

State Pushes Tourist Attraction Campaign

"Keep 'em here another day," and the state's economy will be enriched by another \$70 million. This is the theme behind an expanded intra-state tourist promotion program of the Oregon State Highway Department. The department is spearheading a campaign among chambers of commerce, resorts, trade associations and businesses catering to the traveler to encourage the visitor to stay a day longer and see more of Oregon's vacation attractions.

If each of the 9,255,000 motorists visiting Oregon in 1962 had spent one more day here, their increased expenditures would have been more than \$55 million, State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper pointed out. Travelers arriving by bus, train, and plane, if each had spent an extra day here, would have increased this total by another \$15 million, he said.

This is why the Highway Department is increasing its program of co-operation with local chambers and other organizations, urging them to stimulate a local awareness of the importance of the tourist to the state's economy.

The department has an extensive campaign of advertising and promotion to attract these millions of visitors to Oregon. Cooper noted, but it is up to the citizen at the local level to make them welcome and keep them here longer.

The expanded intra-state program will include training programs in the local communities to inform business persons, especially those in the retail and service fields, of the vacation attractions in their areas and in other areas of the state. This information can be used to sell the visitor on staying to enjoy more of the local activities or other vacation highlights in areas he will be traveling through.

The Highway Department is working with the Oregon Chamber of Commerce, an organization of chambers of commerce officials; the Oregon State Motor Association; Oregon Division of Tourism; Oregon Bankers Association; Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association; Oregon Association of Broadcasters; Oregon Motor Hotel Association; Oregon Restaurant and Beverage Association; and Governor Hatfield's Oregon Welcome Committee.

Many private firms also are participating in the plans to welcome out-of-state visitors to Oregon. They include Portland General Savings, Pacific Power & Light Co., Portland General Electric Co., Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co., Northwest Natural Gas Co., United States National Bank of Portland, First National Bank of Oregon, and many others.

As part of the enlarged program, Donald E. Seeley, Salem, has been employed by the Highway Department's Travel Division as a special intra-state co-ordinator for the tourist program. He is working directly with these associations, firms, chambers of commerce, and other groups in plans to encourage visitors to stay longer.

The Highway Department will again provide full-color window posters for use in business windows and similar "tent" cards for display on restaurant tables. These posters and cards will have space for imprinting information on local vacation activities.

The department also is providing color brochures on scenic attractions, camping areas, community events, sports activities, and other activities for distribution by chambers of commerce and other offices.

THE OWL HOOTS



Editor's Note: This week's Owl Hoots column is written by J. L. Churchill, dean, Student Personnel Services, and deals with "The Importance of Counseling and Guidance in Education."

Because of the growing complexity of our society and the technological advances accompanying this growth, decisions are becoming increasingly difficult for young people to make. Also, the parents are beginning to feel less adequate in helping their children to make these decisions. It has long been understood that it is almost futile for parents to "tell" young people what they should do, even though based on the valid and long experience of parents in dealing with such matters. More effective by far seems to be the procedure of developing a relationship wherein the parents help the children to help themselves. Basically and fundamentally this relationship is the crux for a working formula in all counseling whether formal, at the professional level, or informal at the parental or interested-friend level.

The formal level refers to the situation wherein the counselor has had adequate education, training and experience in dealing with relatively complex problems which do not involve deep-seated psychological maladjustments. (These require the attention of a clinical psychologist and/or psychiatrist.) The professional, as referred to here, does have adequate training in dealing with problems of an academic, vocational and superficial psychological nature. His effectiveness is further reinforced by a psychologist who is qualified to administer a variety of objective psychological and educational tests. The counselor also has available for consultation and/or referral doctors with medical and psychological training known as psychiatrists. (Also included are ministers, lawyers, and other specialized personnel.)

While the complexity of our industrial society is responsible for much uncertainty, basics involved in our democratic ideals and attitudes also contribute heavily to the need for counseling services. People have a choice of how much formal education they want, what type of occupation they will pursue, and how they wish to use their leisure time. Very few, if any, would question these three areas of decision as basic human rights. However, we do not always possess all of the information necessary to reach sound conclusions relative to a course of action. Not only do we as individuals lack the necessary personal insight, but parents and friends cannot provide an objective analysis of our abilities, aptitudes, interests, and attitudes on which we may base our decisions.

If professional counseling and guidance procedures were introduced at the elementary level, many of the presently unanswered questions could be reasonably well defined and understood by the individuals before reaching the critical decision-making period. However, this procedure has not yet become a general practice, although it probably will within this decade.

We have progressed to the point where most of the better high schools have recognized the important contributions which properly trained counselors make to the school and community. No longer is the qualified counselor, or counseling staff, viewed as a "fancy frill" or "fringing" on the educational cake. This is a sign of societal maturity. To attend school for school's sake is a very dull existence and our dropout statistics stand as mute proof of the statement. By and large the students who leave school have

no idea as to where they should or could go in the occupational world. Somewhere on this educational continuum, family, school, and society have failed to provide the climate necessary for decision-making on the part of the student.

Where well-developed three year junior high school programs exist much time and effort is spent in defining the student as an individual. Not only is the effort made to help the student understand his strengths and limitations so that he may realistically establish reasonable firm goals, but an equal amount of effort is devoted to helping the parents understand their child's potential so that they have more complete information on which to base the family decisions. As the student matures and progresses educationally, his high school program is planned in accordance with his tentative, but solidly based, educational and occupational goals.

Until relatively recently very little educational decision-making was required. A person either went to high school or college or went to work. If they went to college it was a liberal arts school. Then specialized colleges developed and the university system was established. Teachers colleges developed in the east and this type of education moved westward. Finishing schools and junior colleges sprang up to meet the needs of individuals who wanted education beyond high school but not the four-year program. More recently, the technical institute has developed to provide occupational competence at a level of education lying between the junior college and the four-year professional program; such is the role of Oregon Tech.

Counseling at the college level, particularly in the academic and occupational areas, takes on one of two general responsibilities. It either becomes necessary to cover the ground that should have been covered in the junior high and high school situations resulting in a re-evaluation of aspirations and goals; or counseling assumes the role of adding further refinement to an already adequate job thereby helping to bring about a certain sophistication in direction of goal rather than any major change.

Time and space does not permit the review of specific counseling problems to be found at the level of technical education. It is a relatively new area and not fully understood by prospective students, parents, and in some cases secondary school counselors. The main purpose, at this time, is to establish the basis of the need for an on-going counseling program initiated in the intermediate grades and expanding on through high schools. This would provide for the greatest possible utilization of man power, woman power and brain power. Counseling, on all educational levels, is as it means an exact science. As it now stands, this profession can contribute immeasurably to society by helping to eliminate much of the guess work. It is the financial bargain of the decade. As educational stock, it will pay the biggest dividends and show the greatest growth through more efficient utilization of our human resources.

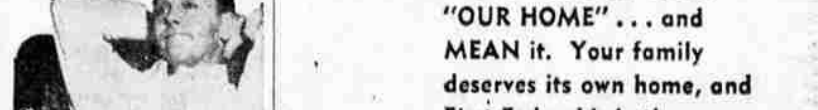
