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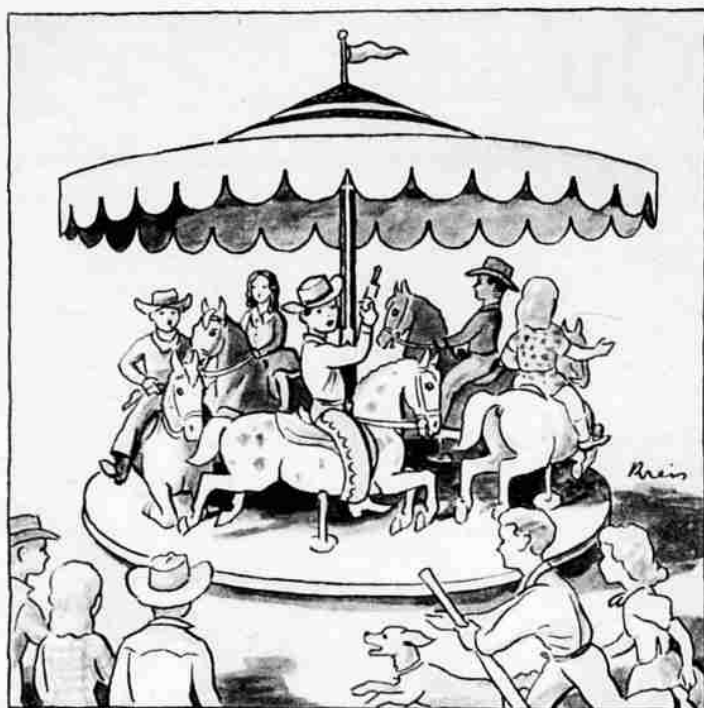

Kite-Time Tip By Leo Lyons

The months of March and April, when the weather is breezy and often mild, is the kite-flying season.
