SEATTLE (UPI)—A combine of four construction and architectural firms Monday submitted plans for a floating \$15 million, 70,000-seat stadium to the Seattle City Council.

Sport Parade: Liston's Amazing Training Camp Gets Back Into Daily Operation

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—It was like something out of Hollywood, California, and not the village three miles up the Florida road, as awesome Sonny Liston went back to heavy work today for his April 10 defense against Floyd Patterson.

Purple sweatpants, blondes in Bikinis, rock and roll recordings to pace the rope skipping, photo sessions in which Sonny lifts two-ton female tourists high into the air with one sweep of his massive arm, a swimming pool where the training spectators dunk their sunburned feet and other innovations make Sonny's Miami Beach hotel camp the most exotic and unbelievable setting since Cleopatra.

The tempo was set when Sonny, a mountain of muscle in a white terry cloth robe, stepped into his shaded training ring Sunday to test the knee he injured 17 days ago while swinging a golf club for a photographer.

Don't kid yourself Mr. Patterson. The knee is fine and those more than two weeks of loafing must have been spent by Sonny in a steam bath. He looks as fit as a brand new locomotive, and just about as hard.

The last time he boxed, Sonny faced a heavy by the rather improbable name of Vaneda Cox. Sonny hit Vaneda a right cross that flattened him, lifted up his sparmate anxiously and asked: "Are you all right?"

"Sure," quoth Vaneda.

At which juncture, Sonny hauled off and completely flattened him with a straight right.

Vaneda had an easy time as Sonny returned to work. They won three rounds but it was only shadow sparring, and Vaneda's sighs of relief could be heard over the other side of the canvas wall which separates Sonny's ocean-view ring and pool from that used by the hotel guests.

Sonny by now had stripped off

the robe which, on the back, has the picture of a sun on the horizon.

"Is that a rising or a setting sun?" somebody demanded.

"Depends," said another, "whether it represents Sonny or Patterson."

Liston, with as much expres-

ion as the stone faces on Mt. Rushmore, ruined the heavy bag for two rounds and then mauled the light bag for two more. After this came the piece de resistance, the rope skipping routine in which he does a heel and toe light fantastic to the raucous rock of "Night Train."

Garden Sold Out For Clay, Jones

NEW YORK (UPI)—Boxing should receive two potent shots in the week from a sell-out heavy-weight contenders' fight at Madison Square Garden Wednesday and a triple title-fight show at the Los Angeles Dodgers' Stadium Saturday.

A turnout crowd of 18,500 will witness unbeaten and unbridled Cassius Clay of Louisville, Ky. Wednesday night as he tries to fulfill his long prediction of a sixth-round knockout over dangerous Doug Jones of New York—and become perhaps the summer title challenger.

It's the first sellout light at Madison Square Garden in 13 years.

For Saturday's Los Angeles show, seating arrangements have been made for 40,000 in the Dodgers' ball park, where the bill is topped by champion Emile Griffith's third defense of his recaptured welterweight (147-pound) crown against Cuban Luis Rodriguez.

In the other two bouts, Davey Moore of Columbus, O., defends his featherweight (126-pounds) championship against Sugar Ramos of Cuba and Battling Torres of Mexico fights Roberto Cruz of the Philippines for the vacant junior welterweight (140-pound) diadem.

Only the Griffith-Rodriguez welterweight fight Saturday will be

televised nationally to homes. Clay-Jones heavyweight extravaganza at New York will be sent only on closed-circuit television to arenas in 35 cities, and it will have no radio broadcast.

The New York gate will approximate \$12,000 as the hood-bracing, poetry-spouting Clay shoots for his 16th straight professional victory against Jones, who achieved the biggest upset of 1962.

Los Angeles promoters hope for a gate of between \$250,000 and \$300,000 for their big outdoor tripleheader.

Clay is favored at 3-1 to beat 26-year-old Jones and perhaps earn a summer shot at the heavyweight crown. Because both punches and Doug are good punchers, the price is 7-5 that the bout ends before its scheduled 10 rounds, regardless of the winner.

Some boxing men consider Clay's 3-1 price an "over-bid" because of Jones' greater experience against better opponents and because of his sensational upset seventh-round knockout over high-ranking Zora Foley at the Garden last Dec. 15.

For the Los Angeles show, New York bookies have Griffith only a slight favorite at 6-5 over Rodriguez, Moore at 8-5 over Ramos, and Torres at 2-1 over Cruz.

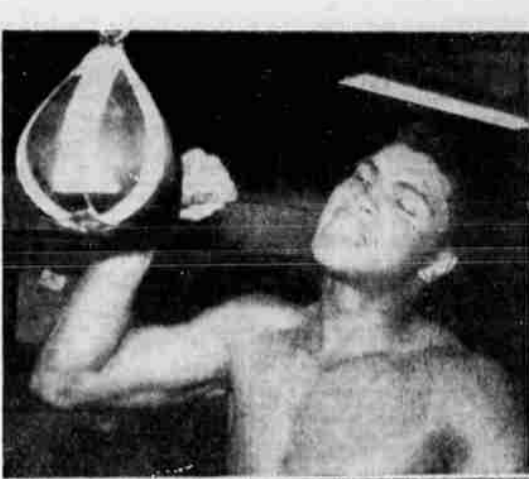

Arnold Palmer Grabs Pensacola PGA Tourney

PENSACOLA, Fla. (UPI)—Arnold Palmer no longer puts birthdays and trophies together.

Starting the winter tour at Los Angeles in January, Palmer was 53 years old and had 33 PGA tournament wins.

Flying to Palm Beach today in his six-seater, he's still 33 but he has 36 victories after taking the 38th annual Pensacola PGA Open with a 15-under par 273 for \$3,500.

Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., puts his foreign wins—two British opens and two Caribbean victories—in a separate category.

In eight years plus of following the sun, Palmer has now won \$366,203.09. "You can have the pennies," he said.

It was the Palmer patented finish that gave the Pennsylvania his second victory here in three years. He was four shots behind starting the round and it took only seven holes to catch up with Harold (Catfish) Kneecap of Aiken, S.C.

Palmer, cheered on by an army of onlookers, rolled in an eight footer on the first hole, dropped a 10 footer on the third hole, sank

a three-footer on the sixth hole and hit the par five eighth hole in two and two-potted for birdies to go one shot ahead of Kneecap. The crowd cheered lustily and Kneecap felt the pressure.

It was Palmer's third victory in seven starts—much better than last year's pace when he set the single-season money-winning record of \$81,448.33.

Kneecap and Gary Player, the winter tour's top cash collector, shot 13-under-par 275 to deadlock for second.

Tommy Bolt, winner here in 1961, took in \$1,500 with a 276.

Spring Shoot Victors Told

RENO, Nev. (UPI)—Col. William Eberhart of Vancouver, Wash., fired a 370x400 Sunday to win the "open high all-around" championship in the Nevada spring trap shoot tournament.

Dan Orlick of Reno came through with a 376x400 in the final day of the annual event to win the Nevada state high all-around honors, and the open 400 handicap was taken by Harry Smith of Franklin, Wis.

Nadine Ljutic shot a 352x400 to win the Nevada state 400 handicap title.

ABC Meet Shifts Noted

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI)—The Morris Meat Market team of Iselein, N.J., compiled 2988 to move into eighth place Sunday night in the regular team division of the American Bowling Congress tournament.

Albert Arlington paced the New Jersey team with a three-game 671, followed by Richard Knapp with 623.

In the classic team division, United Van Lines of St. Louis rolled a 3071 series, which means the team must compile 3096 tonight to overtake pace-setting Helin Tackle of Detroit. The Helin team leads with 6157.

In minor events, Guy St. John of South Bend, Ind., took first place in the classic singles with 684. He replaced Dick Cochran of Chicago, who dropped to second with 682 rolled Saturday.

In the regular division all-events Ken Head of Southgate, Mich., moved into 10th place with a nine-game 1921. Still in first is Andy Huddoba of Youngstown, Ohio.
