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PPL To Sponsor Youth Seminar In Engineering

Pacific Power & Light Company announced this week it will again sponsor an engineering career seminar for teen-age boys as part of the 1963 Junior Engineers' and Scientists' Summer Institute slated for June 9 to 22 at Oregon State University.

Noting that more high school age boys need to learn of the education and training requirements for useful technical and management careers in industry, D. R.
