Crash Kills Four Youths

BERLIN, N.J. (UPI) — Four teenagers were killed and six others injured Monday night when their convertible crashed through a guardrail and fell in a tangle of high-tension wires onto railroad tracks.

The victims, three girls and a boy, were dead on arrival at Cooper and Cherry Hill hospitals. They were identified as Dorothy Fitzpatrick, 15; Judith Ann Svinen, 13; Ellen Marren, 15, and Robert F. Shelley, 15, all of Camden.

Police said they could not approach the wrecked car for more than 30 minutes while waiting for the power in the lines to be turned off. They said the auto with its 10 occupants, plunged about 25 feet from the Jackson Road overpass onto the Pennsylvania-Reading Seashore Lines tracks.

The driver of the car, William Hummel, 21, Camden, was admitted to Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital there in serious condition.

Modoc Chamber Hears State Highway Action

ALTURAS — At the monthly meeting of the Modoc Chamber of Commerce March 6 in Alturas, Jim Payne announced the results of a recent hearing before the California Highway Commission.

He said official action is expected on the chamber's request to have the Highway 299 number extended to the Nevada line; to have the commission reaffirm their stand of endorsing the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Highway and negotiate for its completion; and to accelerate the highway construction program in Modoc County in the next two years.

Bill Dieckroger, general manager of the Model Quarter Horse Association, reported on the organization's plans for the future. Construction of the new show arena, grandstands, fencing, and the Horse Motel is progressing as rapidly as manpower and weather conditions will permit, he said.

In other business, the joint effort of the chamber and the MQHA for a large July 4 celebration was reported by the business committee chairman, Phil Woodward. The committee has the tentative plans almost completed and the schedule will be published in the near future. He said numerous civic and service groups in the county will be contacted for assistance and that plans should be made now for floats to be entered in the parade at 10:30 a.m. July 4.

Corny Carstens, chairman of the Fish and Game Committee, reported that many of the controversial aspects of fish and game are under study, but the committee's recommendations will be withheld until completion of the field tour by Congresswoman Pauline Davis and her committee.

The next meeting of the chamber will be held at the Modoc Hotel on April 3.

Dog Hit-Run Bail Forfeit

DORRIS—Walter William Stotenberg, 57, Yakima, Wash., forfeited \$220 bail when he failed to appear before Judge Les Chase March 11 to enter his plea.

Stotenberg had been arrested on March 4 by the California Highway Patrol and taken into court on a charge of hit-run involving a dog. He posted \$220 bail and requested time to consult an attorney. Judge Chase ordered him to appear in court March 11 to enter his plea.

The CHP patrolman reported he had been traveling south on Highway 97 when he came abreast of the American Forest Products Corporation garage and saw a dog spinning on the highway. The patrolman stopped to question men who were standing in front of the shop, and one told the patrolman he had just passed the car that hit the dog, traveling south. The patrolman gave chase, caught the car just inside the Dorris city limits, and took the driver into court immediately, according to the CHP.

Two Answer Liquor Count

DORRIS—Everett Irvin Casey, Casey, 45, Cowitz, Wash., and Cave Junction, Ore., appeared in the Dorris Justice Court Tuesday to answer to charges brought by Siskiyou County Sheriff's deputies of driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Judge Les Chase found Casey had a previous conviction for the same offense and sentenced him to 10 days in the county jail; fined him \$440; and suspended his driver's license for one year.

Edward William Farrington, 37, Eugene, Ore., a passenger in the Casey car, was charged with being intoxicated in a vehicle and throwing a bottle on the highway. Judge Chase fined Farrington \$81.50 or 16 days.

Both men were committed to the Siskiyou County Jail in lieu of the fines.

Senate Told Buyers, Sellers Wearied Of Trick Packaging

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chairman of the National Conference of Weights and Measures said today that many manufacturers would welcome legislation curbing trick packaging.

Carl H. Stender told a Senate subcommittee that many manufacturers are "weary of the merry-go-round," store managers are "disgusted," and housewives are shaking packages and returning them to the store shelf.

The national conference represents state officials who deal with weights and measures. Stender is deputy agriculture commissioner of South Carolina.

Stender and L. V. Ballentine, president of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, both endorsed a bill to protect consumers against deceptive packaging and labeling. Ballentine is North Carolina agriculture commissioner.

Other congressional news: A representative of Pulse, Inc., one of the nation's highest radio rating firms, appears this afternoon before the House Commerce investigating subcommittee. Subcommittee members are expected to ask Pulse about testimony given Monday that it paid little attention to FM stations in its reports, despite the special studies it sold such stations. A witness said his station suffered because advertising agencies would not consider buying time unless either Pulse or the A. C. Nielsen Co. included a station in its report.

Dairy: A House dairy subcommittee began a search for a way of cutting surplus milk production without triggering a battle within the milk industry. Subcommittee Chairman Lester B. Johnson, D-Wis., said he was "hopeful that some area of agreement can be reached by the dairy industry and the dairy state congressmen."

Space: Dr. Werner von Braun told Congress Monday that it had better leave his \$1.3 billion space budget intact if it expects the United States to send a man to the moon in this decade.

Veterans: The House passed legislation that would permit the Veterans Administration to cancel its claims against some veterans who have defaulted on housing loans. The bill would permit the VA to waive the claims when the default "arose out of compelling reasons without fault on the part of the veteran or that collections of the indebtedness would otherwise work a severe hardship upon the veteran."
