SALEM (UPI)—The State Highway Department Tuesday announced a low bid of \$3,099,093 by Peter Kewitt Sons for a section of the Pacific Highway in Jackson County.

The contracts for this and other projects will be awarded at a Highway Commission meeting Thursday.

Kewitt's bid was for the South Ashland interchange - Wall Creek section of the Pacific highway.

## Fire Costs Shift Backed

SALEM (UPI)—A proposal to shift to the public some of the cost of fighting fires in forests and on grazing land drew strong support Tuesday from the Oregon Forest Protective Association and the Oregon Farm Bureau.

Association spokesman Jim Corlett said passage of the bill would be "an historic moment." A bureau spokesman said firefighting costs have become "crippling" for ranchers, who rarely start fires themselves. Main causes are lightning, hunters and campers.

## Death Fells California's Rep. Doyle

ARLINGTON, Va. (UPI)—Rep. Clyde Doyle, D-Calif., 75, died early today at his home here. A spokesman for the family said death apparently was caused by a heart attack in his sleep.

Doyle and his wife had attended a dinner Wednesday night in nearby Washington sponsored by the American Legion after he had spent an active day in the House. Mrs. Doyle said he showed no sign of illness when they went to bed at about 11 p.m.

Mrs. Doyle said she was roused from her sleep when she heard her husband breathe heavily at about 1:30 a.m. She said she tried to awaken him and found he was no longer breathing. He was pronounced dead at an Arlington hospital.

Doyle was serving his ninth term in the House from California's 23rd district. He had been elected to eight consecutive terms since 1945.

The veteran congressman was a member of two major House committees — The Armed Services Committee and the Committee on Un-American Activities.

## Leopold Now 'Free Man'

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI)—The Illinois Pardon and Parole Board today ordered Nathan Leopold Jr., one of the 1934 "thrill slayers" of 14-year-old Bobby Franks, discharged from parole.

The action meant Leopold, 57, was a free man for the first time since he was arrested for the slaying which became known as "the crime of the century" 29 years ago.

Leopold has lived in Puerto Rico since he was released on parole from Stateville Penitentiary in 1958. He was in Puerto Rico today when the parole board acknowledged that his term of parole had expired and he was no longer under its supervision.

Leopold is employed as a laboratory technician at the Brethren Service Hospital in Puerto Rico.
