

Deer Tag Count Slated By Dunsmuir Gun Club

DUNSMUIR—Evaluation of the 1962 deer season in Northern California has been tentatively slated for an all day meeting of the Dunsmuir Rod and Gun Club at the Dunsmuir City Hall, Sunday, March 24.

If the deer tags can be obtained from the state division of fish and game for this annual deer tag count, work will begin at 9 a.m. Paul Carter, club secretary, will have data and charts from previous years on display at the Sunday session.

At a meeting Monday, the club membership voted to work with sportsmen's groups in Shasta, Lassen, Modoc and Tehama counties to draft a uniform recommendation for next year's deer season in Northern California.

The club also voted to broaden its area of interest at the next regular meeting, April 8, when committees on game birds and fishing will be appointed.

The membership endorsed a vigorous campaign to preserve Northern California's dwindling deer herd at Monday's meeting.

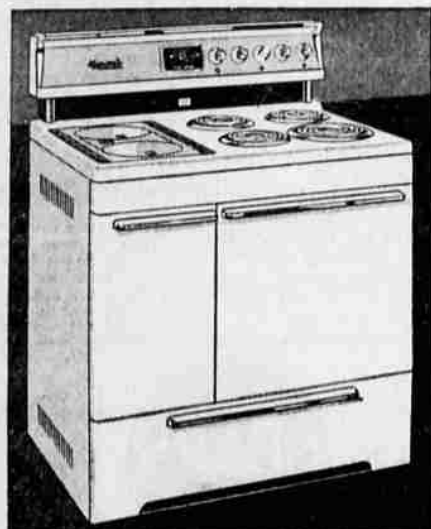
