

Shadley Upsets Ducks In Losers' Bracket

CHILQUIN — The Warm Springs Magpies and Toppenish, Wash., Paposes gained the finals of the National Indian Tournament here with easy wins in Friday's semifinal action, but the big news of the day was the startling upset of the defending national champion Sprague River Ducks by the Carrol Shadley Thunderbirds in the losers' bracket.

The Ducks, who went into the tournament as favorites, fell to the Warm Springs team in an upset, 89-80. Shadley's Thunderbirds were a pickup team for the Lodge Grass, Mont., quintet which failed to show up. Shadley's was eliminated in the elimination tournament held a few weeks back and wasn't given a prayer of defeating the Ducks. But someone forgot to tell the Thunderbirds.

Toppenish gained the finals by scoring over 100 points for the second game in succession in downing the Lapwai, Idaho Nez Perce Nation, 101-75. Warm Springs handled Fallon's Silver Chiefs handily, 99-70, to gain the other final spot. The other Friday game was a 94-49 victory for the Chilquinn Red Foxes over the Hoopa All-Stars.

The Thunderbirds were as much as a 25-point underdog going into the game with the defending national champions. Ed Case led a tremendous one-man charge at the Ducks with a 29-point barrage and the Ducks appeared unable to stop his shots. The Thunderbirds also used a collapsing defense on big DeMerle Lytle and held him to 20 points, far below his scoring average.

Sprague River jumped off to a quick lead and appeared headed toward an easy victory when

Case began his antics. He put the Thunderbirds back into the game with six points in the first period and the Ducks led by 17-16 at the end of the first period. Each team got a little hotter in the second and the Sprague River quintet, with Norm Johns, Butch Crume and Lytle leading the way, hit for 23 points to 22 for the T-Birds. Case canned nine points in that period.

The third period was the big one for the T-Birds as they split the nets for 21 points while holding the Ducks to only 14 points to take a 59-50 lead into the fourth frame. Case began to get some help in the third from Norman Jackson and Francis Reyes and the starting upset became a possibility all of a sudden.

The Ducks fought back strong in the fourth period behind Johns, Crume and Lytle and regained the lead with a few minutes left. The two clubs battled back and fourth in the closing seconds with Case hitting in the closing five seconds to tie the game at 69-69 to send it into an overtime.

Case hit a free throw to put the T-Birds into a 70-69 lead but Crume and Lytle combined for two baskets to send the Ducks into a 73-70 lead. Tony Dumont popped in a pair of free throws off a foul by Lytle with 1:08 left to cut the margin to 73-72 and Case broke loose for a lay-in with 33 seconds left to put the T-Birds in command of a 74-73 lead. Reyes hit a charity toss with 10 seconds left and missed the bonus shot. Crume tried a jumper from 12 feet with three seconds left and missed to give the T-Birds the big upset.

The Red Foxes defeated the outclassed Hoopa All-Stars easily. Five of the Red Foxes hit in doubles with John McCutcheon leading the way with 31. Jess McCutcheon tallied 14, Tony Wilder 11, and Ron Owings and Albert Wilder 10 each. Dennis Jackson

had 13. Jud Davis 12 and Jim Coldgrove 10 for the losers.

The Red Foxes were hot from the field in hitting 40 of 75 shots for a brilliant 53.3 per cent. John McCutcheon hit 13 of 20 from the field to get his 31 points.

Toppenish showed the class of the tournament again with a big win over the Nez Perce Na-

tion. Five players hit in double figures with Larry Ramsey leading the way with 21 points. Ron Olney connected for 19, Joe Cleveland for 14, Dave Benedict for 14 and Cal Anderson for 11. Ed Madison again led Nex Perce with 27 points and Buzz Nelson canned 24. They were the only two in doubles.

Warm Springs walked away from Fallon in the second half after leading by 14 in the first half, 45-31. Norm Redbird led the charge with 20 points while Jim Macey and Howard Baus each netted 15. Doug Palmer 13 and Mike Clements 11. Gordon Frazier led the losers with 25 points and John Martin had 15.

Pelican Netters Defeated

The Klamath Union High tennis team, getting their feet wet literally, opened the 1963 season Friday and Saturday with a double match in California.

The Pelicans lost both meets to strong Anderson and Mount Shasta net teams. The match with Anderson wasn't finished because of a heavy rain down-pour. The Pelicans were trailing in the meet, 4-0, with one singles match underway and two doubles matches to be played. It became official because only four points are needed for a match to be qualified official.

Larry Tice lost to Eddie Morgan, 12-14, 6-3, 3-6, as the top seed for the Pelicans. Dave Geil lost the second match to Ken Williams, 6-0, 6-1. Terry Cole dropped the third singles to Obert Lemon, 6-2, 6-2. Tom Cole lost to Frank Montagner, 6-2, 6-1. Doug Stiles split his first two sets with George Casebeer, 2-6, 6-3, when the rains halted the meet. It had rained through most of the matches. The doubles were cancelled.

Saturday at Mount Shasta the Pelicans met a rugged team and fell 6-1. Tice lost to Pete Beeman, 6-1, 6-1. Geil was beaten by Gale Graban, 6-2, 6-0. Tom Cole was defeated by Bruce Middleton, 6-1, 6-1, and Doug Stiles fell to Colby Roberts, 6-1, 6-4.

Terry Cole got the only win with a 6-4, 3-6, 6-4 victory over Jim Milton. Tice and Geil lost to Graban and Middleton in the first doubles, 6-2, 9-7, and Stiles and Tom Cole were beaten by Dave Clark and Doug Chickering, 6-4, 6-4.

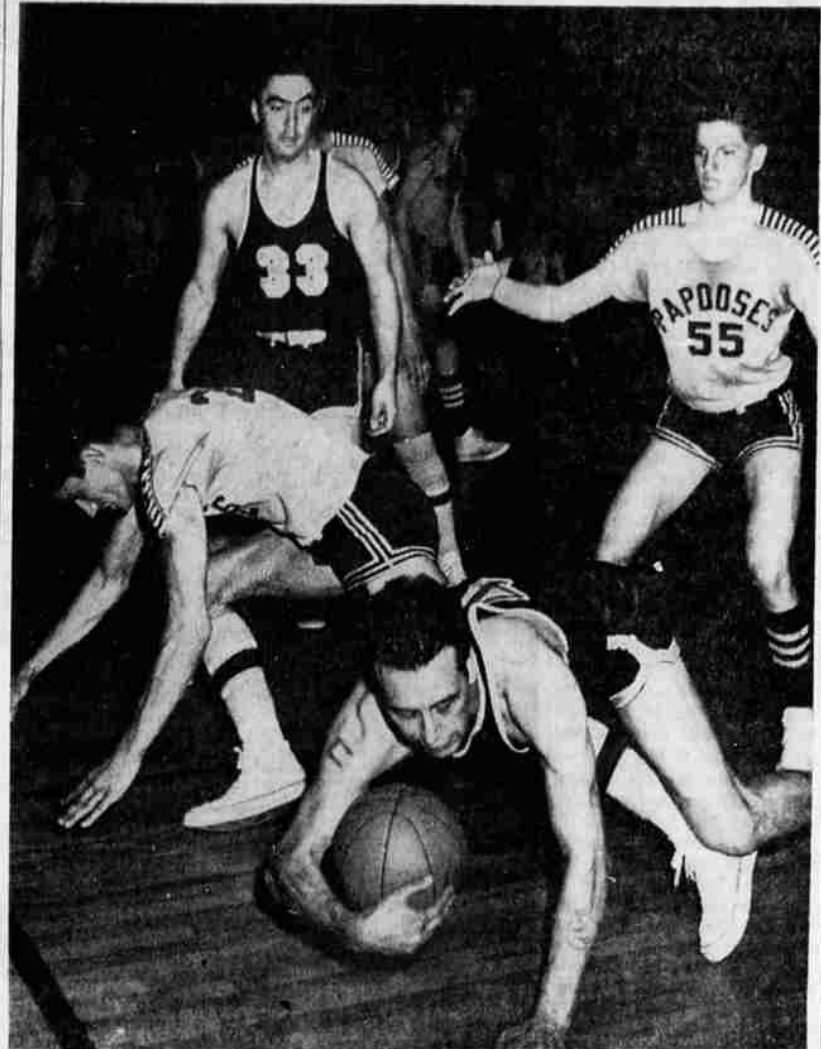

DELAND, Fla. (UPI) — The Portland Beavers opened their exhibition baseball schedule Friday with a 3-2 loss to the Seattle Rainiers. The winning run scored in the seventh inning on a double by Ron Pedeski and a single by the Boston Red Sox' \$125,000 bonus first baseman Bob Guindon.

Named to the second team were Jack Hirsch of UCLA, Al Young of USC, Dale Easley of Washington, Wells Slonger of USC and Dick Smith of California.

Given honorable mention were Fred Slaughter and Fred Goss of UCLA, Camden Wall and Don Lauer of California.

Final league scoring statistics showed that Martin edged Dose in a close race. Martin hit 280 points in 12 games for a 21.7, Dose 253 for 21.6, with Hazard third at 18.3. Rounding out the top five were Easley and Corell with 14.4 and 14.1 points per contest.

Cal's Smith was the loop's top free throw shooter at 810 while Charlie Hart of Washington bucketed 404 of his shots to win that department.

Dose, Corell and Wall were the leading rebounders in that order. In team statistics, UCLA averaged 70 points per game and Washington surrendered but 60 to lead those statistics.

North Eugene, Tigard In Class A-1 Finals

EUGENE (UPI) — Powerful North Eugene, a tall team with a big reputation, and unheralded Tigard, one with not much size and even less of a name, battled it out

in the finals of the Oregon high school Class A-1 basketball tournament Saturday night.

The Highlanders defeated Astoria 33-43 and the Tigers topped Sandy 36-65 in the semifinals of the five-day, 16-team tourney before 8,707 persons at McArthur Court Friday night.

North Eugene, ranked first in the final Oregon Journal Coaches' poll this season, rates as a heavy favorite against Tigard, which wasn't even voted in the top 10.

The Highlanders match a front line of forwards 6-6 Bob Craven and 6-5 Bill Thomas and 6-5 center Ron Davies against the Tigers' forward wall of 6-11 Bob Lamb and 6-11 Bill Bastron, forwards, and 6-4 center Marty Eggett.

Davies scored 18 points and collected 17 rebounds and Craven tallied 17 points and picked off 10 rebounds to pace North Eugene to its win against Astoria. Astoria's Dave Romppanen hit for 21.

The Highlanders, beaten once in 25 starts this season, held leads of 18-9, 32-18 and 42-33 at the quarter breaks. They made 19 of 49 field goal attempts for a .389 percentage and piled up a 45-37 edge in rebounding. The Fishermen made 18 of 63 shots from the field for a 28.6 percentage.

Lamb poured in 25 points to lead the way for Tigard against Sandy, which upset defending champion Grants Pass Thursday night to get into the semifinals. Larry Sapp added 13 points for the winners. Dale Carpenter with 18 carried the Sandy attack.

Tigers Led
The Tigers, which improved their season's record to 21-4, were in front 22-11, 44-24 and 63-39 at the end of the quarters. They hit 33 of 72 field goal attempts for a 45.8 percentage. The Fishermen made 23 of 68 shots from the field for a 33.6 percentage.

In other games, Grants Pass defeated Milwaukie 57-45 and Medford topped Pendleton 67-60 in the fourth place semifinals and South Salem won over South Eugene 73-64 and Marshall of Portland edged Molalla 44-43 in the consolation semifinals.

Marshall played South Salem at 1:30 p.m. in the consolation finals and Medford took on Grants Pass at 2:45 p.m. for fourth place Saturday.

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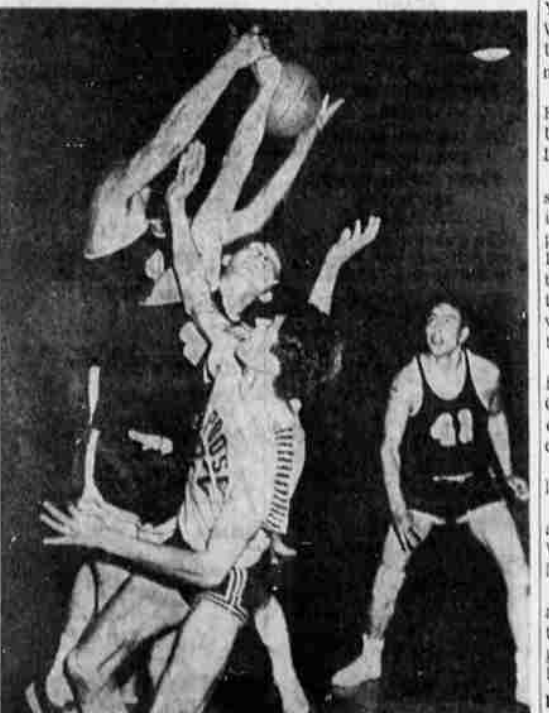
