pointed up the problem of persons lending the special cards to minors of similar appearance.

Mrs. Peck said 23,743 cards have been issued since they were started in 1961.

The bill, which went to the Senate, makes it a misdemeanor to lend a card. Present law makes it a violation to use a card falsely. The House passed a bill granting leaves of absence to public employees for service in the Peace Corps. About two-thirds of the House Republicans voted against it. It went to the Senate.

The House also passed a bill to let Oregon reach into other states to serve a summons in an effort to win redress in certain cases involving a wrong committed in Oregon.

Rep. Edward Branchfield, R-Medford, said a past U.S. Supreme Court decision had held such a law constitutional.

Mrs. Austin Death Told

Mrs. C. B. (Dora Kirby) Austin, 85, a resident of Klamath Falls for 35 years, died March 7 in Hillside Hospital following a short illness. The family home was at 3907 Hope Street.

She was a native of Young County, Tex., born Dec. 8, 1877, one of nine children. She migrated west with her family as a child and was married to C. B. Austin in 1902 in Sheridan, Wyo., where she spent her early married life.

Mrs. Austin was the first woman county school superintendent in Wyoming and was active in the early history of Sheridan.

She was a member of Manzanita Chapter, No. 172, Order of the Eastern Star, Naomi Shrine No. 5, Order of the White Shrine and Prosperity Rebekah Lodge No. 194.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Helen McCormack of this city; a son, Kirby B. Austin, Tuckahoe, N.Y.; three grandchildren, Janice McCormack, Douglas McCormack of this city and Clifford Austin, U.S. Navy, San Diego, Calif.; a great-grandchild, Diana McCormack, also of Klamath Falls, and Will Kirby, a brother, of Long Beach, Calif.

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Bill Backed To Assess Exempt Land

SALEM (UPI) — Unexpected support for a bill to have tax-exempt properties go back on the tax rolls at a reduced rate was voiced at a House Tax Committee hearing Thursday night.

The Greater Portland Council of Churches and the Scottish Rite Masons said they favored putting their buildings back on the tax rolls if other exempt groups also were included.

Under consideration was HB1453 which would place churches, lodges, fraternal organizations, literary and benevolent organizations on the rolls at about one-third of the rate other property pays. These groups are now exempt.

Theory behind the bill is that the exempt groups should help pay for such services as fire and police protection.

Many of the 100 persons at the hearing did not have a chance to testify, and Committee Chairman Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marco, said another hearing would be held in two weeks.

Former House Speaker Pat Dooley, representing the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Portland, was strongly opposed to the proposal.

William H. Boland, president of the Greater Portland Council of Churches, said many Protestant groups feel that churches should share in the tax load.

Also opposed to the plan was H. G. Horn, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Portland. He said the community as a whole benefits from churches, and that exemptions should remain.
