Adventuress, Mechanic Tell Of 7-Week Ordeal In Yukon

WHITEHORSE, Yukon (UPI)—A plucky New York adventuress and a husky California mechanic, given up for dead weeks ago, today recovered from their 48-day ordeal in the frozen Yukon wilderness and said they never doubted that they would survive.

"The only thing that I felt was not being able to understand why the Lord was keeping us there that long," said Helen Klaben, 21. "I don't think I gave up hope at anytime."

"We never gave up hope. We lived from day to day, hoping someone would come."

The Brooklyn girl and Ralph Flores, 42, San Bruno, Calif., disappeared Feb. 4 on a flight from Whitehorse to Seattle. They were aboard Flores' single-engine plane.

They said that the only thing they had to eat were two cans of fruit salad, two cans of sardines and a box of crackers. That was gone in the first week, and the last food they had was two tubes of toothpaste.

"I never liked sardines before in my life, but now I love them," Miss Klaben said.

Bush pilot Charles Hamilton

spotted an S.O.S. tramped in the snow on a frozen lake Monday. It had an arrow pointing up a mountain. He followed the arrow, and saw Miss Klaben frantically waving near a lean-to constructed from the small plane's wreckage.

Flores was on the frozen lake about three miles away from the wreckage. He was trying to walk for help.

Doctors at the large, modern hospital in Whitehorse said the two were in "surprisingly good shape" considering the ordeal they had been through.

Miss Klaben had a broken right

arm and injuries to one foot. Flores had several broken bones. Doctors said they probably had other injuries at the time of the crash but "they have healed themselves during the duration."

The young Brooklyn girl lay in bed snuggled deep under the covers talking and joking with news-men. She was in such good spirits today she wanted to joke with her visitors.

"How much weight did you lose?" one of them asked.

"That's none of your business," she said with a mock frown. Then she smiled, and teased

"Well...no, I don't think I'll tell you."

Whitehorse is the capital city of the Yukon and its largest city.

From Miss Klaben's hospital window, she can see the frozen Yukon River winding around the hospital, with the town and its 6,000 residents on the far side.

The girl said she was afraid to believe that Hamilton had discovered the wreck when he flew over Monday.

"I wasn't sure at first, because several times when we were on top of the mountain, we thought perhaps planes saw us and it (sic) didn't, and it was kind of disappointing and then when the plane did find us...I wasn't sure and I didn't want to discourage myself

so I just went about my business as usual," she said.

"But when he did acknowledge me by shaking the wings, I just lay prostrate and cried and thanked God."

Vehicle Purchases, Annexations Busy Council

MOUNT SHASTA — A motion was carried that Mount Shasta Council budget for one police car at its regular meeting March 22. The car will be a 1962 model turned in by the California Highway Patrol and will cost \$900 plus tax. The city is to have its choice of cars, with a complete history of the car, and one of the police cars now in use by Mount Shasta police department will be sold. Police Chief Harold Barnum was requested to start proceedings.

Supervisor of public works, Charles Echols, reported the city needed a vehicle for the street department. Council voted to purchase a 1957 four-wheel drive Jeep station wagon from the California Highway Department for \$650 plus tax. An additional \$300 is estimated for a new block for the machine. It is planned to use the Jeep for other city departments if needed.

Echols also gave council a figure of \$31,000 that had been spent to Feb. 28 on South Mount Shasta sewer. He also outlined plans to remodel and add to the storage building at South Yard to which USFS has given its approval. Cost would be \$800 for a 30 by 20 by 14 foot high lean-to, and \$800 for remodeling an overhead door. Council decided to take this under consideration, but instructed Echols to proceed with grading at the site.

Echols stated that buildings moved from the freeway construction zone to Spring Street need water at a cost of \$650, with the state to assume \$310 of it. The budget will carry this expense and Echols was authorized to proceed.

The council passed a resolution of intention to sell city-owned real property known as the City Barn. Protests may be made at a meeting April 12 at 8 p.m. in city hall.

A large group of property owners was present to protest the Hercules annexation, but the number of protests was less than the number required so an election will be held to settle the issue.

A motion was carried that the two-inch water line serving Big Canyon water users be moved immediately. The relocation is necessary because of freeway construction. Letters to property owners in that area are being mailed advising them of action taken.

Mayor Gino Marconi reported the salary budget committee had met and made some changes in the budget. It will be submitted to department heads for study, who will then meet with council for decision.

In other business Mayor Marconi assured Delano Acord that the city would make every effort to check out an easement and sewer line for Acord's new home now under construction in the Freedenburg annexation. This move will involve some 30 parcels of land in the subdivision and would cost \$4,100 for sewer connection.

The first reading of an ordinance repealing the bail bond broker's license was read, and a letter was read from the city of Tulare inviting Mount Shasta City Council members and their wives to attend a dinner and meeting of the League of Siskiyou County Cities at Tulare's Sportsman's Hotel, 7:30 p.m., April 10.

Bill Lanthier of Mount Shasta Electric appeared before the council to protest the practice of unlicensed contractors and individuals doing work in the city. He stated that local contractors not only have to have a state contractor's license but also a city license to contract jobs in any Siskiyou County city. City Attorney L. N. Lorenzen said no resolution was necessary on council's part to resolve this issue and the city will proceed with that line of action.

Mount Shasta Police Department received a plaque from the California Commission of Peace Officers commending it on its high standard of law enforcement.
