National Notice Given Park Project

The Klamath Falls Garden Club's Bird Sanctuary project at Moore Park recently received national notice when an article concerning it appeared in the January-February 1963 issue of "National Gardener," the official bi-monthly publication of the 400,000 garden clubbers in the United States.

The article, written by the project chairman, Mrs. Hugh O'Connor of Klamath Falls, detailed the inception and progress of the project, and its future plans.

Began in 1961 at the request of the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department, the project embraces one and a half acres in the park, with a trail winding through the area past the bird pool which was built last year.

Finances for the project came in part from Sears' grants and from money raised by the club, which holds hot dog sales, plant sales and rummage sales to benefit it.
