

Lary's Arm Worries Tigers

Manager Bob Schefling of the Detroit Tigers claims "we'll beat those damn Yankees" if Al Kaline and Frank Lary shake off 1962 injuries.

The Bengal boss can stop worrying about Kaline, who missed 62 games last season because of a fractured collar bone but still managed to hit .304, slug 23 home runs and knock in 94 runs.

In an exhibition game against the Los Angeles Dodgers Tuesday at Lakeland, Fla., Kaline raised his spring average to .382 by collecting four singles in an 8-3 romp. It was the Tigers' fifth victory in a row and raised their exhibition record to 7-4.

Lary, though, is another matter. Hampered by a sore shoulder last season, the veteran right-hander won only two games after his big 1961 campaign when he posted a 2-9 record. In two outings this spring, Lary has given up 11 hits and six runs in six innings.

Takes \$5,000 Cut

The rugged Alabamian was so concerned about his ability to bounce back that he agreed not to sign his 1963 contract until he was sure of his condition. He finally came to terms Tuesday, accepting a \$5,000 cut to \$35,000.

"I know I haven't pitched too good in the exhibitions but my arm hasn't hurt at all," Lary told General Manager Jim Campbell, who said he was convinced that Frank was throwing with a free and easy motion.

The Baltimore Orioles, who also have grown tired of chasing the Yankees in the American League pennant races, extended their unbeaten exhibition record to 10 games Tuesday by edging the Chicago White Sox, 4-3, at Sarasota, Fla.

Luis Aparicio tripled to touch off a three-run explosion against his former White Sox teammates in the first inning. The Orioles picked up their winning run in the third on singles by Brooks Robinson and Jim Gentile and a wild pitch. Steve Barber hurled the first seven innings for Baltimore, allowing two runs and six hits while fanning six.

Yankees Lose Another

The Yankees, who can't win for losing, dropped a 9-3 verdict to the Kansas City Athletics. It was the world champions' eighth loss in 11 tuneups. Rookie Dick Green hit a pair of homers and Jose Tartabull and Chuck Essegian added single clouts to pace the A's to their seventh victory in 10 games.

A run-scoring single by Norm Larker in the ninth inning earned the Milwaukee Braves a 7-6 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Hank Aaron hit his first spring homer for the Braves and Bob Skinner collected a single, double and triple for the Bucs.

The Cincinnati Reds overcame homers by Zola Versalles (2) and Tony Oliva (1) in downing the Minnesota Twins, 3-4. Young Jerry Arrigo gave up all the Cincinnati runs, including a two-

home by catcher Johnny Edwards.

Veteran southpaw Curt Simmons became the first member of the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff to work six innings in a 7-3 victory over the New York Mets. Curt Flood hit a homer and a double while Bill White cracked a double and two singles to pace the Cards' attack.

Indians Clobber Colts

The Cleveland Indians collected 18 hits but no homers in clobbering the Houston Colts, 13-3. Eight of Cleveland's runs came off Cliff Davis in the first three scoreless innings for the Tribe.

Ken McBride, hampered by pleurisy and a cracked rib last season, allowed only two hits during a six-inning stint as the Los Angeles Angels whipped the Boston Red Sox, 5-1. Lee Thomas again paced the Angels' attack with a homer and a run-scoring single.

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3-2 triumph over the San Francisco Giants. Southpaw Dick Ellsworth set the pace for the Cub hurlers by fanning seven in the first three innings. Ernie Banks, who had homered in the second inning, scored the winning run on an error by the Giants' Jose Pagan in the sixth.

The winners collected two runs in the third frame when Cal pitcher Mike Jauregui walked four batters and then allowed a hit. The Ducks tallied twice again in the fifth on an error, two singles and a double. They scored in the sixth on two walks and a single.

The Bears, hitless for seven and two-thirds innings, scored on three singles in the eighth and on a home run by Mike Epstein in the ninth.

The St. Louis Hawks and the Detroit Pistons open their portion of the National Basketball Association playoffs in St. Louis tonight, and both clubs will be trying to emulate Syracuse's last break in the league's Eastern Division.

St. Louis, which finished second in the Western Division, is favored to turn back the Pistons in their best-of-five series, largely because of the all-important home court edge. If the series is extended to the full five games, three of them will be played in St. Louis.

Syracuse had a tougher fight than expected before downing the Cincinnati Royals, 123-120, on its home court Tuesday night. Hal Greer scored 32 points for the Nats and veteran Dolph Schayes contributed what Coach Alex Hannum called his "finest game of the season" to make the Syracuse win possible.

The game was tied 21 times before the Royals broke to an 80-72 lead early in the third period. Cincinnati nursed its advantage into the final quarter before Greer and Schayes rallied the Nats ahead for good. Greer finished with a game high of 32 points and Schayes added 17 in addition to some key assists and interceptions.

Oscar Robertson, who played the entire 48 minutes, paced the Royals with 29 points. The second game of the Eastern Division series will be staged Thursday night at Cincinnati with the teams returning to Syracuse on Saturday. The winner then qualifies to meet the Boston Celtics for the division title.

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Lopez Feels White Sox Have Good Chance To Take Yanks

SARASOTA, Fla. (UPI) — Manager Al Lopez maintains his Chicago White Sox "will be all right" in 1963.

He even thinks they can win the American League pennant. "It depends on my pitching and the left side of my infield," he says. "If it is going to be as good as I think it is, we'll beat the Yankees."

He isn't finding many baseball people agreeing with him, but there is one thing to remember. The Yankees have been beaten only twice since he started managing in the league in 1951 and both times Lopez did it — first with the Cleveland Indians in 1954

and again with the White Sox in 1959. "I can't see any reason why I can't do it a third time — this year," he insists.

No Big Names
One thing he does admit is that his club does not have any big-name power hitters.

"But we have fellows who can swing the ball pretty hard," he adds. He expects that sting to come from outfielders Jim Landis, Mike Hersherberger and Floyd Robinson, infielders Joe Cunningham, Nellie Fox, Ron Hansen and rookie Pete Ward and catchers Camillo Carreon and Sherm Lollar.

For pitching he is banking on Ray Herbert, Juan Pizarro, Joe Horlen, John Buzhardt and rookie Dave DeBusschere as starters with Frank Baumann, Eddie Fisher, Dom Zanni and Jody Wilhelm behind them.

"A lot depends on DeBusschere," he points out. "He is going to make it big and it could be this year."

Bonus Baby
DeBusschere is the high priced bonus baby from the University of Detroit, who won 10 games while losing only one with Savannah last season. Only trouble is he isn't in camp for he still is playing out his professional baseball contract with the Detroit Pistons.

"But we hope he will be ready soon after the season opens," says Lopez.

He'd better be, or Lopez may fall short on pitching. He is banking a lot on Ward, who was obtained from the Baltimore Orioles along with Hansen, Wilhelm and outfielder Dave Nicholson for shortstop Luis Aparicio and Al Smith.

"You don't give up players like Aparicio and Smith without getting full value in return," he points.

"We've been weak at third base and in the bullpen and we think we have plugged those holes with Ward and Wilhelm. We think Hansen, with a stronger bat, will help us more than Aparicio. And I still think that one day Nicholson is going to be a great hitter."

The reports on Ward, who hit

329 at Rochester last season, are good. Hansen had a fine year when he came up with the Orioles in 1960 but last year he batted only .173. Fox, at 35, coming to the end of the road. Cunningham hit .295 last season.

Had Off Season
Landis, a fine glove man, had an off season with the bat, hitting .228. Hersherberger batted .260, Robinson .312. As for the catchers, Carreon hit .256 and the slow footed Lollar .268.

Herbert was a 20 game winner last season. Pizarro won 12, Horlen seven and Buzhardt eight. Baumann was 7-6, Fisher 9-3, Zanni 6-5 and Wilhelm 7-10 with the Orioles.

Lopez also has Early Wynn, the 43-year-old right hander who is trying to stay on another year in an effort to score his 300th victory. Herb Score, whom Lopez still has hopes for; Gary Peters and Taylor Phillips, the former Braves southpaw on trial here.

For reserves there are infielders Charley Smith, Sam Esposito and rookie Al Nelson while Charley Maxwell and Wilhelm figure to be the reserve outfielders.

It could be like Lopez says, that his club will be "all right," but those two things he is depending upon — pitching and the left side of his infield — could be found wanting.

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
