

Lakeview Lay Committee Recommends Changes To Improve Junior, Senior High School Study

LAKEVIEW — Three months of study of junior and senior high school curriculum and activities by a lay committee has resulted in several recommendations to the District 7 School Board. Prominent among them is the separation of teaching staff, facilities, and activities between the two school groups.

The recommendations were presented to the board at its meeting on March 14, and they were accepted with a resolution of appreciation.

The committee's resolutions were:

"1. Organization — The committee recommends that the organization should be a six-year grade school, a three-year junior high school, and a three-year senior high school. We realize that this, in part, is being accomplished now; however, we

feel that junior high trained teachers should teach junior high students in the junior high building, and senior high teachers should teach senior high students in the senior high building.

"2. Curriculum — The committee recommends that the junior and senior high school teachers should have one period a day for class preparation and the grading of lessons.

"3. Counseling — The committee feels that the present program is excellent and that it should be continued as it allows a degree of specialization not previously possible.

"4. Activities offered to the junior high students and the senior high students should be separate and more suitable to their respective age levels.

"This committee recognizes the big responsibility the school board is facing in the ever-changing and demanding field of educating youth. We realize the ideal situation is difficult to attain and that constant upgrading of standards should be the goal. The committee encountered several areas which should be explored and considered by the administration.

"These are as follows: Language—choice to be offered in the ninth grade; summer and night classes if feasible; English department, supplementation; remedial program, continuation and expansion into upper grades; visual aids and library materials to be increased for reference purposes; qualified aides, for extra duties in the system, especially including the elementary grades; scheduling, more courses made available to students interested in industrial arts, home economics, and vocational agriculture."

In its closing statement it said, "We thank the superintendent of

schools, Mr. Orr, for his cooperation and assistance in making available the materials and personnel which enabled us to make the above report. We have enjoyed the opportunity to work on the lay committee and would like to see it carried into more areas."

It was the suggestion of Superintendent John Orr that community members be brought into closer contact with school programs by appointment of the committee for its study. The members were Robert J. Bennett, chairman; Albert Herbert, Donald E. Allen, Lew W. Harris, Bud Reynolds, Mrs. Robert Nichols, Mrs. Erwin Abramson, Mrs. Douglas Elder, Mrs. Irvin Farris, and Mrs. Con Fitzgerald Jr.

Reds Fired For Stalling K's Project

MOSCOW (UPI) — More than 16,000 Soviet officials have been fired for undercutting Premier Nikita Khrushchev's pet "virgin lands" farm program by more than \$15.4 million through theft, embezzlement and gross inefficiency, it was learned today.

Kazakhstan Communist party chief I. Yusupov said \$1,649,000 was swindled and \$14.3 million was lost by co-operative cooperatives through "mismanagement" in the republic last year.

"All in all last year, 16,139 persons in the trade system were fired," Yusupov said in a Kazakhstan report on 1962 in the newspaper Pravda.

He said 2,440 officials and employees of the Trade Ministry were fired for "theft and embezzlement, violation of trade rules and incompatibility with their positions."

Khrushchev introduced the virgin lands program in the early 1950s in an effort to increase the nation's agriculture and particularly to utilize the vast desert-like central Asian lands.
