NEW YORK (UPI) — Stock price movements were extremely narrow in quiet early dealings today.

Apparently a commercial department projection of lower manufacturers' sales for the second quarter of the year, caused investors to resume the cautious policy they briefly abandoned Wednesday when the market scored a fairly impressive advance.

Chrysler gained a point and other motors firmed small fractions but the leading steels, chemicals, oils, and rails were narrowly missed. A majority of the utilities shed and Houston Lighting fell back 1 1/2.

The only "movers" in the general list were Eversharp, IBM, Norris-Thermador and Udyline with point-sized gains. Anken Chemical down 1 and Electric Autolite off 1 1/4 apparently on profit-taking prompted by its run-up earlier this week.

House Okays Arms Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The record \$15.8 billion defense authorization bill is safely through the House but Senate action appears weeks away.

The House passed the bill to buy new missiles, aircraft and warships by a 374-33 vote Wednesday. It authorizes spending more money than any Republicans and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara think is necessary.

Chamber Urges More Study On Bill Defining Duties Of Sheriff's Office

The duties of county tax collector should be transferred from the Sheriff's Office to the County Treasurer, but the responsibilities of the sheriff as a law enforcement officer should not be passed to the state police under the provisions of a bill now before the legislature.

That was the view of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce after it discussed Senate Bill 1641, under study in the legislature, which would strip the duties of tax collector and law enforcement officer from county sheriffs throughout the state, and reduce the duties of the elective office to that of jail custodian and messenger of the court.

The action did not indicate that the chamber opposed transfer of the law enforcement responsibilities of the sheriff to state police, but merely that it had noted "several defects" in the proposed bill and believed they should be corrected before further legislative action was taken. The chamber members then decided to urge the legislature to restate that part of the measure pertaining to the sheriff's duties as a law enforcement officer before proceeding with the bill.

The decisions of the chamber were made upon the recommendation of the Local and State Affairs Committee, as represented by Orth Sismore, chairman of the committee. Sismore told the chamber that the views of the County Commissioner Frank Ganong, who appeared before the group earlier in the week to discuss the proposed bill.

Sismore said that Ganong opposed transferring the law enforcement function of the sheriff to the state police since such a move would place more power with the state government, which is already too centralized. Further, the bill does not permit state police to delegate people to represent them in outlying areas, Sismore quoted Ganong.

Under the present system, the sheriff may deputize laymen whenever necessary.

On the other matter, Ganong believed that the duties of the tax collector should be transferred from the sheriff to the county treasurer, and thereby update a

The chairman said he decided to make public his decision after several people had asked him his intentions for the next five-year term.

The city school administration has already recommended to the board changing the operating schedule to a split shift arrangement for the coming year.

Details of the proposed split shift have not been worked out, but it was felt one of the best plans would be for the seniors and sophomores to attend school for half a day and for the freshmen and juniors to attend the other half. Morning classes would probably start at 7 a.m. and last until noon. Afternoon classes would run from 12:30 p.m. until about 3:30 p.m.

Potato Commission Meeting Talks Crop Prospect, Price

total of 31,000,000 hundredweight. Plus the carryover of late potatoes, with the drop in production, there would be four pounds per capita less this season than was available a year ago.

The Russel Burbank is now the leading variety of tuber. On legislation, bills to regulate the quantity of potatoes in marketing agreement areas for purchase by canners and the frozen processed potatoes have been introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Congressman Al Ullman of Oregon (H.R. 1710) and Congressman Harold T. "Bizz" Johnson of California (H.R. 497).

Bills to prohibit the future trading of potatoes on mercantile exchanges have been introduced by Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine (S. 332) and by Congressman McIntire of Maine (H.R. 904). Hearings are scheduled on these proposals for April 8-9.

An acreage allotment bill (S. 329), introduced by Senator Muskie has been re-sponsored by Senators Jordan and Irving of North Carolina.

This bill provides for a national, state, area or county and farm acreage allotments based on the production of the two highest of the last three years, on record now, would be 1959, 1960 and 1961.

Prior to Jan. 1, the secretary of agriculture would determine that an over-supply of potatoes is imminent and would establish a national marketing quota, broken down to the grower.

After Feb. 1, a referendum could be conducted of those growers planting two acres or more. It is estimated that there are 32,000 growers planting two acres or more than produce 95 per cent of the total crop.

Should two thirds of the growers vote, or 50 per cent or more of those who produce two-thirds or more of the total production, the program would become operative.

The first year, 1 1/2 per cent of the total quota would be set aside for adjustment allowances to permit changes that are necessary during the first year.

A grower would be required to plant 90 per cent of his acreage allotment in order to hold it. He could sell it for a season, transfer it or give it away as a gift.

The penalty for planting in excess of the established allotment would be \$2 per hundredweight on the normal yield, times the excess acreage. It was brought out at the meeting.

Mercker urged growers to express

press opinions to their congressman on the proposed legislation.

He also urged growers to watch the "Truth in Packaging Bill," of Sen. Hart of Michigan. Mercker said that probably the only product that would be affected by the bill is potato chips which are packaged in 157 different weight containers.

There has also been established a new consumer protection agency, the "Consumer's Education Branch," with Mary E. Cunningham as director.

President John F. Kennedy has also established an Advisory Consumer Council with Dr. Helen G. Conover, Dean of the College of Nutrition and Home Economics, Cornell University in charge.

These agencies are guarding the welfare of the consumer and they may stimulate investigations of the U.S. Food and Drug Act, Oregon has moved forward in sale of potatoes, both for processing and fresh consumption, and has gained a large proportion of the food market.

For the remainder of the last season crop shipments, the supply is slightly below a year ago. Mercker, stressed repeatedly in his talk, the need to hold down production in 1963. Should the same acreage as last year be planted, he said, a crop total of 270-275 million hundredweight could be produced, an increase of 17 to 22 million in overproduction.

Less acreages would favor the price level. Prices have been affected by the large supply of processed potatoes in storage, equal to a six weeks supply of the fresh product, that have moved into consumption channels rapidly as the price of fresh potatoes increased.

Processors, it was brought out, spend about 30 times as much for advertising as is spent for fresh potato advertising.

Oregon potato growers, Mercker said, are interested in the national situation. They have been loyal supporters of the National Potato Council, in helping guide the course of the National Potato Council.

At the March 13 meeting of the Oregon Potato Commission in Klamath Falls, financial support to the national organization was commended by the official.

He expressed appreciation for the support, and reiterated that the purpose of the National Potato Council is to represent the industry on a national plane including plans for increased consumption, favorable publicity and legislation, transportation, distribution, and improved techniques of production and marketing.

The Oregon Potato Commission went on record as approving the use of funds accumulated in the Central Potato Growers Area and held by the commission, to provide better labor camp facilities at a cost of between \$20,000 and \$25,000 in Central Oregon.

Safety Group Support Radar

SALEM (UPI) — A bill which would outlaw radar speed traps drew opposition Wednesday from the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission.

It said outlawing the use of radar would be a step backward and "deprive enforcement agencies of one of their most modern and efficient tools."

Holly Holcomb, deputy superintendent of the Oregon State Police, said he could not understand why anyone would want to throw out radar.

"If people want to make enforcement a cat-and-mouse game we should eliminate speedometers and let officers guess the speed," he said.
