Bracero Program Extension Asked By Labor Secretary

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz recommended today that a controversial program to bring Mexican nationals into the United States to work on farms be extended only one more year.

If extended one more year the so-called bracero program would expire Dec. 31, 1964.

Wirtz made the recommendation before a House agriculture subcommittee hearing on legislation calling for extension of the program for two years.

Wirtz also recommended that the program be changed to give greater protection to domestic workers.

"This amendment would require employers seeking to obtain Mexican workers to offer to domestic workers workmen's compensation or occupational insurance coverage, housing and transportation expenses equivalent to that furnished to Mexican workers," he said.

The secretary noted that U.S. unemployment now stood at 6.1 per cent and said migratory farm workers were among those in "most disadvantaged position."

He said every effort should be made to assure that qualified domestic workers be given preference in jobs. For example, he said, California imported 127,000 Mexican workers during 1962 while at the same time an estimated 395,000 domestic workers were unemployed.

In Arizona, he said, 16,996 Mexicans were employed on farms while 24,900 domestic workers were unemployed. Arkansas used 12,410 Mexican workers while 42,400 domestic workers were unemployed. In Texas, with 174,600 unemployed, 36,289 Mexican workers were brought in.

"Faced with these indications of growing problems in our labor market, and in view of the dramatic changes taking place in the utilization of agricultural labor, including the Mexican worker," Wirtz said, "we are not prepared to project our judgment regarding the need for continuation of the Mexican labor program beyond a limited period."

He said the amendment to provide greater job opportunities for domestic workers would not impose "any onerous burden" upon agricultural employers.

"None of its provisions would require employers to incur any greater expense in obtaining domestic workers than they are now assuming in obtaining and utilizing Mexican workers," he said.

Wirtz also criticized an amendment proposed in legislation to extend the program which would allow Mexican nationals to operate machinery. This, he said, would "lend itself to subterfuge and abuse."

In testimony before a House appropriations subcommittee made public today Employment Security Administrator Robert C. Goodwin said an estimated 130,000 Mexican workers would be brought into the United States for farm labor between July 1 and the end of the year when the program expires if it is not extended by Congress.

Hearing Set In Florence Huitt Death

Zeima Joan Ochoa, 41, acquitted less than two months ago of the first degree gun murder of her boy friend, Bruce Miller, 38, was to appear in district court at 3:30 p.m. today for a preliminary hearing involving another first degree murder charge.

Mrs. Ochoa is accused of slaying Florence Baker Huitt, 26, with the same weapon she used to slay Miller—a .308 caliber rifle—at her former residence on Mt. Whitney Street, Nov. 14. She lists her present address as 336 Broad Street.

Mrs. Baker, cousin of her slayer, had been present with Ochoa and Miller when the latter was slain by Mrs. Ochoa. The jury judging the case decided that Mrs. Ochoa had acted in self defense. Both Mrs. Huitt and Washington testified during the murder trial.

The most recent shooting occurred at 616 Commercial Street, about 7 p.m., March 19, as Mrs. Ochoa, armed with the .308 caliber rifle, let herself in the home of Eddie Daily, 616 Commercial Street.

Sitting on aavenport in the Daily house were Mrs. Huitt and Washington, who observed Mrs. Ochoa step inside the doorway and point the rifle at Mrs. Huitt, discharging it. The bullet struck the victim in the thigh and Mrs. Ochoa ran from the dwelling. She later appeared with her attorney and surrendered to police.

Mrs. Huitt was taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital where she died of her wound during the same evening of the shooting.

3 Arraigned On Burglary In Alturas

ALTURAS — Three boys were arraigned Tuesday, March 26, on charges stemming from a burglary spree in the Jess Valley area, south of Alturas, early Saturday morning.

Paul Clark, 18, and James Yarbrough, 18, arraigned before Judge Leo Stiles, were released on bond pending a preliminary hearing to be held April 2. A 17-year-old juvenile involved was arraigned before the juvenile court and released into the custody of his parents pending a further hearing.

The burglaries of the Flournoy Grocery in Likely and four resort cabins in Jess Valley were reported to the sheriff's office in Alturas on Saturday morning by the store owner, Harry Flournoy.

Investigating officer, John Hagerman, said information leading to the arrest of the boys was obtained from a local rancher. The rancher reported seeing a Ford pickup truck traveling through the area during the early Saturday morning hours.

Hagerman investigated at the home of the owners of the truck shop and subsequently picked up the three youths. They were charged with stealing fishing tackle and cigarettes from the Flournoy Store and miscellaneous articles from the four cabins.

Pilot Tells Of Survival After Arctic Crash

WHITEHORSE, Yukon (UPI) — This was my first accident and I've flown about 430 hours in about 12 years.

It must have been meant to happen.

But I'm glad it's all over, and some day I hope to write a book about it all.

I kept a diary for some of the time, but then stopped. I'm going back to my plane to get it before

going home to California, and I will write a book about my experiences.

How did it happen?

It was bad weather and heavy fog.

Run Into Fog

We were following a course which was to take us to Fort St. John (British Columbia).

Suddenly we ran into the bad weather and fog. I lost contact with my radio beam and I didn't know our direction.

Everything was happening at once.

I dropped from seven-thousand feet to three-thousand feet to try and get below the fog to get my bearings.

I was also trying to get back in contact with the radio beam.

One of my gasoline tanks was just about empty and I wanted to use every drop before switching to another one.

Begin To Drop

When I was about to change tanks, the one I was flying on became exhausted.

We began to drop. The other tank didn't switch over.

I could see the trees coming at me.

One wing caught in a tree. Then we crashed.

I must have been unconscious

At night we could hear wild-cats crying.

But I carried a Bible and this gave us inspiration.

We both read from the Bible every day. There were no special verses or chapters that gave us courage. They all did.

I left Helen alone for a week when I went down the mountain to make an SOS in the snow, and she came through fine.
