Airline Faces March 20 Strike Deadline By Flight Attendants

West Coast Airlines was today faced with a strike deadline set by its flight attendants for one minute to midnight (local standard time) March 20.

Bob Moore, local manager of West Coast Airlines, said today the report out of Chicago was his first information on the strike and that he was unable to comment at this time.

The deadline was set by the Steward and Stewardess Division of the Air Line Pilots Association (ALP-CIO), who blamed a breakdown in contract negotiations on the company's failure to meet industry standards of pay and working conditions for flight attendants.

Spokesmen for the stewardesses union said they had been endeavoring for over a year to make

changes in their contract in accordance with the Railway Labor Act that would establish pay and work rules similar to those existing on other air carriers of the same type.

Direct negotiations and efforts to withdraw from the dispute on Dec. 10, 1962. The statutory "cooling off" period expired Jan. 10 of this year, leaving the West Coast attendants free to strike since that time.

Union representatives said that in view of the breakdown of negotiations and the National Mediation Board's withdrawal, they were left with no course of action other than the present one.

West Coast Airlines employs approximately 60 stewardesses and operates in the six-state area of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah, and California as well as to some Canadian points.
