Suit Makes Most Tricks

Some people like to fool around with Stayman and use the response even with no interest in a major suit.

The only time that I respond two clubs without at least one four card or longer major suit is when I am interested in a minor suit slam and plan to follow my two club call with a bid of three in my minor suit.

Thus, when I bid two clubs and jumped to three no-trump over my partner's two spade bid he knew that I had four hearts. Hence, with four hearts in addition to the four spades he had already shown he went to the heart game.

In rubber bridge the contract would not have meant much. He had nine easy tricks at no-trump. But the game was duplicate and he managed to make five odd in hearts for a top score.

He won the opening club in his own hand and promptly led a diamond. East won with his ace and returned a trump. Now South was ready to go after 11 tricks. He won with his ace, led a club to dummy's ace, ruffed a club with the jack of trumps, entered dummy by leading his deuce of trumps, ruffed the last club with his last trump, led a spade to dummy's king, played out dummy's last two trumps on which he discarded low spades and led another diamond.

West made his king and South made the last two tricks with the ace of spades and queen of diamonds.

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Outbreak Of Asian Flu Said Possible On West Coast

A chance of an outbreak of Asian flu on the West Coast is still possible, the U.S. Communicable Disease Center warned today, but the epidemic that felled thousands elsewhere in the nation has waned.

A spokesman for the center in Atlanta, Ga., said the epidemic definitely had passed its crest in the eastern and midwestern states.

"We are watching the West Coast," he said. "There have been isolated cases in California but no evidence there will be an epidemic in that state."

About 200 of the 4,000 elderly patients in a state hospital in San Joaquin County were stricken with an unidentified respiratory ailment. In Northern California, 11 cases of influenza were reported, but the patients were separated as much as 200 to 300 miles.

Los Angeles epidemiologist B.A. Kogan said chances were better than 50 per cent an outbreak of Asian flu would occur in about two weeks. He said, however, there has been no undue outbreak of respiratory ailments so far and an escape from a siege was still possible.

Washington officials confirmed the fourth case of Asian flu in the state Wednesday and studied blood specimens that could be flu. School absenteeism was reported slightly above average by the respiratory ailment.

Asian flu also was confirmed in Arizona.

Idaho showed a big increase last week in the flu. The number of reported patients jumped from 123 the previous week to 633. However, the Idaho Department of Health has not isolated the Asian strain yet.

In Iowa, an outbreak of flu reached epidemic proportions in the capital city of Des Moines. The outbreak first appeared about two weeks ago, City-County Health Director James F. Speers said, and was expected to last another

two or three weeks.

Speers said the outbreak has not been definitely typed as Asian flu but it is different here when every other city but said it undoubtedly was since it has been having Asian flu."

The hardest hit areas earlier [Ohio, Alabama and Baltimore] case occurred in a military camp this year were in southwestern where it was believed the first early in January.

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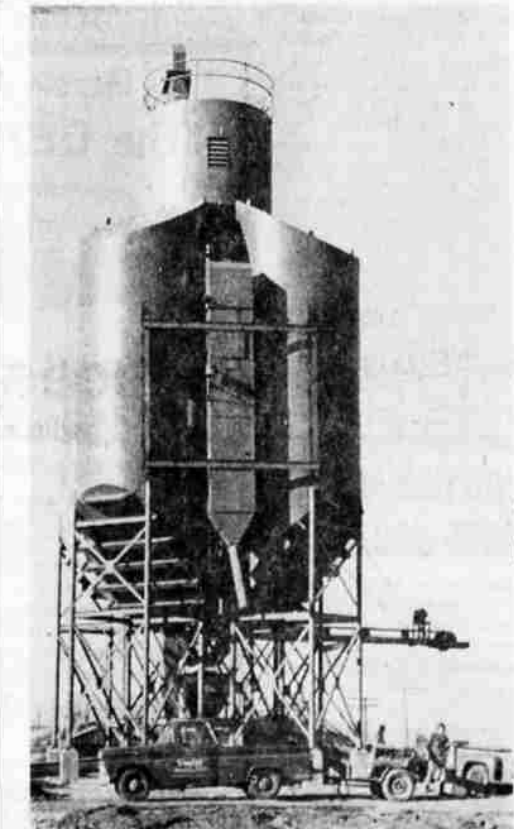
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
