ALTURAS—Due to the tremendous success of his appearance in Alturas last year, the American Association of University Women will again bring Philip Hanson's one-man performance of contemporary drama to Alturas. He will appear in "My Name is Aram" by William Saroyan, Saturday, March 23, at 8 p.m. in the Modoc Union High School auditorium.

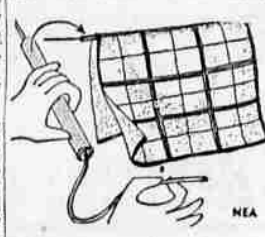

DEAR POLLY—Before hanging up wet blankets, string cardboard tubes (from paper towels, waxed paper, etc.) on your clothesline. Hang the blankets over them to prevent a line mark on the dried blanket.—MRS. W. G. S.

umn I would like the pleasure of being a donor as well as a recipient. I do lots of knitting and find that hand-made articles are usually outgrown or out of style before the yarn shows any sign of wear. Many people are unaware that yarn can be restored. To reuse wool from an old article



(handmade only) rip the garment and wind the yarn loosely into balls. Wind it around stiff cardboard cut to about 8 by 18 inches. Tie the skein at each end with a length of yarn and then slip off the cardboard. Wash the skeins

as you would a sweater. Place them on a flat surface to dry. Do not hang up.—A. Y. C.
