East Cagey But In Vain

My son Jim tells me that as I get older I have a tendency to bid with the delicacy of a sledgeman.

So, if you don't approve of my three no-trump rebid, I won't argue, although I do feel that it was the best bid at my disposal after my partner responded two diamonds to my opening heart.

After his jump to five hearts I was mildly interested in seven and chose my six club bid to see if he could bid six diamonds. When he merely returned to six hearts I settled for a safe contract.

The jack of clubs opening was friendly. If West had opened a diamond I might still be studying my play, but with the club opening six was easy.

I won with the queen after East played low, ruffed a club with the king of hearts, since I could afford it, and drew trumps.

Then I led my jack of diamonds and it held. At this point it appeared that I was going to make seven. The diamond finesse had worked. All I had to do was to repeat it and discard my jack of spades on a third diamond.

Fortunately for my future peace of mind, I remembered that just because a finesse worked the first time it might not work the second and that I had bid six, not seven. I won the second diamond with the ace and was very pleased when East muttered something that did not exactly sound like "Oh, fiddlesticks!"

Then I finessed my jack of spades and made seven after all.

MR. AND MRS. J. D. STRUNK of Visalia were recently visiting her brother, Larry Hamblet, in Malin.

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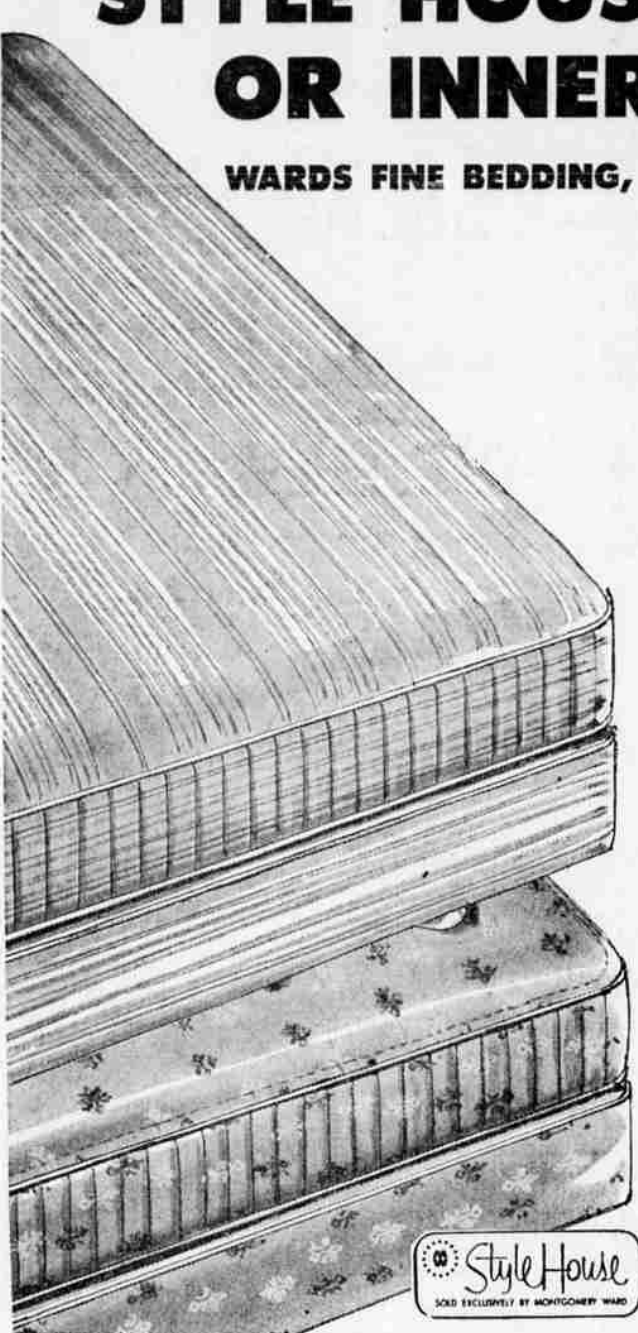
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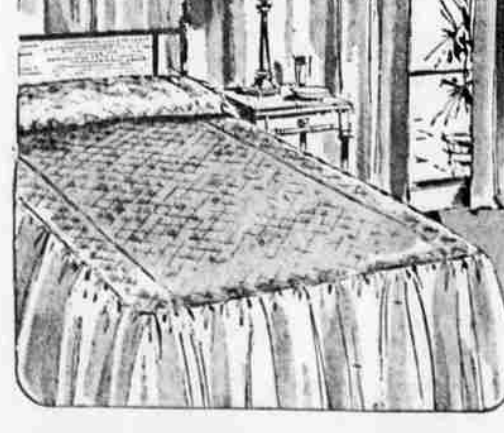
