Klamath Falls patrolmen cited a Klamath Falls man for failing to leave his name and address at the scene of an accident that he was involved in March 7 at the corner of South Sixth and East Main streets.

Woman Hurt In Accident

A woman motorist was in satisfactory condition at the Klamath Valley Hospital Tuesday morning following a two-car collision at Alameda Avenue and Shasta Way about 7:50 p.m. Monday, state police have reported.

Injured was Mrs. Lorraine Jane Taylor, 35, 5545 Independence Avenue, who received head lacerations when the vehicle she was driving collided with a car operated by Marvin R. Kefer, 3242 Miller Avenue, at the Shasta Way-Alameda Avenue intersection.

According to police, Kefer was driving southbound on Alameda when he slowed down to turn left onto Shasta Way. At the same time he noted an automobile turning onto Alameda from Shasta Way but failed to observe another car driven by Mrs. Taylor approaching him in the northbound lane of Alameda. Kefer's car turned into the path of Mrs. Taylor's vehicle and the collision occurred.

Both vehicles received moderate damage. Mrs. Taylor was taken to the local hospital by Peace Ambulance.

Gunman Pleads Guilty To Assault Citation

J. D. Kness, 38, the gun wielder, pleaded guilty to assault with a dangerous weapon.

Kness found Mrs. Bell in a bedroom of the house and brutally beat her, before he was knocked unconscious by an ashtray wielded by his 12-year-old son, Buddy.

It was the second time since last year that Kness had been arrested by police for an incident in which he threatened his wife with a gun. Last November, Kness was arrested by city police after he held his wife and four children at gunpoint in a car parked on Main Street. He later went to the Salem state hospital for a psychiatric examination and was released when the results were negative.

Kness was the precipitator in an old-fashioned shoot-out with his wife, Gloria, at the Bly home of the latter's mother, Mrs. Doris Bell.

During a running gun battle through the house, the participants exchanged about 19 shots with the result that Mrs. Kness was wounded four times and Kness was shot once.

Cities Receive Revenue From State Liquor Sales

Oregon cities will receive \$6,484,991 from state highway revenues during the current fiscal year, and receipts from liquor revenues allocated on a per capita basis will total \$1,893,501 by the end of the third quarter, according to the League of Oregon Cities.

In addition, cities have received \$271,442 from liquor license fees allocated on the basis of 60 per cent of the liquor license fees collected within each city by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

Ten per cent of the net state-collected highway revenues are allocated to cities. This amount is distributed on a per capita basis following deduction of \$250,000 to a fund for special need street projects within cities.

The highway revenue allocations have amounted to \$7,339 per capita during the current fiscal year.

Liquor revenue allocations distributed on a per capita basis come from three sources, as follows:

1. Net liquor profits of 12 1/2 per cent distributed quarterly.

2. A tax of 10 per cent upon manufacturers and importers of alcoholic beverages, plus 30 cents of each \$1.30 tax upon manufacturers and importers of malt beverages.

3. Fifty per cent of liquor permit fees.

In addition, each city receives 60 per cent of liquor license fees collected within cities. Cities which have voted local option do not share in net liquor profits or in the manufacturers and importers tax, but do receive a share of liquor permit fees.

Employees at the Joe Fisher Used Car Lot, 677 South Seventh Street, reported that a 1962 red Universal Jeep bearing the Oregon license number 3Y-2477 was stolen from the lot sometime early Friday morning.

City police have no information regarding suspects in this case.

Clay Thomas of Thomas Lumber Company reported that a company pickup was stolen Monday between 5:15 and 6:15 p.m. while the vehicle was parked on Pine Street between South Sixth and Seventh streets.

Call Proves False Alarm

Sheriff's deputies were summoned to the summer cabins on the east side of Lake of the Woods Saturday to investigate a report that a number of youths were loitering in an area where 16 cabins had been reported burglarized since March 18, according to the sheriff's office.

Deputies interrogated the youths and learned that they had been camping in the area during the spring vacation. Later investigation by the deputies indicated that there had been no vandalism or pilfering in cabins on that part of the lake since the last break-in was reported.

The sheriff's office is keeping the region under surveillance as the result of the large number of break-ins reported there last week.

Earlier this month, the sheriff's office apprehended three youths in connection with the theft of a 3.5 outboard motor and a sanding machine from the boathouse at the Lake of the Woods Resort.

TID Plans Water Flow

TULELAKE — Irrigation water for the West Side public lands is in the Tulelake Irrigation District system, and ditches in other parts of the system are being flushed for later delivery.

TID Manager Ed Lance said Tuesday that the office will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week for delivery requests.

A major flume has been replaced on the J-14 Canal prior to the 1963 season and two new re-lift pumping plants have been installed to provide supplemental water and improve service. Drainage water will be partly used by the new pumps.

Three directors, Sam Anderson, Lester Cushman and Ivan Rose, have been appointed by the Siskiyou County Court for another four-year term since there were no other petitions filed for an election.

Four Youths Involved In Series Of Thefts

Four youths arrested last week by Klamath Falls Juvenile Officer Ray Howard in connection with various thefts here and at Lake of the Woods have been implicated in the Feb. 23-24 burglary of the Boy Scout Camp at Crescent Lake, Sheriff's Deputy Lee Saunders told the Herald and News Tuesday.

The burglary became known when representatives of the local Boy Scouts of America contacted the sheriff's office and related that three youths had appeared before them with items they admitted taking from the scout camp. Meanwhile, the fourth youth involved in the break-in was in police custody on another charge, according to deputy Saunders.

Two of the youths were Kenneth Ellis, 18, and Delbert T. Steppe, 19, both of 2110 Ward Street, who were sentenced to one year probation in district court last week after they each pleaded guilty to a previous theft. The district court was not aware that the youths were implicated in the scout camp break-in at the time they were placed on probation, the Herald and News learned Monday.

The accomplices of Steppe and Ellis were two juveniles who had been arrested previously by city police in connection with other local thefts and are to appear in juvenile court on the combined charges, April 1, Juvenile Officer Francis Matthews has disclosed.

The items the three youths returned to the Boy Scout officials included three tents, four 22-caliber rifles and a number of axes. After the loot had been recovered, Saunders and Gale Staley, district scout executive, went to the scout camp to conduct an investigation, the deputy said. The roads into the camp were blocked by trees blown down this past winter so Saunders and Staley went to the camp in a boat by way of Crescent Lake.

Investigation indicated that the youths had broken into the cabin and warehouse, where they pried open numerous storage boxes secured by padlocks and then scattered the contents about the buildings.

In addition, the double doors leading into the boathouse had been battered and the building entered. Inside, the youths had apparently taken a canoe and removed it to the shore of the lake, where it was found filled with sand, water and ice.

Further investigation revealed that 500 rounds of .22-caliber ammunition was missing. Scout officials said they would be unable to determine if anything else was taken until an inventory is made of the buildings.

Damage to the property has not yet been determined.
