

Koufax Pitches Dodgers Past Yanks, 5-2

It's great to be young and a Yankee, of course, but it's even better to be young and beat the Yankees.

And it's still better if you're Sandy Koufax, a great pitcher who hasn't had "winning pitcher" alongside his name in the boxscore since last July 12. Because in Sandy's case it means there's no longer the gnawing fear that every pitch he makes might be his last.

Koufax, who had won 14 games until he suffered a mysterious finger ailment last July and then didn't win another game all season, fired five strong innings Thursday as the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Yankees, 5-2. It was his second good showing of the spring and by far his best performance since last July.

Chisox Rip Bucs

The Chicago White Sox scored their fifth victory in six exhibition games when they ripped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 16-5. Ron Hansen drove in five runs with a grand slam homer and two singles and Floyd Robinson and Pete Ward also homered for the White Sox. Ray Herbert, a 29-game winner in 1962, pitched three scoreless innings.

The unbeaten Baltimore Orioles ran their winning streak to five games with an 11-7 decision over the Minnesota Twins. John Powell led the Orioles' 15-hit attack with three singles and drove in three runs.

Ted Bowsfield turned in four impressive innings for the Kansas City Athletics, who beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-1. Bowsfield allowed only one hit and one walk and also connected for a two-run triple off Chris Short in the fourth inning. John Wyatt yielded the Phillies' run on a homer by Tony Gonzalez.

Gordon Coleman homered off Ed Bauta in the ninth inning to lift the Cincinnati Reds to a 3-2 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals. Jim Owens, Kent Hunt and Bob Hefner combined to hold the Cardinals to eight hits as the Reds gained their second win in six exhibition games.

Post Five-Hitter

Lew Burdette, Denny Lemaster and Hank Fischer pitched a five-hitter to lead the Milwaukee Braves to a 4-3 decision over the Detroit Tigers.

The Washington Senators defeated the New York Mets, 4-2, with outfielder Don Lock slugging a home, double and single. Roger Craig, a 24-game loser in 1962, suffered his second defeat of the spring. Don Rudolph, Steve Hamilton and Jim Hannan limited the Mets to eight hits.

Ed Kirkpatrick, 18-year old rookie catcher, belted a two-run homer that led the Los Angeles Angels to a 5-2 win over the Chicago Cubs.

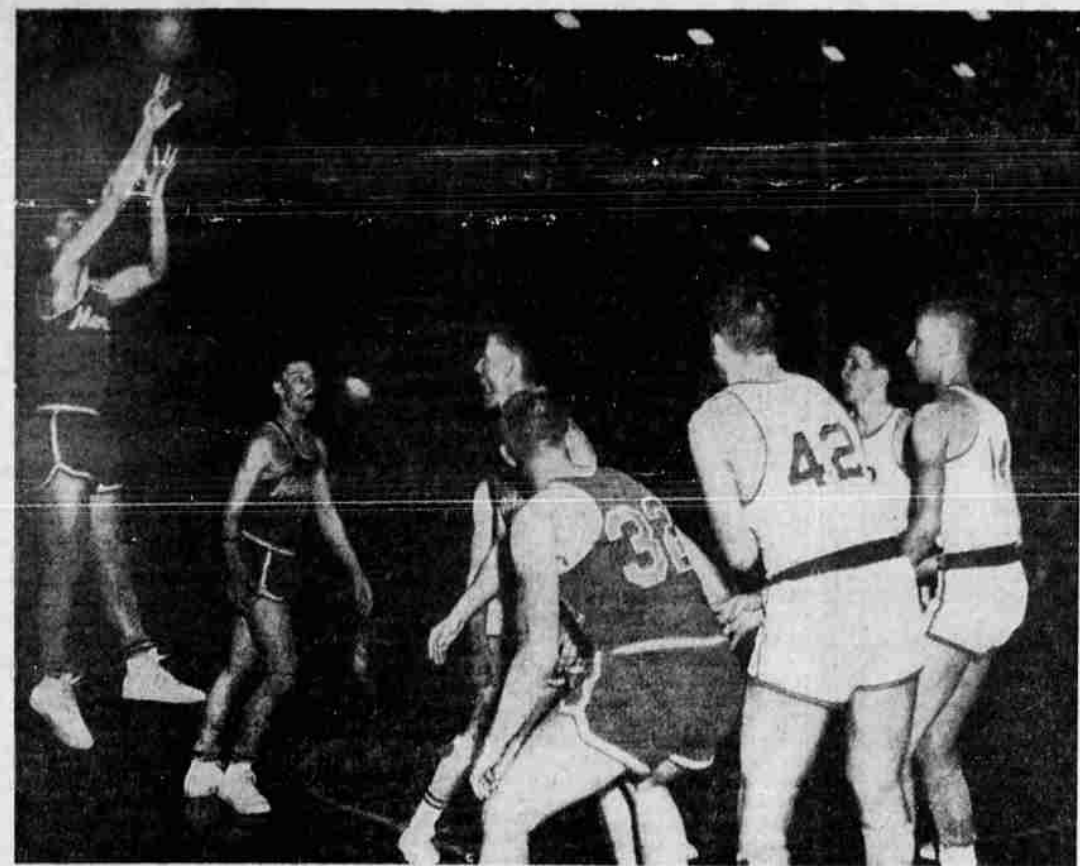

PROVO, Utah (UPI) — UCLA, led by quick-handed Walt (the Wizard) Hazzard, and Oregon State, paced by lumbering Mel Counts, are the favorites in the Far West NCAA regional basketball tournament which opens here tonight.

UCLA, the Western qualifier for the 1962 NCAA tournament, draws well balanced Arizona State University as its first round opponent and Oregon State, kingpin of West Coast Independents, takes on University of San Francisco. Both games will be played in the 11,000-seat Brigham Young University fieldhouse.

Cinderella Villanova Takes On Top-Seeded Wichita Five

NEW YORK (UPI) — Almost every year in the National Invitation Basketball Tournament some team gets the "cinderella" label and coach Jack Kraft of Villanova will see if the shoe fits Saturday night when his Wildcats meet top-seeded Wichita.

Villanova and Memphis State advanced into Saturday's quarter-finals of the 26th annual post-season tourney at Madison Square Garden by scoring decisive opening round victories Thursday evening. Wally Jones scored 28 points and sophomore Eric Erickson got 18 as the Wildcats ousted DePaul, 63-51, and Memphis State ran over Fordham, 70-49, before 14,238 fans.

Coach Kraft, whose biggest player is 6-7 Jim Washington, said "We'll have trouble trying to cope with Wichita's height. They have 6-7 Dave Stallworth, 6-7 Wayne Durham and 6-10 Nate Bowman. Stallworth will be especially tough to deal with. Any team from the Missouri Valley Conference is tough. The Missouri Valley ranks as the toughest conference in the country."

Clay's Next Foe May Be Ingemar

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cassius Clay may have been booed thunderously in his latest fight, but the Louisville Lip will be favored at 8-5 to beat former heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson in June or July, if that match is made next week.

That's what an active bookmaker forecast today. Matchmaker Teddy Brenner of Madison Square Garden will fly to Sweden next week in an attempt to arrange for the Cassius-Ingemar bout at the Garden—if Clay & Co. have refused to accept a return match with Doug Jones of New York.

It was diminutive but dangerous Jones who lost an unpopular decision to Clay at the Garden on Wednesday night and who has been yelling for a return bout in which, Jones said, "I'll knock him out."

There's little chance that Clay and Manager Bill Faversham will accept another tilt with tough and aggressive Jones—a tilt in which Cassius would have little to gain and much to lose. Brenner and Harry Markson, managing director of Garden boxing, had not given up on the Clay-

Warriors Have Stats, Low Finish

The San Francisco Warriors won't even land in the National Basketball Association playoffs, but they dominate the league's individual statistics.

St. Louis downed San Francisco 114-109 Thursday night in the only scheduled National Basketball Association action but a couple of Warriors had big nights.

Wilt Chamberlain, who already has tied his fourth straight scoring title, made a bid to capture the shooting accuracy title, too. Chamberlain is battling Walt Bellamy of Chicago and whichever one wins is certain to blast Bellamy's league record of .513 set last year.

Chamberlain hit 17 of 21 shots Thursday night and should edge Bellamy if he can keep up that type of scoring pace. Wilt had 29 points altogether.

Guy Rodgers, league leader in assists, tied an NBA record Thursday night by contributing 28 assists. The record was set by Bob Cousy of the Boston Celtics. Rodgers has the league title in this department sewed up this year.

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
