"NOW SHURE AND IT IS" — Get in the swing of St. Patrick's Day fun by asking in a few friends and maybe dancing an Irish jig. When it comes to dessert there is nothing finer than this Irish cake, shamrock and all.

Don't Pass Up A Celebration

Add a vivid green note to your costume, whistle an Irish tune. We are about to celebrate a gay occasion—St. Patrick's Day. Paraders strut, bands play lively melodies. Everyone who loves a good time adopts the Emerald Isle as his home for the day, dons a shamrock, gets ready to make merry.

Party plans are heard on all sides. Here is a suggestion in the refreshment line — a lofty sponge layer cake filled and frosted with buttercream icing. This dessert is memorable. To carry out the color scheme of the day, bright green maraschino cherries are folded into the filling, and arranged around the base of the cake. A shamrock of grated chocolate decorates the top.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY CAKE

To make cake:
1½ cups sifted cake flour
1½ teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
4 eggs
1½ cups granulated sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
¾ cup hot (not boiling) milk
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat eggs until very thick. Gradually add sugar to eggs, beating constantly; add lemon juice and beat well. Gradually fold flour mixture into egg

mixture. Stir hot milk into batter. Turn into 3 ungreased 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) about 25 minutes, or until cakes test done. Invert to cool. Cool thoroughly. Remove from pans.

To frost and decorate:
¾ cup butter or margarine, softened
6 cups sifted confectioners' sugar (about 1½ pounds)
1-3 cup honey
¼ cup milk
¾ cup chopped green maraschino cherries
Grated unsweetened chocolate
Whole green maraschino cherries

Cream butter or margarine until light and fluffy. Blend sugar, honey and milk alternately into butter or margarine, heating well after each addition. Add chopped cherries to ¾ cup frosting; mix well. Place cake layer on serving plate. Spread part of cherry frosting over cake.
Place second cake layer over first layer. Spread remaining cherry frosting over second cake layer. Place remaining cake layer over cherry frosting. Frost top and sides of cake with remaining frosting. Sprinkle top of cake with grated chocolate in a shamrock design. Decorate base of

cake with whole maraschino cherries. (Makes 1 8-inch layer cake.)

Eager Housewives Hear About Beef

Now being hailed as the most successful consumer education and beef sales program ever staged in the state of Oregon is the Beef-O-Rama program. The former cooking schools sponsored by the Oregon Cow Belles and the Oregon Beef Council, for the purpose of showing homemakers the variety of ways of preparing low cost, economy cuts of Oregon beef.

From 20 to 25 Oregon Cow Belles from Klamath, Jefferson, Grant, Wheeler and Umatilla counties spearheaded the hosting of the Beef-O-Rama cooking schools. Coordinators of the Oregon Cow Belles are Mrs. Earl Smith, Mitchell, Ore., president, and Mrs. David Campbell, Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Earl Smith stated, "Oregon Cow Belles are ecstatic over the phenomenal success of the Beef-O-Rama cooking schools. It is without any doubt the best received consumer education series I've ever seen, and dramatically points the way for all Cow Belles to continue such events in the future."

Richard Westerberg, Medford, chairman, Oregon Beef Council, stated "the value of such promotions, as the Beef-O-Rama cooking schools, clearly demonstrates that such events educate homemakers to buy Oregon beef. 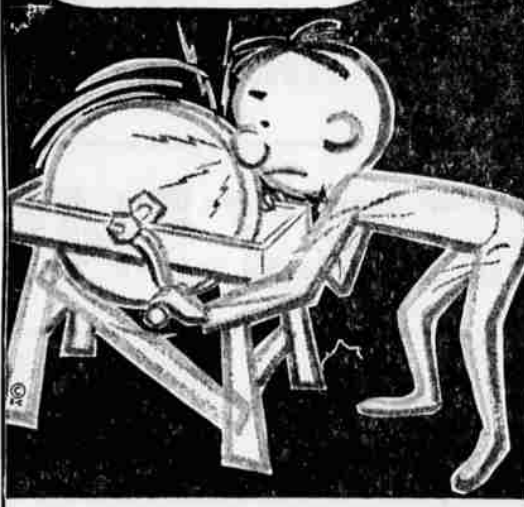
