KU Basketball, Wrestling Teams Feted By Boosters

The Pelican Booster Club feted the Klamath Union basketball and wrestling teams Sunday night in the Winema Hotel with the annual Winter Sports Banquet.

A good crowd was on hand to honor the teams and watch as the special awards were presented. The estimated 150 people also listened to Portland University's head basketball coach, Al Negretti, give the featured speech.

Basketball awards went to four Pelicans. Wayne Chamberland, the leading scorer, rebounder and top percentage shooter of the team, was honored as the Most Valuable Player and presented his trophy by Bill Mansfield, the sophomore basketball coach.

Fred Kelley, the second leading scorer and rebounder, was presented the Best Defensive Player award by Jayvee Coach Bruce Patterson. The third award had to be divided because of the closeness of the race for the Most Improved Player. Athletic Director Jim Johnson gave the co-award to seniors Bob Holman and Don Piper.

Bob Ewing, the only state wrestling champion from Klamath's second place team, pulled down two of the top three awards. He got the Most Improved Wrestler

award from assistant coach Lee Allen and the High Point Trophy from freshman coach Phil Harter.

Tom Miles, one of the finest grapplers in the state, copped the Most Outstanding Wrestler trophy, presented by coach Delance Duncan. It is called the Gary Leavitt Trophy in honor of a former KU wrestler and is a Herald and News award.

Both coaches, Al Keck and Duncan, praised their teams for the fine showings made this season and spoke of each of the athletes.

Negretti's address to the meeting stressed three points about basic requirements for a successful athlete. He said first that the "athlete must love the sport which he is participating in—that he must be willing to give and sacrifice much to become successful."

His second point stressed confidence. "How to get confidence is the problem. It must begin inside the athlete. The boy must work on it. If he has worked hard and gives all he's got, he knows he's paid the price of sacrifice," he said.

"If you've worked as hard as you possibly know how, then when the time comes when you shake hands with your opponent before

the game, you can look your opponent straight in the eye and he'll know that you're ready. Then you have him whipped. You can fool the coach, fans and even your best girl. But you can't fool yourself if you aren't giving it all you've got," he continued.

"A coach also needs confidence," he stated. "The players must give the coach confidence. The school administration, the townspeople, the student body and the cheering section must give the coach confidence. If he gets this, then I know, at least, that I feel as though I coach better with that confidence."

His other point was that a vital requirement is that of quality of leadership. "Too many people don't want to stand up and be counted. They are just content to be a part of the crowd. A team must have a qualified leader," he explained.

Jones, Clay Ducats Sold By Scalpers

NEW YORK (UPI)—Broadway scalpers were getting \$50 each for choice seats today as Cassius Clay and Doug Jones finished training for their heavy-weight contenders' fight at Madison Square Garden Wednesday night.

The demand for tickets to the first sellout fight at the Garden in 13 years has become so intense that some of the better \$12 ringside tickets may bring \$75 to \$100 before fight time, the speculators say.

Unbeaten Clay, the "Louisville Lip" whose successful predictions of knockout rounds for his bouts have inspired the sellout, added zest to the situation Sunday night by announcing:

"I'm changing the pick I made before.

"Instead of six, Doug goes in four."

That announcement committed 21-year-old Clay to the task of knocking out in exactly the fourth round New Yorker Jones, who achieved the major boxing upset of 1962 by flattening the then third-ranked Zora Folley in the seventh round at the Garden, Dec. 15.

Those tears on the locker room floor are Stanford's, and it's UCLA that's singing in the shower.

Things couldn't have gone worse for the Indians during the weekend, everything came up roses for the Bruins, and consequently the two teams share the 1962-63 Big Six conference basketball title.

UCLA followed up its Friday night win over Stanford with a thumping 72-53 victory over California Saturday, while the Indians stumbled and lost to Southern California in overtime, 67-61.

Both teams finished the conference season with somewhat shaggy marks of 7 wins and 5 losses. They'll meet again Tuesday night to decide who will represent the Big Six in the NCAA Far West Regional tournament at Provo, Utah, this weekend.

The game will be played at Santa Monica City College because two of the three UCLA-Stanford contests during the regular season took place in the Indians' pavilion.

USF By A Hair
There is boundless joy also at the hilltop campus of the University of San Francisco, after one of the most dramatic season finales ever in a league that has had plenty of them.

The Dons grabbed the West Coast Athletic Conference championship and a spot in the NCAA regionals when Dave Lee's free throw in the final two seconds Saturday gave them a 62-61 win over runner-up Santa Clara. USF wound up with 10 wins and two losses. The Broncos were 9-3.

The post-season scramble for the NCAA national title begins tonight at Eugene, Ore., when Western Athletic Conference winner Arizona State meets Utah State and top independents Seattle and Oregon State tangle.

The winners move on to Provo Friday, where they will be joined by USF and the Stanford-UCLA victor in a four-team elimination to decide the western color-bearer in the national finals.

The Trojans of USC fought from behind all night in their spoiler win over Stanford. Gary Holman hit a field goal with 41 seconds of regulation time left to tie Stanford 59-59 and send the game into overtime.

UOP Loses Again
Gordon Martin of SC, who led all scorers with 27 points, hit the first bucket of the overtime period and the Trojans scored six more points to lead 67-59 before Stanford could find the basket.

UCLA, employing its usual balanced attack, led all the way in chalking up its third straight win over Cal. Dale Goodrich scored 16 points, while Walt Hazzard and Jack Hirsch had 14 apiece. UCLA fans brought their transistor radios and listened to the final minutes of the Stanford-USC game in the stands.

USF stayed ahead of Santa Clara most of the way, but the Broncos got a free throw by Gene Shields and a field goal by Joe Weiss to knot it at 61-61, setting up the playoff charity toss by Lee.

The San Jose State Spartans wound up their WCAC season with a 6-6 slate by beating University of Pacific 61-43. The Tigers finished the league season with a record of unbroken gloom—12 straight losses.

In the Northwest, the two independent powers tuned up for the NCAA playoffs with wins over rugged foes. Seattle held off a late rally by Idaho in downing the Vandals 95-88, and Oregon State cooled off the fast-closing Oregon Ducks 71-65.

Washington, which closed out its Big Six season a week ago, topped Washington State 59-57 on a twisting lay-in by Steven Wilson with two seconds showing on the clock.

Fresno State won the right to represent the West in the NCAA college division tournament at Evansville, Ind., when the Bulldogs rapped Chapman 71-59 in the regional finals at Fresno Saturday. The eight-team tournament begins Wednesday.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—Arizona State, acclaimed as the best in the West after rolling up a 24-2 record in its regular season, meets upset-minded Utah State in the first half of the opening round of the NCAA Western regional basketball playoffs tonight.

Oregon State and Seattle battle in the second half of the double-header at Oregon's McArthur Court here. The games are scheduled to start at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. A capacity crowd of 10,000 is expected for the contests.

The winners move on to the second round of the Western playoffs at Provo, Utah, Friday night. The winner of the Arizona State-Utah State game meets the champion of the Big Six conference and the winner of the Oregon State-Seattle contest plays West Coast Athletic Conference champion San Francisco.

UCLA and Stanford battle in a playoff to decide the Big Six delegate in the NCAA tourney Tuesday night.

The opening round is a replay of last year's first round. Utah State upset Arizona State 78-73 and Oregon State edged Seattle 69-65 in overtime last year.

Arizona State, which won the Western Athletic Conference title, rates as a heavy favorite against Utah State, which compiled a 20-6 record during the regular season.

The Oregon State-Seattle game rates as a tossup. The teams split two games during the season. The

They became the 13th, 14th and 15th teams to qualify for the 16-team tournament at Eugene March 19-23.

Astoria defeated David Douglas

50-47, Medford won over Crater 84-63 and Grants Pass topped Ashland 75-47.

Grants Pass won the No. 1 Southern Conference berth by a drawing Sunday. Co-champion Medford will be the No. 2 representative.

The last berth in the tourney will be filled by the winner of the Oregon City-Tillamook playoff game at Hillsboro Tuesday night.

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
