Highway Endorsed By Chamber

Toronto, according to George Callison, manager of the chamber. If the eastern route is approved as the official Pan American Highway, the association will press for the designation of its proposed route as Pan American Highway West, according to information made available to Callison.

He said further that the Okanagan Cariboo Trail Association is the oldest highway organization in existence in the United States, and perhaps predates similar groups everywhere.

Callison also commented on another organization, but that one was commercial—one that would seem to have a great economic effect on the area.

The subject of his remarks was the Hayden-Newport Chemical Company of New York which indicated that it would open a plant in the Bend-Klamath Falls area sometime before 1968 to extract elements from tree stumps to produce products such as resin and turpentine. The tree stumps would come from two million tons of pine stumps in the Winema, Deschutes and Fremont national forests for which the company bid \$2.27 per ton at a bid opening in Portland Monday. One of the requirements of the bid notice was that the successful bidder open a plant in the Bend-Klamath Falls area to separate the extracts from the stumps.

Callison stated that the firm indicated its interest in the stumpage in September, 1960, and had contacted the chamber about the matter several times since that date. He told of two visits representatives of the company made to Klamath Falls to explore the possibility of opening a plant here.

The first took place several years ago when members of the firm talked with Callison and returned to their plant with specimens of the stumps. On their next visit, they shipped a freight car load of the material to be used in tests.

In another report, Dick Green, chairman of the Upper Klamath Lake and Recreation Commission, stated that the Oregon State Game Commission would conduct field trips to Summer Lake, Silver Lake and Bly April 6 through 8, with the intention of showing sportsmen "that deer are there."

Green said that deer hunters and other interested people are invited to join the tours but they must first contact the game commission before doing so.

The tours developed as the result of a near statewide protest from deer hunters last fall. The hunters argued that the game commission's policy of conducting doe and antlerless hunts had resulted in decimating deer herds in various parts of the state. The outcry resulted in the state legislature setting up an interim study committee to study management, practices and policies of the game commission.

However, the committee voted to boost funds budgeted by Kennedy for some other programs, including construction of additional campaign and picnicking facilities in national parks.

Jury Handed Ochiho Case

The case of Zelma Joan Ochiho, 41, accused of first degree murder in the slaying of Florence Baker Huit, 26, March 19, was bound over to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing in district court Thursday at 3:30 p.m.

Mrs. Ochiho is accused of slaying Mrs. Huit, her cousin, with a .308 caliber rifle at 616 Commercial Street at about 7 p.m.

Present at the time of the shooting was Eddie Dailey, owner of the house, and Otis Washington. Dailey said he was in the kitchen at the time and heard the shot, but didn't see it fired. He said when he turned he saw Mrs. Ochiho with the rifle in her hand, leaving the building.

Washington said he was sitting on the davenport with Mrs. Baker and saw Mrs. Ochiho enter the house, point the gun and fire.

House Cuts JFK Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee took its first swing today at President Kennedy's record budget, chopping off 9 per cent of his request for the Interior Department and Forest Service.

Nevertheless, the economy drive on its first test fell short of the target which some conservatives insist must be met before Congress would be justified in yielding to Kennedy's plea for a \$10.3 billion tax cut.

The first regular money bill, which the committee sent to the House floor for action next week, carried \$935,690,000 for Interior and the Forest Service for the fiscal year starting July 1. This is \$92,818,000 less than Kennedy asked.

But the total is \$37,508,200 more than Congress made available for the same agencies last year. It topped by \$9,678,200, or 1 per cent, total funds that will be available for the current fiscal year, if pending administration requests are approved.

Ailing Hero Said Better

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — World War I hero Sgt. Alvin C. York, ailing with chest pains, was listed in "very good condition" today in St. Thomas Hospital.

Dr. Jack Witherspoon said York, 75, is suffering a contusion of the chest and "traumatic pleurisy" probably incurred when York rolled off his bed at home last week.

York's wife accompanied him Wednesday in an ambulance from his home in Pall Mall, Tenn., near the Kentucky border, to the hospital.

Witherspoon said York's condition is much better than it was last summer when he was hospitalized for continued internal bleeding.

Mrs. York said, "He don't want anybody to say he fell out of bed. He says he just rolled out of bed."

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Civil Defense Operates During Wednesday Storm

SALEM (UPI) — Oregon's Civil Defense Agency, caught off guard by the Columbus Day storm and threatened with dismemberment by the legislature, battled for its life during Wednesday's windstorm.

Director Robert W. Sandstrom, four of his staff and three reserve radio operators were on duty to trace the path of the storm and gather reports from the statewide CD radio network.

At 10:40 p.m. Wednesday Sandstrom issued a "well done" to 24 stations in 17 counties.

He said three state networks were operating at state civil defense headquarters. State police, forestry, motor vehicles, highway and National Guard units were in contact throughout the storm.

At the county and local level, professional and volunteer civil defense personnel were on duty.

phone and children were sent home as soon as he was given weather reports from Medford at 2:30 p.m.

Through the police radio in Myrtle Point, Endicott relayed the warning to each city in the county, and notified two commercial radio stations.

Endicott reported damage and weather conditions to the state agency during the evening.

In Lincoln County, CD Director Ruel Saxton got a storm warning from the sheriff's office at 1 p.m. Saxton notified city and county government agencies, alerted local radio stations, and then moved into the courthouse communications center with auxiliary power for the next seven hours.

Sandstrom said the entire operation "improved since the jolt of the Columbus Day storm and radio operations were far more efficient this time."

The agency has been under heavy fire from legislators.

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Record Use Of Power Shown In PPL's Report

PORTLAND—Record high use of electricity by customers of Pacific Power & Light Company and completion of major power transmission interconnections for delivery of new power supplies to its service areas marked progress of the company during 1962, stockholders were told Thursday.

In the year's annual report to shareholders, Paul B. McKee, chairman of the Board of Directors, said PPL's 396,466 electric customers used 7,371,407,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity, a gain of 5.4 per cent over power use in the year previous.

The record use also pushed the one-day peak load on the system to a new high of 1,684,000 kilowatts, more than 100,000 kilowatts above the peak of the previous winter.

Residential consumers used an average of 9,111 kilowatt-hours, a gain of 325 KW/h over 1961, and a total that is more than double the national average household use. In most Oregon and Washington districts the average use exceeds 10,000 kilowatt-hours annually, the company noted.

Supplying electric and the other utility services to 240 western communities and neighboring agricultural areas resulted in total operating revenues of \$100,158,000, an increase of 6.1 per cent. The earnings of the company, after provisions for the preferred share dividends, amounted to \$18,296,000 compared with \$15,530,000 in 1961.

The earnings were equivalent to \$1.28 per share on the 14,276,323 shares of common outstanding at the end of the year compared with \$1.15 per share on the 13,445,978 shares outstanding at the end of 1961. Four quarterly dividends of 24 cents a common share were declared.
