

Huskies Bow To McEwen In State B Consolation Round 69-39

Beavers, Sun Devils Gain Region Finals

PROVO, Utah (UPI) — Speedy Arizona State University and deliberate Oregon State, a pair of teams with exceptional size and balance, clash tonight for the Far West NCAA regional basketball championship.

Arizona State entered the quarter-final round of tournament action by scoring a convincing 93-79 victory over UCLA Friday night, while Oregon State edged University of San Francisco, 65-61. A crowd of 9,704 saw the double-header at Brigham Young University fieldhouse.

The title game takes place at 9 p.m. (MST) and San Francisco and UCLA clash at 7 p.m. for third place in the regional meet.

Sun Devils Favored

Arizona State, winner of the Western Athletic Conference and possessor of an impressive 26-2 record, became the favorite in the title game. The Sun Devils inherited the favorite role with a convincing triumph over the Bruins, the hot-shooting Arizonans were never headed and hit an amazing 59 per cent from the field in the first half to roll up a 63-31 lead.

UCLA, the Big Six co-champion, could never recover from the first five minutes when Arizona State raced to a 14-3 lead. At one point in the first half, coach Ned Wulfsberg had a 20-point advantage at 43-17.

Five players hit in double figures for Arizona State, with Art Becker leading the way with 23 points. Teammate Joe Caldwell had 22 and Tony Cerkevich 18.

Baker Shines

The Sun Devils also beat the Bruins on the boards, grabbing 65 rebounds to 49 for UCLA.

Top Bruin scorer was Jack Hirsch with 19. Fred Slaughter followed with 14.

Oregon State relied once again on its one-two attack of lumbering Mel Counts and reliable Terry Baker. Counts, a seven-foot senior, threw in 22 points and Baker contributed 21 in leading the Beavers to victory over the fired-up Dons.

Baker, an All-America football player, put Oregon State ahead with four minutes left after San Francisco held a 34-47 lead with six minutes to go. The Heisman Trophy winner hit on two field goals and a foul shot to give Oregon State a 56-53 lead.

After San Francisco tied the score again, Baker connected on a long shot and put the Beavers out in front for good at 58-56. Counts scored four points in the crucial closing drive.

SEC Officials Investigating Magazine's Collusion Charges

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — A sweeping investigation involving the FBI and the U. S. Senate was triggered Saturday by charges that former Georgia Athletic Director Wallace Butts and Alabama Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant conspired to rig a football game. Southeastern Conference Commissioner Bernie Moore called a news conference to announce that his office was looking into the allegations contained in the forthcoming issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

Moore brushed aside suggestions that a scandal might erupt that could shatter the 12-member conference.

In Washington, the FBI said it has made "preliminary inquiries" into the charges. A spokesman for the Senate's permanent investigation subcommittee, which has been looking into "racketeering aspects" in point-spread fixing in amateur and professional sports, said the group also will delve into the controversy that erupted like a bombshell.

A Justice Department spokesman said that while no active investigation was underway by the department, developments were being closely followed.

The Post story—called "The Story of a College Football Fix"—quoted an Atlanta man, George

Burnett, as saying he accidentally overheard a telephone conversation in which Butts gave Bryant Georgia's plays and outlined its offensive formations.

Denies Charge

Butts, who resigned at Georgia Feb. 28 after 25 years as head coach and then athletic director, and Bryant, both denied the charge.

Butts called it "the most fantastic and ridiculous thing that I can imagine."

William H. Schroder, attorney for Butts, said Saturday Butts intends to file a libel suit against the magazine shortly after the magazine hits the streets.

Schroder said the suit probably would be for \$10 million.

Bryant, who is suing the Post about another article, said in a statement issued through attorneys that the charge was "completely false."

Bryant's defending national championship team was a 17-point favorite for the Georgia game played the night of Sept. 22, 1962 in Birmingham. Alabama won 35-0. It was the opening game of the season in which the Crimson Tide won 9 games and lost one. Georgia's 1962 record was 3-4-3.

Coach Johnny Griffith replaced Butts as head coach when Butts became athletic director at Georgia in 1960. Butts, in submitting his resignation, said he was stepping down because of business and personal reasons.

Burnett Testifies

M. Cook Barwick, attorney for the University of Georgia Athletic Board, told United Press International Burnett gave testimony to the board in which he confirmed the alleged telephone conversation between Butts and Bryant.

Barwick said Burnett submitted to a lie detector test and that Butts was offered the opportunity to take a lie detector test and refused.

The world champion New York Yankees scored their second win of the spring by beating the Minnesota Twins, 2-1. The Twins threatened in the ninth but Jim Coates, fourth Yankee pitcher, retired Bernie Allen with the tying run on third.

A six-run sixth-inning rally enabled the Washington Senators to come from behind and top the Chicago White Sox, 9-6. Marv Breeding, Dick Phillips and Jim King hit homers for the Senators while Ken Berry and Dave Nicholson connected for the Sox.

Tigers Nip Braves

Paul Foytack pitched one-hit ball for four innings and hit a homer to pace the Detroit Tigers to a 5-4 triumph over the Milwaukee Braves. Ruben Phillips and Bill Freehan had key doubles for the Tigers and Dennis Menke drove in three runs for the Braves.

Jim Fregosi hit two homers and drove in four runs and Albie Pearson had three singles and a double as the Los Angeles Angels romped over the San Francisco Giants, 10-1. Belinsky went four innings for the Angels and gave up only one hit.

Rob Lillis' eighth-inning single followed two errors and drove in the decisive run of the Houston Astros' 8-7 victory over the Cleveland Indians. Colt outfielder Ellis Burdon drove in three runs with a triple and a homer and Bob Aspromonte knocked in two with a pair of singles.

Homers by Andre Rodgers and Don Landrum were the big blows in the Chicago Cubs' win-plagued 12-11 win over the Boston Red Sox. Billy Gardner had three hits, including a bases-filled triple, for the Red Sox.

John Orsino, acquired in a winter deal with the Giants, made his spring debut and hit two homers to lead the unbeaten Baltimore Orioles to an 11-5 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers in a night game at Miami. Brooks Robinson also drove in four Baltimore runs and Chuck Estrada limited the Dodgers to three hits

BEND — The Merrill Huskies suffered their second loss in as many days in the State Class B Basketball Tournament here Friday afternoon when they fell to the rugged McEwen Scotties, 69-39, in the consolation round of the meet.

The Merrill quintet had lost the opening game on a pair of charity tosses in the final 11 seconds Thursday night to Cascade Locks, 40-47, to kill any hopes of gaining a state tournament title. McEwen, meanwhile, scored a great Lowell team before losing, 50-49.

The Scotties were fired up to win this and then gain the consolation finals as they did. They whipped Corbett Saturday afternoon to gain the consolation championship of the Class B tournament.

The Huskies, who had a terrible time trying to get started in the game Thursday night against Cascade Locks, had the same trouble Friday afternoon and were terribly cold from the field again. McEwen, however, had one of the hottest games of the tournament.

Merrill sank only 17 of 51 field attempts for 32 per cent which was better than the Thursday game. But the Husky defense couldn't stop the great efforts of rugged Mike Shields and Bob McMillan. The Scotties took only 44 shots during the game but connected on 25 of them for an amazing percentage of 56.8. This was the difference.

Shields, who did such a magnificent job on Lowell's 6-9 Dave Bainbridge in Thursday's opener, tallied 20 points against the Huskies, but had to give up scoring honors to teammate McMillan. The 5-10 guard popped the nets for 24 points to lead both teams.
