The Texas Railroad Commission, after hearing nominations from producers, sets the oil-pumping allowable for the vast Texas resources. It is under pressure now to let the state's oil flow at a faster pace.

Besides conservation practices, U. S. producers keep up a strong campaign to hold import quotas down on foreign oil, which can be produced and shipped for less than production costs in this country.

Secondary recovery makes oil available from wells that would have written off a decade ago. With better technology, oil can be produced at cheaper prices, at least offsetting some of the loss of volume.

But by far the best solution to the industry's wide problem is the finding of new markets.

Look For New Ways

The major oil companies are always looking for new ways to use oil. U. S. firms also watch the economic growth of foreign nations and count them as potential marketplaces.

Scientists have found ways to make food from oil, to cover cropland with an oil-based product to keep moisture in, and to make new fuels. But these experiments have been on a company-wide basis and have not really produced a major new market for oil.

Earlier this month, Midwest grain-growers announced a possible solution for their surplus grain problem. A Texas research organization suggested distilling it into alcohol for mass use in automobiles for smog-proof driving.

Whether the grain men succeed will depend on further studies. But the idea might be applied to them. Maybe it is time the producers joined the major integrated companies in "brainstorming" and possibly finding a new market for large quantities of oil.

86 Rioters Face Court In Korea

SEOUL (UPI) — Eighty-six of the 109 persons arrested here Friday for demonstrating against South Korea's military junta government will be court-martialed on unspecified charges, police said today.

The other 23 have been released but a score of demonstrators are believed to be in custody in other Korean cities, including five arrested in Taegu Saturday.

It was not certain immediately what would be done with demonstrators arrested outside Seoul.

Gen. Park Chung Hee's junta, ignoring the demands of opposition politicians, was going ahead with its plan to hold a referendum in which the people would be asked to approve its continuance in power.

Former students who led the uprising which overthrew ex-President Syngman Rhee in 1960 threatened to rebel again unless Park abandoned the referendum plan.

Political observers said, however, that it is doubtful whether the former rebels have enough influence over the present generation of university students to command much of a following.

Atlas Rocket Placed On Pad

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — Astronaut Gordon Cooper's Atlas rocket was installed on a launching pad Friday for the attempt—still about six weeks away—to send Cooper on the longest space ride ever taken by an American.

The next project is the placing of Cooper's space capsule atop the rocket. That task is scheduled for April.

If the shot goes as planned, Cooper will make 22 trips around the world in a little more than 36 hours and return for a landing in the Pacific Ocean near Midway Island.

The present American manned space flight record is six circuits by Walter M. Schirra Jr., John Glenn Jr., and Scott Carpenter made three trips each.

Reds Face Revolt In East Berlin

United Press International BERLIN (UPI) — "Communism means to us lies, threats with nuclear weapons, the wall, barbed wire, forced evacuations, machine guns, the murder of refugees, suppression."

This excerpt from a letter from a resident of Leipzig to the American-run radio stations RIAS in West Berlin indicates the mood in the Soviet zone after 19 months of the anti-refugee wall.

East Germans are fed up and they are saying so out loud. The widespread dissatisfaction even had infected the rank and file of the Communist party.

To combat anti-wall feeling the party has stepped up its propaganda campaign to justify what it calls its "security measures on the state border."

East Germans, in letters to their newspapers, at Communist called forums and at factory meetings, are asking why they can not visit the West.

Propaganda Fails

They say they have friends and relations in the west and want to see them.

The Communist propaganda campaign has failed because it has provided no clear answers. East German Communist leader Walter Ulbricht set the tone of the campaign with the remark that West Germans with relations in the East could move to East Germany.

The West Berlin newspaper Tagesspiegel, in a comment on the remark, said, "The keeper has invited us to move into his jail."

The discontent of East Germans was disclosed clearly when the newspaper Landeszeitung in the province of Thuringia asked its readers to write it on the theme "What Would Make Me Happy?"

After four weeks the newspaper appealed to its readers to "think correctly politically."

It made this recommendation, it said, because most of the letters it received tied together happiness and trips to the West.

Real Reason

Guste Zorn, one of the women agitators assigned to make the wall popular, wrote in the Communist magazine Einheit that the campaign was failing with women.

She reported, for example, that when she spoke at an East Berlin meeting in favor of the wall a woman in the audience got up and left the hall.

"I later learned that she is all alone and her family lives in West Germany. Her dominating feeling was her desire to see her relations," Frau Zorn wrote.

Party officials in the Potsdam district bordering on West Berlin assigned "agitators" to visit every house to explain the necessity of the wall.

"Often the agitation must begin inside the party because more than a few comrades have to be convinced of the correctness of our measures," a Potsdam party directive said.

In fact, the Communists have set themselves an impossible job because they can not admit the real reason they built the wall—to keep East Germans from fleeing.

Photoengravers Delay NY Paper Settlement

NEW YORK (UPI) — A deadlock between publishers and 320 striking photoengravers today pushed the New York newspaper blackout into its 108th day, despite a 3-2 vote by printers to end their walkout.

The printers, who had rejected a \$12.63 weekly package increase proposal a week earlier, reversed themselves Sunday and voted 2,582 to 1,763 to accept the contract terms.

While the printers cast their ballots on 30 city voting machines at Madison Square Garden, their striking sister union, the mailers, used black and white marbles as ballots to approve their contract by 466 to 256.

Says It's Wonderful

"It's wonderful!" exclaimed Walter N. Thayer, spokesman for the Publishers Association of New York City, on learning that the printers had changed their stand.

Mayor Robert F. Wagner called for a new round of negotiations between the photoengravers and

publishers to start at 10 a.m. EST today.

A 13-hour bargaining session ended last Sunday night with the two sides described by Wagner as "stalemated."

The photoengravers are demanding a cut in the work week from 36½ hours to 35, which they claim would be in line with their craft's work week in commercial firms. Publishers contend that resulting increases in overtime pay would be too costly.

The printers maintained their picket lines today outside plants of the eight dailies involved in the shutdown. The union said they would keep picketing until a settlement is reached with the photoengravers, who went on strike last Monday.

"We won't be back to work until the photoengravers and we sign a contract, but that can be done very fast," said Bertram A. Powers, president of the International Typographical Union (ITU) Local 6.
