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## POLLY'S POINTERS

Plans To Save Money

DEAR POLLY—When purchasing a new home, make it a point to try to obtain a set of plans showing basic building construction and the location and specifications for all wiring, gas, water, drainage and sewer pipes. This will be very valuable when there is need for repairs or alterations.

Another of our boy friends with a really farsighted hint.—POLLY. DEAR POLLY—Here is an idea for neighborhood mothers of small children who often play together. Each mother should have a Lost and Found box into which go the boots, mittens, those matchless buttons and belts which we so often find after a play session. Then the mothers can periodically check to see if any of the items were lost by their youngsters.

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Also keep a box in each youngster's drawer for extra matching buttons, pieces of extra material for patches, etc. These can be discarded when the clothing is worn out.—RUTH.

DEAR POLLY—A 12-inch towel rack attached to the back of the baby's high chair is a handy place to keep his washcloth, towel and bib.

An ordinary dish-drying rack makes a neat filing case for a sick child's books and toys. Cray-



ons, pencils, games and cutout books fit nicely in the separate slots.—MRS. A.H.E.

DEAR POLLY—If you have a storage bin for records in your hi-fi, line the bottom with foam rubber to prevent damage. Also if you wish to moisten plants in hanging baskets without making a mess, try using an ice-cube instead of water that would drip through. Saves bother, saves mess.—K.D.

DEAR POLLY—My 12-year-old son suggested I submit this idea which worked so well for him and his friend. When a bicycle inner tube has tiny pin-holes that keep leaking, try condensed milk. Put about two tablespoons of the milk into the inner tube. Thoroughly work it through the tube by hand and inflate with air right away. If you ride your bike immediately it will help distribute the milk which acts as a sealer. After several months, the inner tube is still holding air.—MRS. H.Z.

Boys, this sounds sensible but you will have to try it out for me. I have no leaky inner tube, not even a bike. Anything that will prolong the wear in a tire is certainly worth a try.—POLLY.

DEAR POLLY—My 2-year-old loves to pour out his own dry cereal but used to spill it all over everything. Now I put it in a small canister with a sugar scoop and he "shovels" it into his bowl with far greater success.—MRS. R.B.

NEW YORK (UPI)—If an old stain has penetrated deeply into a piece of wood furniture you are refinishing, ordinary house-

hold bleach used full strength will lighten the wood to the color you want. The National Paint, Varnish & Lacquer Association suggested application of the bleach as many times as necessary to get the color desired.

Next meeting will be March 22. The regional meeting will be April 27 and 28 in Prineville. Klamath Falls officers and drill team will compete.

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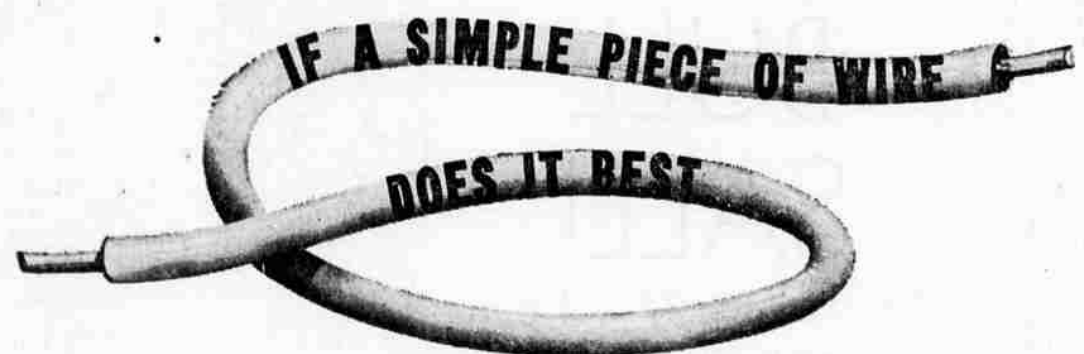
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
