Precinct Worker Pay Probe Asked By GOP Assemblymen

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Two Republican assemblymen today proposed a legislative investigation of the paying of precinct workers during the 1962 general election.

A resolution asking for the probe was introduced by Assemblymen William T. Bagley, R-San Rafael, and Houston I. Flournoy, R-Claremont.

In effect, they said the practice must be stopped.

To help lead their case, Bagley and Flournoy called upon two leaders of the Democratic party — Paul Ziffren of Los Angeles, former national committeeman, and Tom B. Carvey Jr. of Palos Verdes Estates, president of the California Democratic Council.

The middle man in such a probe would be Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh, D-Inglewood, who raised a \$100,000 war chest to pay 10,000 workers each \$10 to help elect Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

The two lawmakers confessed that they introduced the resolution only 48 hours before a statewide meeting of the CDC in Bakersfield on purpose. They said it was to allow the CDC to discuss the practice at their weekend session.

"By the payment of precinct workers to deliver the vote," they said, "we breach a basic tenet of our democratic society. We dilute the effect of the individual voter's choice by herding hordes of people to the polls, giving them instructions on how to vote."

Bagley said that, as an attorney, he already is convinced the practice is a misdemeanor and that Unruh's action during the general election was "in blatant disregard" of the law.

"It is my hope that an appropriate assembly committee will conduct an investigation in depth into this practice and make recommendations to curb this bossism practice in California, including new legislation if necessary," said Bagley.

Both Ziffren and Carvey have been critical of the payment of precinct workers but Unruh defended it by saying it got many people transportation to the polls who would not have otherwise voted. He said much of the money went to babysitters.

Bagley, in a letter to Ziffren and Carvey, said he shared their concern and added: "We do not want big money to control the political processes of either party."

"I fear, as your public statements have already indicated, that (the payment) can do nothing else than create an Eastern political boss system in California in the future."

He asked that the two Democratic leaders make themselves available to the assembly committee ultimately assigned to investigate the payments.

Other action in the legislature: Supervisors — The Senate local government killed bills to reappoint California's 58 counties to reappoint their supervisors.

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House Hopes To Finish Hearings On Tax Slash

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Ways and Means Committee hoped to hear 31 witnesses today and wind up its public hearings on President Kennedy's proposed \$10.3 billion tax cut.

The raft of witnesses included Democratic Gov. Matthew E. Welsh of Indiana, and Republican Govs. Clifford P. Hansen of Wyoming, Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma and Tim Babcock of Montana.

All were expected to oppose proposals that would place about \$200 million in additional taxes on profits from oil and gas production.

They will probably echo the sentiments of oil industry spokesmen, who took five hours Tuesday to argue that such additional taxes would be against the public interest.

They were joined by retired Gen. Lucius D. Clay, who said more taxes would discourage producers from looking for new deposits.

Other congressional news: **Cheating:** Demands mounted for a congressional inquiry into a lawmaker's anonymous charge that there are "congressmen who cheat."

A number of members said the accusations tended to cast an unwarranted reflection on the whole House, and believed an impartial inquiry would fail to support the charges.

Propaganda: A House foreign affairs subcommittee headed by Rep. Dante B. Fascell, D-Fla., opened a new congressional investigation into how well this country is doing in the "battle for men's minds" around the world. The lead-off witness was Edward R. Murrow, director of the U.S. Information Agency.

Fascell said the House group would make a comprehensive study of the U.S. "ideological offensive" with an eye to recommending improvements.

CIA: A GOP member of the House CIA subcommittee said Tuesday he was convinced the nation's defense intelligence is "basically sound and that weaknesses are being promptly and properly corrected as they develop."

The comment was made by Rep. Frank C. Osera Jr. of New Jersey, in a letter to Chairman Carl Vinson, D-Ga., of the House Armed Services Committee and the CIA subcommittee.

Pay: The U.S. Chamber of Commerce told a House labor subcommittee that proposed federal "equal pay" legislation is unnecessary because state legislatures and labor-management negotiators are doing the job. The testimony added to a mounting business attack on proposals to require employers in interstate commerce to pay men and women equally for jobs of the same nature.

KU Concert Scheduled On Thursday

French Rails Back Strike

PARIS (UPI) — French railwaymen called a series of harassing walkouts today and leaders of 200,000 striking coal miners urged restraint from further violence in the drive for higher wages.

President Charles de Gaulle summoned his cabinet for a report on the labor crisis from Michel-Maurice Bokanowski, minister of industries.

The 350,000 railwaymen scheduled two-hour walkouts at each shift change to back the miners' strike against De Gaulle's wage austerity policies.

Gas and electricity workers called for more walkouts Thursday, and there was talk of a possible general strike by France's 2 million-man nationalized work force unless the government backs down.

Striking coal miners clashed briefly but sharply with police in Lorraine Tuesday. Minor injuries were reported.

It was the second incident of violence reported during the miners' strike for more pay, shorter working hours and more vacation time.

Union leaders immediately issued urgent appeals to avoid any more fights with authorities.
