Providence Whips Canisius For NIT Championship, 81-66

NEW YORK (UPI) — Slim Jim Stone, known to his teammates as "the best one-legged basketball player in America," and dead-eye Ray Flynn led Providence to its second National Invitation Tournament championship in three years Saturday with an 81-66 victory over Canisius.

A sellout crowd of 18,409 at Madison Square Garden and a national television audience watched Providence spurt late in the first half to take a 41-32 lead at the intermission and then pull steadily away during the second half with a brilliant 14 for 28 shooting performance.

Stone, a 6-foot-2 Cleveland boy who transferred in Providence from Grambling (La.) College and plays on a gimpy left knee, scored 23 points and Flynn 20, 14 of these in the second half, to help the Friars repeat the N.I.T. championship they scored in 1961.

Two other important men in the Providence triumph were 6-foot-11 center John Thompson, who scored 10 of his 15 points during the first half to keep the Friars ahead, and 5-foot-8 Vinnie Ernst, who made 10 assists.

Most Valuable

Flynn, a 6-foot sharpshooter from Boston, was voted the tournament's "most valuable player" award for his superb performance in Providence's victories over Miami (Fla.), Marquette, in those three games.

Red Foxes Grab Third Place Title

CHILQUIN — The Toppenish Papooses, playing with the precision of a well-oiled watch, marched past the Warm Springs Magpies in the Chilquin gym here Saturday night to win the National Indian Championship, 94-74.

The Chilquin Red Foxes surprised in the tournament and came out with third place by whipping Lapwai, Idaho, 87-63, in the afternoon game for the third place trophy.

The game belonged to the Washington Papooses all the way. They vaulted to a 25-11 first period lead behind the fantastic shooting of Larry Ramsey. He led them the entire game and scored higher than any other player in the tournament with a 35-point effort in the championship game.

The Papooses got off to a quick start on two baskets by Ramsey in the first 1:24 of the game. The game was never evened. Toppenish ran into a 15-11 lead with 2:45 left in the first period when they went on a scoring spree to tally 10 points in the final 2:45 of the period for the 25-11 lead.

It was more of the same in the second period. Center Ron Olney got hot for the Papooses in this period with 11 points while Ramsey cooled off with seven. The Papooses tallied 28 points and Warm Springs, still cold, got 17 and the half ended with the Papooses enjoying a 33-28 lead.

The Magpies began to make a game out of it in the third period. Mike Clements began to hit long jump shots with regularity to give rise to hopes for the Magpies. They popped the nets for 20 points while the Papooses cooled off to only 15. Clements hit 10 points, Jim Macy and Howard Buas six each in the period to lead the charge. The Papooses still led going into the fourth frame, 68-56. Ramsey got eight of the 15 for Toppenish.

Warm Springs continued to apply the pressure in the opening minutes of the fourth with Clements and Lyle Rhoads hitting two charity shots apiece to slice the margin to 10 points, 70-60. Olney and Clements exchanged baskets before Joe Cleveland returned to the game for Toppenish to lead the fast break which broke the game wide open.

Cleveland, teamed with Olney, Dave Benedict, Clay Anderson and Ramsey to score 17 straight points to take an 89-62 lead with 4:50 left and the game was all over but the shooting.

The Toppenish team had virtually all the board control, both on offense and defense with high jumping Benedict, Ramsey and Olney clearing them.

In addition to Ramsey's 35 points, Olney and Cleveland hit for 18 each and Anderson tallied 13. Clements finished with 23 for Warm Springs while Rhoads had 14, 10 from the line, and Norm Redbird netted 12.

John McCutcheon and Tony Wilder led the Red Foxes to third place. McCutcheon tallied 29 points and Wilder 27. Jess McCutcheon also was in doubles with 18. The Red Foxes hit an amazing 100 per cent from the foul line with 19 out of 19.

Ed Madsen led the Lapwai team with 18 points. Jess Tilden had 17 and Buzz Nelson 13.

Strangely enough, Toppenish placed only one player on the 10-man All-Tournament team in Olney. He also was chosen the Most Valuable Player. The other nine players were: Madsen, Lapwai; Norm Johns and DeMerle Lytle of Sprague River; John McCutcheon, Red Foxes; Olney; Howard Buas and Clements of Warm Springs; Gordon Frazier and John Martin of Fallon; and Ed Case of Carrol Shadley.

Lapwai and the Chilquin Red Foxes won morning games to gain the consolation finals. Lapwai whipped the Cinderella Shadley Thunderbirds, 81-69, and the Red Foxes topped the Fallon, Nev., quintet, 86-74.

Buzz Nelson, led the Silver Chiefs from Nevada with 26 points. He had ample backing from Roach Wilson with 15, Ed Madsen and Jess Tilden with 11 and Butch Burke with 10. Ed Case again paced the T-Birds with 29 points. He had 29 Friday to lead the upset over the defending champion Sprague River Ducks.

Norman Jackson was the only other one in doubles for the T-Birds with 12. Lapwai led at the half, 44-34.

The Red Foxes had four players in double figures with John McCutcheon leading the way with 29 points. Irwin Red Fox had 17 and high schooler Tony Wilder matched McCutcheon with 19 markers. Ron Owings earned 15.

Fallon was paced by Larry Manning with 29 points. Gordon Frazier netted 16, John Martin 12 and Erman Blossom had 10. The Red Foxes had a seven point lead at intermission, 41-34.

EUGENE (UPI) — Medford's Black Tornado overcame an eight-point halftime deficit to defeat Grants Pass 64-54 to capture fourth place in the Oregon High Tournament Saturday.

Medford trailed 33-25 at half time but stormed back to take a 44-45 lead at the end of three quarters. Big Jack Forde, a 6-4 senior center, led the way for the Black Tornado with 19 points.

Forwards Jim Hill and Rich Benford added 11 and 12 points, respectively, for the winners.

For Grants Pass, Jim Pippin scored 20 points and picked off 15 rebounds and Alan Hutchins tallied 16 points.

Marshall of Portland, with Nick Jones scoring 21 points and Stan Koltch contributing 15 points and 14 rebounds, downed South Salem 55-39 to win consolation honors. The Portland school led 27-25 at halftime. South Salem's Gary Allen hit 12 points.

The Pelicans will play Yreka next Friday evening.

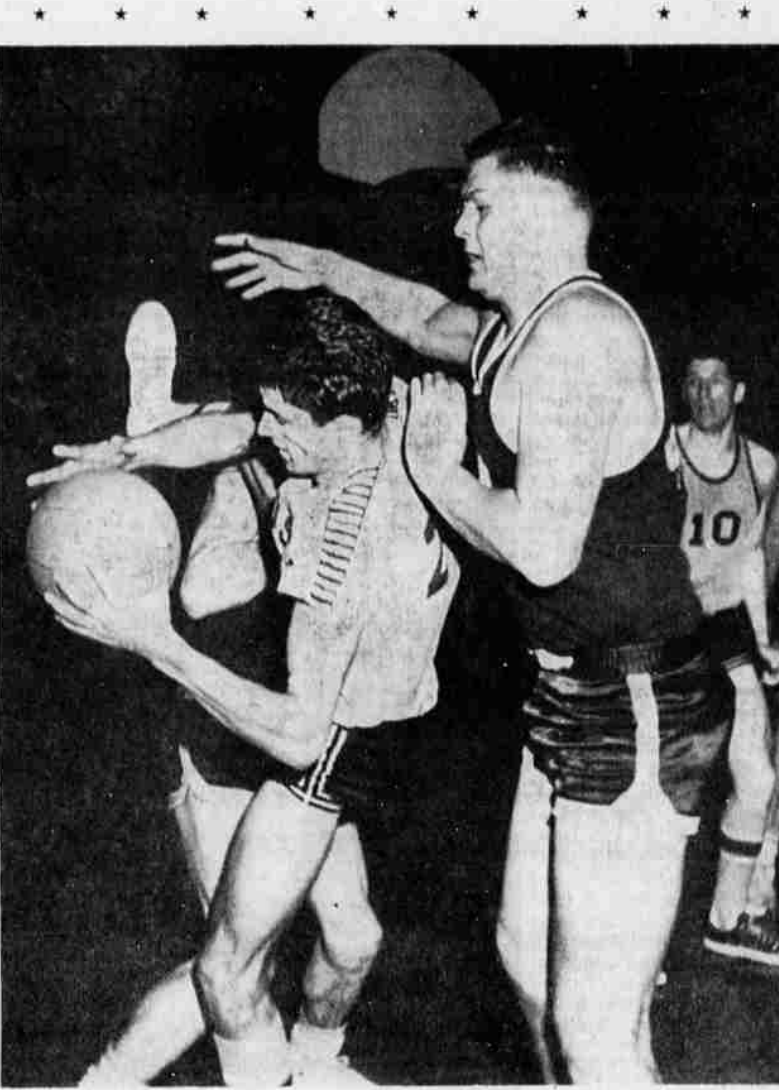

Pastrano, Thornton Fight To 10-Round Draw In Bout

NEW YORK (UPI) — Light heavyweight contender Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach and Wayne Thornton of Bakersfield, Calif., fought to a 10-round nationally televised draw Saturday night in their return bout at Madison Square Garden.

Pastrano's stronger finish and the award of the fourth round to him on a foul by referee Arthur Mercante enabled dancing Willie to get an even break with blond Thornton in the bouts of the two judges Bill Recht and Leo Birnbaum, each of whom gave five rounds and five points to each fighter.

The referee disagreed. He voted for Thornton, who had won an upset decision over Pastrano in their previous fight at the Garden last Feb. 9.

Gives Thornton Five

Referee Mercante Saturday night gave Thornton five rounds and Pastrano four. He called one even. But the majority vote cast by the two judges made the decision a draw.

The United Press International gave each fighter five rounds but favored Thornton on points, 8-5, because of Thornton's big rounds in the second, fifth and seventh.

Thornton, a very aggressive hooking specialist, who uses combinations of rights to the body and left hooks to the head with good effect, jackedknifed Pastrano five times in the second round with body smashes and knocked him into the ropes with a left hook to the head.

Willie came back and hurt Wayne in the third with a left hook and battered him in a corner. In the fourth, Thornton resumed his attack but landed two low rights to the body and lost that round on a foul.

Mouthpiece Flys

Thornton sent Pastrano's mouthpiece flying across the ring with a left hook in the fifth and gave Willie a battering, Pastrano rallied in the sixth with a close-quarter attack, but Thornton's combinations were superior in the seventh and eighth. Willie's swift-hitting and stamina took the ninth and 10th.

There were no knockdowns. Pastrano's left cheek was swollen at the finish and Thornton's nose began to bleed in the sixth.

Both fighters weighed the same this time, 175 1/2 pounds, whereas Pastrano had been 176 to Wayne's 175 on Feb. 9. In that February bout, Thornton scored his ninth straight victory and his 27th in 29 bouts. He received his first draw Saturday night.

But it was draw No. 8 for 20-year-old Pastrano, who has won 57 of his 75 bouts and lost 11. The crowd was estimated at 4,000.

Jack and Jim Dalton, who claim to be direct descendants of the famous outlaw gang, are from Kansas City. They wear a big assortment of cowboy clothes along with real 35 revolvers. They will give an exhibition of the fancy gun handling in the ring before the match. Jack will challenge anyone in the area to a fast draw contest and promoter Elton Owen will offer \$10 prize to the winner.
