

Liner Lands After Bolt Rips Nose

NEW YORK (UPI)—A jetliner struck by lightning as it rose from London landed safely here Friday. A clergyman aboard disclosed that the bolt from the sky had elicited prayer.

The Trans World Airlines Boeing 707 went back to London airport, was repaired quickly, and proceeded to New York, but some of the passengers remembered vividly the "flash of light" and the "sound like thunder."

The Rev. Roy L. Newton, 32, pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Fountain Inn, S. C., kept a brief log of events after the lightning tore a 21-by-8-inch hole in the plane's nose.

"I was watching the landscape when I was blinded by a firebrand and deafened by a clap of sound like thunder," he said. "I thought the engine had gone and prayed for everyone on board."

"For about five minutes none of us knew what happened," Newton said. "Then we were notified over the public address system that a little static electricity had struck the nose cone and that we were going to return to London."

The pilot, Capt. Robert Buck of Westfield, N. J., brought the plane down safely at London after circling for 35 minutes over western England jettisoning 10,000 gallons of fuel.

Among the 110 passengers aboard when the lightning hit were actor Warren Beatty, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer President Robert O'Brien, and another MGM executive, Maurice Silverstein.

These three chose to return to New York aboard another plane, but apparently were not ruffled by the incident.

Racial Tension Eases In Vote Signup Uproar

GREENWOOD, Miss. (UPI)—Tension eased a bit in this racially-troubled Mississippi community Saturday with Negro leaders apparently planning to forego demonstrations for the weekend.

No new voter registration meetings for today were announced when, for the fourth night in a row, Negroes jammed a church to hear civil rights workers challenge the tradition of segregation.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy was asked to "take effective action" to protect Negroes from economic reprisals by whites who seek to discourage Negroes from registering to vote.

James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, wired Kennedy late Friday that a Negro field hand and his family of 14 had been ordered off a Leflore County plantation because the man, Jesse Crain, refused to take his name off voter registration lists. Farmer charged that Crain was told by foreman Joseph Turner to be off the W. R. Bonds plantation by Monday.

Police broke up Friday two more attempted Negro registration marches and arrested one of the marchers on disturbing the peace charges.

About 40 would-be applicants marched toward the Leflore courthouse in one group despite police orders. However, they split into groups of twos and threes when ordered to do so and were permitted to proceed.

Police arrested Donald Harris, 22 of New York, when he "chose

a third route when offered one of two routes."

Eight "ringleaders" of an earlier demonstration were sentenced to four months in jail and fined \$200 in city court Friday. The eight, handled the maximum sentences for disturbing the peace, were among 11 arrested Wednesday, the first day of Negro marches.

The eight were led to their cells singing "Everybody wants freedom," and their attorney, Wiley Branton, a Negro, indicated they would not post appeal bond to get out of jail.

MALIN—Mrs. Sarah Laxton, 69, a resident of the Malin community for 14 years, died March 29 at her home in Malin, apparently following a heart attack.

Mrs. Laxton had visited the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. James Falliee, had returned to her own home and apparently died following a sudden attack. She was found by a neighbor.

She was a member of St. Augustine's Catholic Church and of the Altar Society in Merrill. She was a registered nurse.

Recitation of the Rosary will be at 8 p.m. Monday, April 1, at Ward's Klamath Funeral Home. A requiem mass will be at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 2, from St. Augustine's Church, followed by final rites and interment in Mt. Calvary Cemetery.

Survivors include one son, James Falliee of Malin; two sisters, Mrs. W. C. (Elizabeth) Dalton, Malin, Miss Nora Sullivan, Klamath Falls; also three grandchildren.

SEARCH FOR VICTIMS — In Tucson, Ariz., rescue workers continue searching for additional victims after an explosion at a cleaning plant in the downtown area. Latest count listed six dead and at least 25 injured. The explosion was so severe that it hurled a 220-pound chunk of reinforced concrete through the roof of a shop 200 yards away. There were 37 persons in the building at the time of the explosion. Some are in critical condition.

Rescuers Probe Cleaning Plant Ruins For Victims Of Explosion

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI)—Ruins of a blast-shattered cleaning plant were searched Saturday for more victims of an explosion that killed six persons and injured more than 30 others.

Scores of volunteers, firemen, policeman and city employees dug through the rubble. Two large cranes lifted slabs of concrete and steel that once formed the Supreme Cleaners plant near downtown Tucson.

Fire Chief John Freeman described the explosion as the worst disaster in city history. The cause still was undetermined. At first, officials guessed the plant's boilers had exploded. But rescuers searching through the debris found them intact.

The explosion ripped the half-block building about midway Friday punching out a corner of the plant's brick wall, caving in the room and breaking plate glass windows in nearby businesses.

Collapse of a wall on the north side of the plant buried a half-

dozen of the more than 40 persons inside. Three woman employees were blown into the middle of the street. Two bodies were found in the debris of the fallen wall. A sixth body was recovered from the basement of the building.

Victims included a mother of four, Mrs. Harman Tovar, 32; and a teen-aged mother of two, Mrs. Cecilia Aros, 19. Also dead were Francis Conyers, 51; Vedilia King, 33; Martin Seeswelinus, 32;
