Police Join Crime Study Of Juveniles

Chief of Police Charles Howard announced that the Klamath Falls Police Department is participating in a nation-wide study of police functions in juvenile crime in cooperation with the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Inc.

The study, involving many police departments and thousands of individual officers in all sections of the nation, is being financed by the President's Committee on Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime. Local officers are being asked to express their views about pertinent aspects of the juvenile crime problem based upon their first-hand, on-the-spot experience.

The findings will be analyzed at the Washington, D.C., headquarters of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Submissions based on the experience of local officers will materially assist in clarifying the police role in what has become an increasingly serious problem throughout the country.

Preliminary examination of returns indicates that had home conditions and incompetent or neglectful parents are more often than not at the root of the difficulty where repeating juvenile criminals are involved. A firm, "no nonsense" attitude on the part of police, coupled with proper discipline by responsible parents, has been found effective in straightening out youngsters who run afoul of the law.

Chief Howard said police have no desire to punish children. The police job is to prevent crime and to protect the lives and property of all citizens.

"Close cooperation between the police, the courts, the schools and other community agencies, and especially parents, is the key to effective action," the chief said.

Journalism Alumni Meet

Reminiscences of years gone by will be exchanged by University of Oregon School of Journalism alumni who attend the 50th Anniversary Reunion of the School, Saturday, April 6.

The day-long celebration will include a luncheon at the Erb Memorial Student Union on the university campus, an afternoon open house and coffee hour in Allen Hall (which houses the School of Journalism) and dinner at the Eugene Hotel.

John L. Hulteng, dean of the School of Journalism, said probably 100 to 200 former journalism students will attend the reunion. The journalism school has approximately 1,350 alumni who are pursuing careers in all corners of the world.

One of the school's outstanding graduates, E. P. Hoyt, publisher and editor of the Denver Post, will be at the university several days prior to the reunion, as a 50th Anniversary visiting lecturer at the school.

Hoyt and other distinguished alumni will give short talks concerning the various eras of the school's history during the Saturday dinner. Former Dean George S. Turnbull also will speak. The dinner at 6:30 p.m., will be preceded by a cocktail hour at 5:30 p.m.

Dog Study Course Set

DUNSMUIR — A ten-week dog obedience course will be given in Dunsmuir beginning March 29, Dr. J. W. Reynolds, course coordinator, has announced.

Robert Hyatt, Redding, will instruct at the weekly sessions each Friday at the Dunsmuir ball-park from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

The \$20 fee for the course is to cover instruction costs and all proceeds over actual expenses will be donated to the American Field Service program, Dr. Reynolds said.

Registration on Friday at 7 p.m. will be for dog owners and accompanying dogs must be on leashes. A demonstration of basic obedience and dog handling will be given.

In announcing the course, Dr. Reynolds stressed it is open to all breeds and all persons living in Siskiyou County or Northern "Shasta County."

TWO CUBANS KILLED — Two Cubans were killed and a third wounded trying to reach American territory at Guantanamo Naval Base, Rep. William C. Cramer, R-Fla., said Tuesday.

Cramer said the three were shot last week by Cuban soldiers who man the fence around the American base. Cramer, who just returned from a Defense Department tour of Guantanamo, said the shootings "indicated the oppressive measures needed to keep Cubans in Cuba."

Barbara has twice attended 4-H summer school, served as a summer school counselor, and actively participated in many county and state fair programs. During her freshman year of college she led a 4-H project at the Children's Farm Home in Corvallis.

In recent years Barbara has made her home in Salem with her parents, who are in the restaurant business, and two younger brothers, one a college freshman and one a sophomore in high school. Mrs. Blott served as a 4-H Club leader.

After a short orientation program at Corvallis and in two western Oregon counties, she will move to Lakeview where she will live in one of the Ostrom Apartments.

THE DOCTOR SAYS Heart Attack Can Be Just Neurosis

When is a heart attack not a heart attack? The answer: when it is a cardiac neurosis.

A cardiac neurosis is not imaginary but it is an unusual awareness of the heart's action in a person who is given to undue worry. Oddly enough, cardiac neurosis is far more common than organic heart disease, an ailment due to structural change in some part of the heart.

The normal healthy person, although his heart is beating away like a trip hammer some 80 times a minute, is unconscious of his heart because his mind is busy receiving impressions from outside his body. That, incidentally, is the key point in all neuroses—an abnormal awareness of things that are happening inside the body whether it be the heart, the lungs, or the organs of digestion.

When any one of us gets unusually excited we may be aware that the heart is pounding but we do not worry about it and the normal rate and rhythm are quickly re-established. In a person with a cardiac neurosis, however, palpitations are brought on by such trivial occurrences as the ringing of the telephone, or a loud noise. They may even occur without any recognizable cause.

Skipped beats and other forms of cardiac irregularity occur in many persons without arousing in them any appreciation of their presence and they may be discov-

ered only on an electrocardiogram. On the other hand the person with a cardiac neurosis is so keenly attuned to his inner mechanisms that he is not only aware of every skipped beat but is greatly disturbed by them even though he has been told that they are harmless.

What causes this concentration on ourselves is almost always some emotional problem, some failure to adjust to one's life situation. The roots of this failure often go back to childhood. If, therefore, you consult your doctor about your heart and he assures you that it shows no signs of disease, perhaps you should open up and tell him about the things that upset your day to day living. Many a person with a cardiac neurosis, when asked by the doctor to discuss the worries and fears, replies that he hasn't a worry in the world.

Such a person is wasting the time of both himself and the doctor. If you can't tell your doctor your innermost secrets you should either change your doctor or take up stargazing.

Don't worry about shocking the doctor, because he has already heard many stories more bizarre than yours. No matter how painful the telling of it, you will find in your doctor sympathy and understanding — never censure or revulsion. And besides, once you have blurted out what you could never tell another living being, you will have a feeling of relief.

MOUNT SHASTA—Figures released last week by the State Board of Equalization revealed that Mount Shasta had the highest percentage increase in retail sales of any city in Siskiyou County during the second quarter of 1962, as compared to the same period in 1961.

A comparison of 1961 third quarter figures with 1962 third quarter figures showed Mount Shasta had \$1,146,000 against \$948,000.

and increase of 21 per cent. Other percentage increases were Yreka, 14 per cent; Montague, 13 per cent, and Weed, two per cent. The other cities in the county showed decreases in sales.

Siskiyou County as a whole showed a five per cent increase in retail sales for the quarter. Mount Shasta had shown a decrease in 1961, as compared to 1960 and 1959, but the 1962 figures were above all previous years for the third quarter.
