

Orsino Tags Three In Succession

Pity the poor Los Angeles Dodgers.

They started the spring worry about Sandy Koufax' sore left index finger. Now they're concerned about Tommy Davis' play around third base, which is beginning to stick out like a sore thumb.

Koufax again served notice that he has fully recovered from the circulatory trouble that sidelined him after mid-season last year by piling up 13 strikeouts in seven innings against the Chicago White Sox Monday at Sarasota, Fla.

Davis, though, hardly looked like a Pie Traynor or a Billy Cox. The All-Star left fielder, who is being tested at third base, set up three unearned runs with a wild throw in the third inning that led to a 5-4 victory for the White Sox.

A solo homer in the sixth inning by Deacon Jones provided the White Sox with their winning margin. It was the only earned run they collected off Koufax, who now has looked sharp in three straight spring tuneups.

Back To Outfield?
Dodger Manager Walt Alston may be forced to switch Davis back to his normal outfield post if his erratic fielding starts to affect his hitting. Tommy won the NL batting title last season with a .346 average.

Casey Stengel, who should have such problems, enjoyed one of his rare days in the Florida Sun Monday when he watched his New York Mets blank his old New York Yankees, 1-0, behind the combined five-hit pitching of Roger Craig and Al Jackson at St. Petersburg.

The Mets, held scoreless by Ralph Terry over the first six innings, pushed across the game's only run off Hal Reniff in the seventh on a hit batsman, an infield out, an error by Tony Kuback and a single by Larry Burright.

Three Consecutive Homers
Catcher John Orsino, obtained from the San Francisco Giants in an off-season deal, hit three consecutive home runs off lefty Jim

O'Toole to give the unbeaten Baltimore Orioles their ninth straight victory — a 4-3 decision over the Cincinnati Reds at Tampa.

Orsino's first homer came in the third inning after a double by Jerry Adair. He hit No. 2 in the fifth frame and No. 3 in the seventh before fouling out off rookie lefty John Flavin in the ninth.

In Monday's other exhibitions, the Detroit Tigers downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-3; the Milwaukee Braves outlasted the Washington Senators, 1-0, in 11 innings; the Cleveland Indians walloped the Chicago Cubs, 16-6; the Los Angeles Angels whipped the Boston Red Sox, 7-1; the Houston Colts outslugged the Giants, 14-3; the Philadelphia Phillies needed 13 innings to defeat the Minnesota Twins, 6-3; and the Pittsburgh Pirates battled the Kansas City Athletics to a 12-inning, 4-4 tie.

Fourth Straight Victory
The Tigers scored their fourth straight victory on home runs by Rocky Colavito, Norm Cash and Gus Triandos after spotting the Cardinals five runs in the first inning. Bob Anderson, who pitched one-hit ball for three innings, raised his spring record to 3-0.

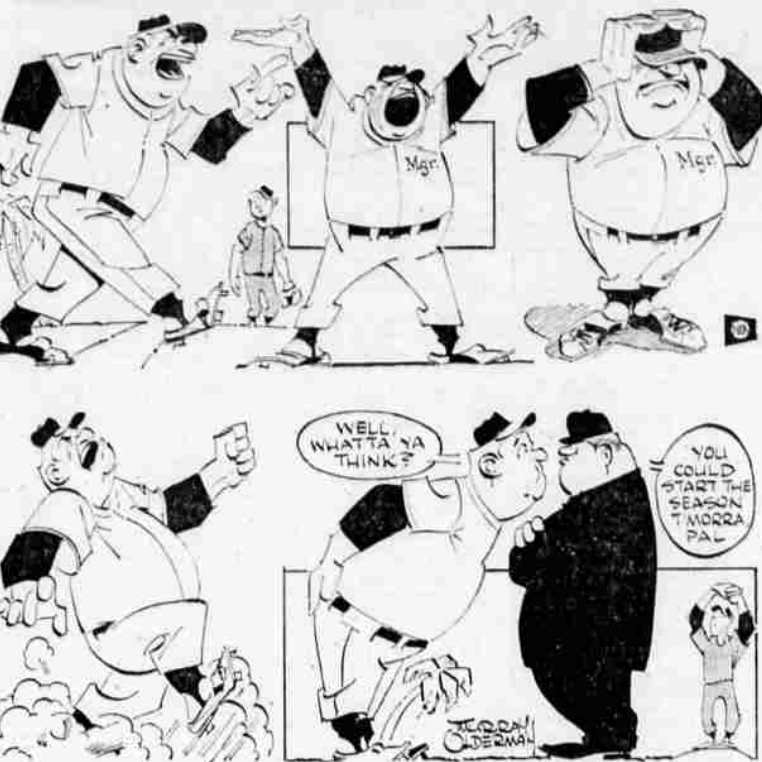
Singles by Norm Larker and Mack Jones and catcher Ken Retzer's error produced the Braves' winning run against the Senators. Eddie Mathews paced a nine-hit Milwaukee attack with two doubles.

The Indians mauled four Cub pitchers for 16 hits, including a homer by Tito Francona and triples by John Romano, Tony Martinez and Gene Green. Rookie outfielder Nelson Mathews had two homers and a single for the Cubs.

The Angels collected all of their runs and 10 of their 11 hits off Boston starter Bill Monbouquette. Bill Ripney's sluggers now have scored 37 runs on 41 hits in their last three games.

Chico Rojas' first home run since 1961 earned the Phillies their marathon victory over the Twins. Bob Allison pushed Minnesota ahead, 5-2, in the fifth inning with a three-run homer. The Colts scored 12 times in the

Detroit Wins Olympic Bid

NEW YORK (UPI) — Gov. George Romney of Michigan and Mayor Jerome Cavanagh of Detroit expressed confidence today that a "total effort" in money and manpower will convince the International Olympic Committee Monday that must still be approved by the international committee, which also will study bids from Mexico City, Buenos Aires, Lausanne, and Lyons, France.

Last Held In 1932
The Olympics have not been staged in the United States since 1932 when they were held in Los Angeles — one of the four cities which competed with Detroit Monday for the honor of being named the U.S. candidate for 1968. The IOC adopted a rule in 1950 that only one city from a country may bid for an Olympiad — and it must have the approval of its National Olympic Committee.

Informed sources say the IOC is inclined to select a non-United States city as the site for the 1968 Olympics but Gov. Romney and Mayor Cavanagh believe Detroit will make the best presentation to the IOC when it meets in Nairobi, Kenya, next October. "No U.S. city is better known through the world than Detroit," said Gov. Romney. "We believe we will get the IOC bid."

"We are optimistic," said Mayor Cavanagh. "As soon as I return to Detroit I will again call upon our citizens' committee which we have created and detail our plans for making the best possible presentation to the International Olympic Committee."

To Ask Federal Help
"I'll also be calling upon our federal government representatives in Washington to assist us in making this presentation so we can be sure to bring the games to the United States in 1968," Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson, president of the U.S. Olympic Committee, also was optimistic.

"I'm optimistic about getting the Olympic Games for the United States for 1968," said Wilson. "The committee members agreed to make a concerted effort to bring the Olympics to the U.S."

Wilson revealed that the 40-man Olympic committee gave 32 of its votes to Detroit. Los Angeles received four votes, Portland two and San Francisco and Philadelphia one each.

Liston's Injury Examined

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — If Sonny Liston uses his knee as a reason for a second postponement of his heavyweight title fight with Floyd Patterson, he'd better be ready to sit still for an examination by a Miami Beach Boxing Commission doctor.

Commission Chairman Fred Aaronson said Monday he would not accept the examination of doctors in Chicago, where Liston went Sunday after apparently breaking up his training camp here.

"We have the right to examine the fighter, and under the contract we have the right to name the time and place for that examination," said Aaronson, whose commission contracted for the fight with the promoters and the fighters.

Representatives of champion Liston, ex-champion Patterson and Championship Sports, Inc., the promoting organization, are due to meet Wednesday to talk over the next step. No place or time has been set, however.

The fight first had been scheduled for April 4 at the Miami Beach Convention Hall, then was moved to April 10 because of Liston's trouble with his right knee, which he sprained posing with a golf club for a photographer.

The knee apparently buckled under the 225-pound-plus champion while he was working out last week.

While the hoopla over the fight went on, Patterson kept on training at his camp, set up at Tropical Park racetrack in Miami. He said he had signed up to fight Liston at Miami Beach and planned to keep it that way.

"Under the terms of the contract, I have the right to name the fight site. I've said it would be Miami Beach and I am prepared to wait for Liston here. This is as good a fight town as any," said the ex-champ.

He also pointed out that under the return contract he could get up to \$1 million of Liston's future purses if Liston fought anywhere else ahead of Patterson.

St. Louis Team Retains Lead In ABC Tourney

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — The Falstaff Beer team of St. Louis, rated one of the top quintets in the country, failed to deliver in the American Bowling Congress tournament Monday night and settled for fourth place in the classic team division with 6,067.

Led by Ronnie Gaudern's three, game 670, the Falstaffs added 3,098 Monday night to the 2,969 compiled Sunday.

Still holding the lead in the classic division is United Van Lines of St. Louis with 6,210.

In the regular team division, First Federal Savings of Fort Wayne, Ind., moved into fifth place with 3,090. Bus Oswald's 682 led the Indiana bowlers.

In the classic singles Monday, Harry Smith of Falstaffs shot the highest individual game in two years in ABC competition—a 296—but fell off in his last two games to end with a 690 series and seventh place in the division.

Robert Raymond of Buffalo took third place in the regular singles with 715. Still leading the division is Jim Snodell of St. Louis with 727.

In the classic doubles, Al Savas and Gaudern of St. Louis placed 10th with 1,273.

\$10 Million Suit In Football Fix Magazine Article

ATLANTA (UPI) — An attorney for former Georgia Athletic Director Wally Butts Monday night demanded that the Saturday Evening Post retract and correct an article entitled "The Story of a Football Fix" in its current publication.

The lawyer, William H. Schroder Jr., also requested the magazine in a telegram to print an editorial specifically repudiating the article which accuses Butts and Alabama football coach Paul (Bear) Bryant of conspiring to rig the 1962 Georgia-Alabama game.

Schroder said, however, that he will file a libel suit, probably for \$10 million, against the Post regardless of any subsequent action in the matter by the magazine. He said the telegram was a formality required by Georgia law as a basis for seeking punitive action.

Quotes Insurance Man
Both Butts, who resigned last month to end a 25-year era at Georgia, and Bryant have denied the allegation in the March 23rd edition of the Post. The article said George Burnett, an Atlanta insurance man, through some

communications freak, was cut into a long distance telephone conversation between Butts and Bryant last Sept. 14. Burnett, according to the article, said he heard Butts giving Georgia's offensive plays and other strategy for the Sept. 22 game which Alabama won 35-0.

Burnett said Monday he was motivated only by "an impulsive desire that the truth be known" when he revealed the alleged telephone conversation, and he felt the "truth will be eventually told in full" after an investigation.

Investigations Under Way
A number of investigations were under way, Georgia Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook began a probe Monday; the FBI said it has made "preliminary inquiries"; and a spokesman said the Senate subcommittee would look into the matter.

Commissioner Bernie Moore of the Southeastern Conference (SEC) also was conducting an investigation. The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) said it was awaiting word from Moore.

"We have been in close communication with the commissioner of the SEC, who had the report under investigation for some time," said Walter Byers, executive director of the NCAA. "For the present, we have no further comment to make."

Alabama Atty. Gen. Richmond Flowers said the Post article "is not sufficient to warrant an investigation" by his office.

Redskins Get Johnny Sample

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Washington Redskins, seeking to plug their porous secondary, today acquired defensive halfback Johnny Sample from the Pittsburgh Steelers for an undisclosed high draft choice.

Sample, a five-year veteran of the National Football League, originally played for the Baltimore Colts and went to the Steelers in 1961. The six-one, 205-pounder was injured most of last season but at one time was rated one of the finest wingbacks in the NFL.

"The secondary was a trouble spot for us last year," Redskins Coach Bill McPeak said. "I thought Sample was the best defensive back in the league with the Colts in 1961 and he should help us plenty."

Ducks Win 2-0 Over California

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — The University of Oregon, behind the tight five-hit hurling of Robbie Snow, defeated California 2-0 Monday and in the process stored the first run off Bear Pitcher Dave Dowling in the 27 innings he's pitched this season.

It was the Webfoots' first game of the year. Cal is now 10-3 in the season.

The teams meet again today.
