Educators' Cooperation Wins Praise

SALEM (UPI) — The men who have been representing higher education at the legislature got some praise Wednesday from the Ways and Means subcommittee on education.

"We have found them most cooperative," said Sen. Ward Cook, D-Portland, of chancellor R. E. Lieualten and his staff.

"Ways and Means has no criticism about cooperation from the chancellor." Other members generally agreed.

The praise was in contrast to a statement made Tuesday by House Speaker Clarence Barton.

Delay harged In an attack on Gov. Mark Hatfield, Barton said the governor's agencies were delaying legislative business by failing to cooperate.

He said higher education had not produced enrollment figures requested two weeks earlier.

A Ways and Means member, Sen. Daniel Thiel, D - Astoria, said the committee never made a specific request for the figures. He added the subcommittee wasn't ready to use the figures yet anyway.

The committee devoted its meeting to a discussion of which higher education buildings should be financed by general fund money and which by bonding.

Other Highlights Elections—The House Elections Committee approved a bill to change the primary election date from the third Friday to the fourth Tuesday in May. It killed a bill to move the primary election date to September.

Tax—The House Tax Committee voted to introduce a bill to put a 10 per cent tax on transient lodging "so the committee can consider it," Rep. Richard Eymann, D - Marcola, said it would raise about \$6.5 million.

Hospital—Officials of the Oregon State Mental Hospital denied that a staff shortage is causing patient deaths, but said it is true the hospital needs more nurses.

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Easy Traffic Arrest Bill Gets First Okay

SALEM (UPI) — A major traffic safety bill that would let officers make arrests without witnessing a traffic accident was approved today by the House Judiciary Committee.

The committee killed bills to let cameras into courtrooms and to make it easier to prosecute motor scooter riders who ride in federal forests where they aren't supposed to.

The traffic arrest bill is a key

part of Gov. Mark Hatfield's traffic safety program. It would let an officer make an arrest for "probable cause."

Officers feel the present law prohibits them from making arrests without seeing an accident, even when they arrive at an accident scene and find a motorist staggering around who obviously had been drinking.

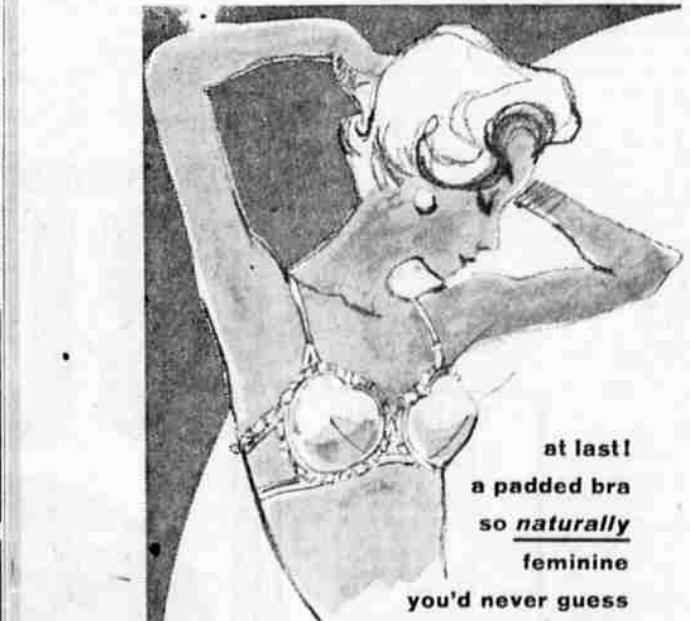
The courtroom bill killed by the committee would have allowed television cameras and radio microphones into courtrooms as well as other public meetings. It was backed by the radio and television industries.

Testimony against it included the argument that such decisions belong to the judiciary, not the legislature. Opponents also said it would disrupt courtroom procedure. It was opposed by the American Bar Association, whose Canon 35 opposes cameras in courtrooms.

The scooter bill would have let state courts prosecute violators. Only federal courts now can do so, and they usually have more important business to attend to.

The committee approved a bill to let the superintendent of public instruction initiate action against a teacher on a complaint from another teacher, an administrator, or a statewide organization.
