Probers Predict 'Enormous Errors' In Costs Of Controversial Plane

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate committee investigating the controversial award of the \$6.5 billion TFX fighter plane contract has promised new disclosures of "enormous errors" in cost estimates of the plane.

Jerome Alderman, chief counsel for the Senate investigations subcommittee, told newsmen that errors uncovered by his staff could be "very, very damaging" to the Defense Department's decision to award the contract to General Dynamics.

The panel is investigating whether political favoritism was involved in the award. It contends that evidence so far indicates the Boeing Co. submitted a superior design at a lower bid than General Dynamics.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara told newsmen after appearing before the committee Thursday that a thorough review of the award during the last three months, "leads me to an even firmer view that the program should properly be assigned to General Dynamics."

Other congressional news: **Ducks:** The leader of the Republican drive to cut \$6 billion from President Kennedy's budget today suggested the government spend an extra \$20 million to insure that hunters don't run out of ducks. Rep. Ben F. Jensen, R-Iowa, assuring reporters he was not being inconsistent, said the funds would come from proceeds from the sale of duck stamps.

Minnesota Governor Mulls Plan

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — Republican Gov. Elmer L. Andersen pondered today whether to give up and let Democrat Karl Rolvaag have the Minnesota governor's chair.

Key Republicans urged Andersen to fight—to appeal to the State Supreme Court for a special runoff election.

A cry went up from Democrats and Republican Mayor George J. Vavoulis of St. Paul for Andersen to step aside gracefully and let Rolvaag move from his "broom closet" office in the capitol basement into the plush executive suite.

Andersen, who holds office under state law until a successor qualifies, huddled with his attorneys and said "I will have further comment in the afternoon."

One of the reasons both parties are contesting the election so intensely and bitterly is that Minnesota's first four-year gubernatorial term is at stake. A recent constitutional amendment increased the term from two years.

Andersen won in the original canvass after the Nov. 6 election by 142 votes. But Rolvaag, former lieutenant governor, demanded a recount.

A three-judge tribunal declared late Thursday after a four-month election recount battle that Rolvaag, 49, had been "duly elected" by 91 votes.

Rolvaag can't take office immediately. Andersen by law has 10 days to decide whether to appeal.

Cardinal Excluded In Amnesty

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) — Informed observers said today a sweeping amnesty in Communist Hungary is unlikely to result in immediate freedom for Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty.

Mindszenty, the Roman Catholic primate of Hungary, has been under asylum in the U.S. Legation in Budapest since Russian troops and tanks crushed the "freedom fighter" rebellion of 1956.

Hungarian Premier and Communist Party boss Janos Kadar proclaimed the amnesty Thursday, with the new parliament giving it unanimous approval.

The amnesty provisions exclude the cardinal. But Kadar said those not covered in the general proclamation might be given their freedom if they apply for "mercy" on an individual basis.

Mindszenty was sentenced in 1949 to life in prison on charges of treason, espionage and black marketeering. He was freed briefly by the 1956 revolution but he sought refuge in the U.S. legation.

Observers here said it was unlikely the prelate, who will be 71 years old next Friday, would make an appeal to the Communist regime.

There have been unconfirmed reports that the Vatican and the Soviet Union were moving toward obtaining Mindszenty's freedom following the recent visit to Pope John XXIII by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's son-in-law, Alexei I. Adzhubei.

Shortly after Adzhubei returned to Moscow, Franz Cardinal Rognig of Austria began preparing for a trip to Hungary. There was speculation the Hungarians, prompted by the Russians, might give Mindszenty safe conduct to go to Rome.

In addition to the cooking school, various Klamath Falls merchants and product wholesalers will have displays.

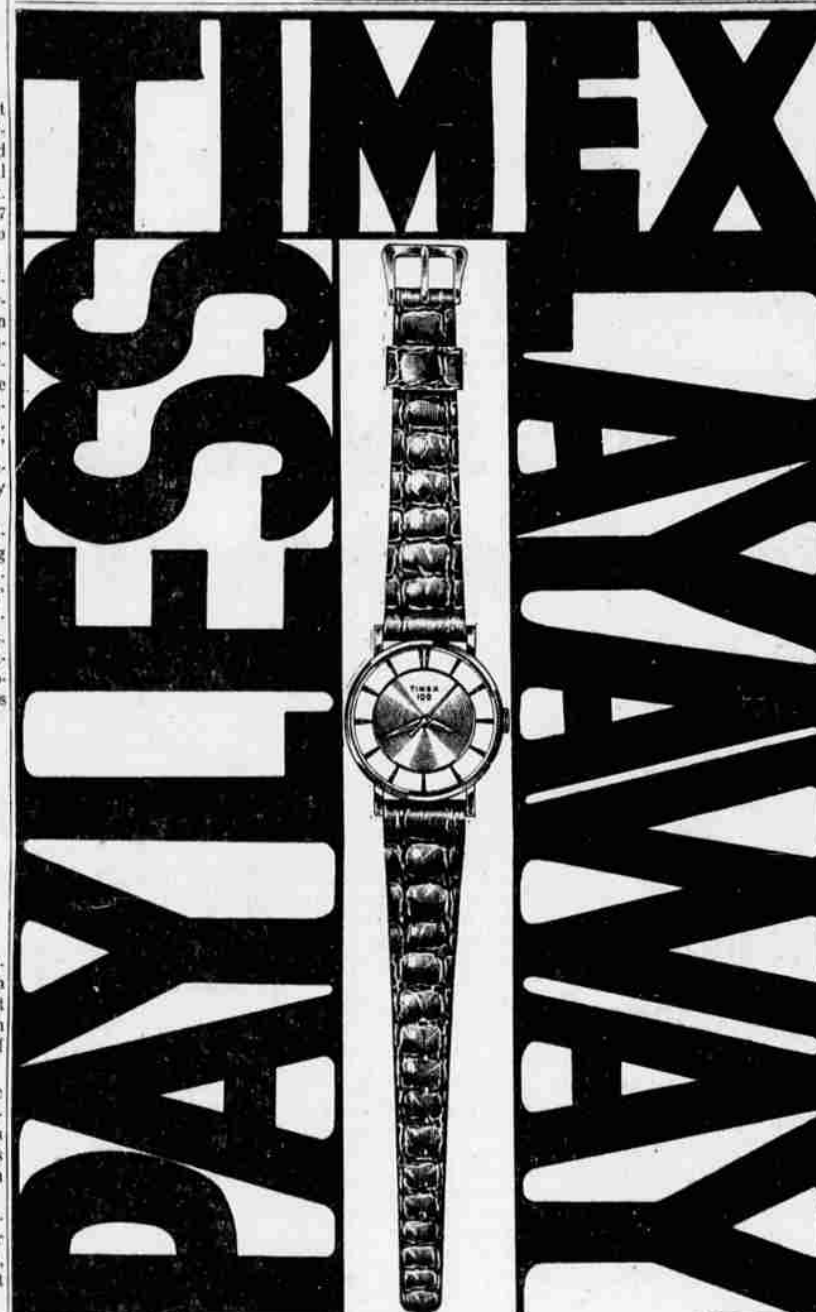
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
