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King Boy Rejected

ATLANTA (UPI)—Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said Friday night his 5-year-old son had been rejected for admission to the all-white Lovett School here, a private institution with Episcopal Church connections.

The Negro integration leader, a Baptist, said the application of his son, Martin III, was not intended as "any sort of a test case."

"We desired for our son the experience of an integrated school and presumed his acceptance because of the church affiliation," King said.

"It only proves again that the church is often an active participant in perpetuating segregation, serving only as a tailight instead of a headlight."

James M. Sibley, chairman of the executive committee of Lovett, said the school is not officially connected with the church al-

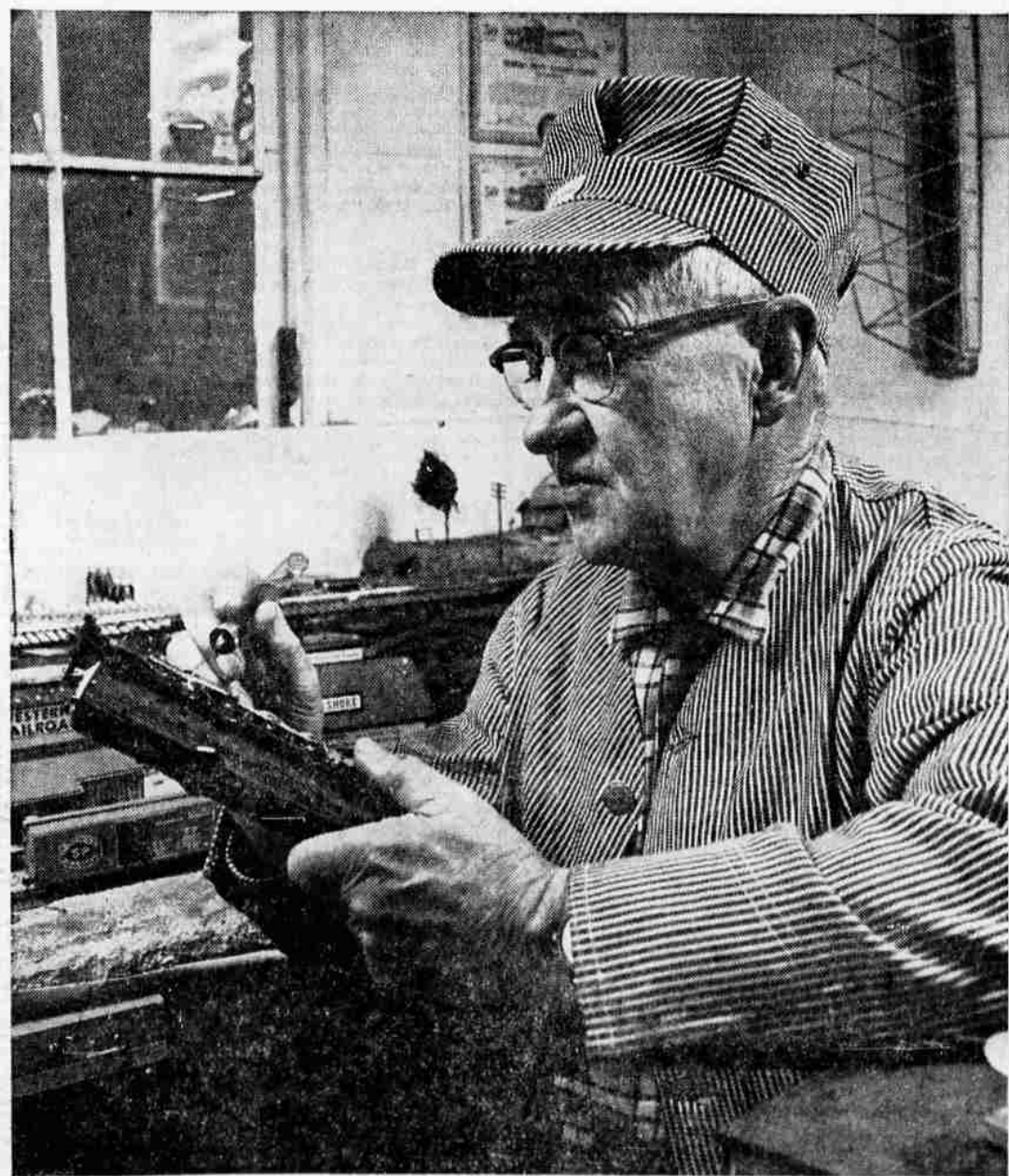
