## Slam Made By Stayman

In my personal form of Stayman, I use immediate three club and three diamond responses to show bad hands. If I am interested in a minor suit slam I respond with a Stayman two-club and follow with a bid of three in my minor.

North and South have 12 top tricks at no-trump, but can only make a grand slam in clubs. In a recent Fort Worth tournament most pairs played six no-trump, but my son Jim and Joe Miller reached the club grand slam.

There was nothing to the play, but the bidding is worthy of comment. Jim's two club bid followed by three clubs showed slam interest. Joe's no-trump not only included the maximum 17 high card points, but also his cards were perfect for clubs and Joe decided to raise clubs as a prelude to further bids.

Jim spoiled some of Joe's ideas by going into the Blackwood routine. Joe showed his three aces and Jim continued with five no-trump.

Joe showed one king and Jim went to six no-trump. He wasn't sure of the club grand slam because he didn't know about the queen of clubs.

However, Joe knew about the queen of clubs. He had it. He said to himself, "I couldn't show up with three aces and two kings. That would be 18 points. Jim must have an ace and three kings and seven clubs should make easily." Joe bid the seven clubs.

## House Cuts BLM Budget On OC Land

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Appropriations Committee Thursday cut \$540,000 from the proposed Bureau of Land Management budget for Oregon's O & C timberlands, and suggested a review of the formula by which counties get three-fourths of timber revenues from the land.

The committee approved \$8,220,800 for forestry management work.

The committee said this would impose no hardship on the 18 O & C counties because BLM got an extra \$1.5 million for access roads from the accelerated Public Works Act.

Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore., said of more concern was the proposed formula review.

Rep. Michael Kirwan, D-Ohio, has contended that Oregon counties get too much of the timber money.

The counties get 75 per cent of the O & C revenue and the U.S. gets 25 per cent. The counties allow BLM to use one-third of their money for timber access roads. In fiscal 1962 the counties got some \$15 million.

## Stitt Organ Show Slated

Organist Frank Stitt, a popular entertainer and native of the West Coast, will appear at the Willard Hotel Tuesday at 7:45 p.m. for a full evening of organ music.

Audiences have enjoyed his lively shows from the Midwest to the Pacific, and he has made additional fans via a number of recordings made on the Baldwin Electric Organ.

He majored in organ at the University of Redlands and began his professional career as a church organist and supper club entertainer in the Los Angeles area.

He built his characteristic popular style on the foundation of traditional organ training that began when he was 8 years old. In addition to starting piano lessons, common with children that age, he took on pipe organ lessons, as well.

Stitt's stint with the Air Force included entertaining American servicemen stationed in the Philippines at the last stages of World War II.

He returned to Chicago after the war and became acquainted with the new Baldwin Electronic Organ soon after it was introduced to the public. He became the first Baldwin staff organist, traveling the country giving concerts, television performances and civic engagements of various kinds.

His most recent recording was made on a Model 45H Baldwin Organ in the famous Organ Loft at Salt Lake City.

## Police Find Stolen Gems In Hock Shop

ROME (UPI)—Police recovered from a pawn shop Friday a diamond and platinum necklace that was part of the \$600,000 in jewels stolen from American socialist Countess Mona von Bismarck, who as the former Mrs. Harrison Williams was known as "the best dressed woman in the world."

It was the first break in the theft of a fabulous collection of jewels from the countess' apartment in the historic 16th Century Borghese Palace sometime Thursday.

Police sent out an international alarm for Angelo Valentini, 32, the Bismarcks' butler, who disappeared after telling his wife that he had previously pawned gold plates, matching candelabra and a silver platter belonging to the Bismarcks.

The butler's wife, Maria, who works as a maid for the Bismarcks, told them of her husband's confession and disappearance after they returned from a visit to the fabulous Isle of Capri.

The Bismarcks immediately began looking for the family jewels which they had just brought back with them. The jewels were gone and the police were called.

Among the missing items was a diamond necklace valued at \$100,000, an antique emerald necklace worth \$80,000, and a pair of diamond earrings valued at \$48,000.

One of the lesser baubles, the diamond and platinum necklace worth \$8,000, turned up today in the pawn shop. Police said it had been pawned for \$656 Thursday afternoon by a man who produced an identity card made out to Angelo Valentini.

## Former Justice Given 3 Years

EUGENE (UPI)—Carl M. Lewis, former justice of the peace at Springfield, Tuesday was sentenced to three years in the State Penitentiary for conversion of public funds.

Circuit Judge Edward Howell pronounced the sentence. Lewis, 56, was dismissed as justice of the peace after being convicted by a Circuit Court jury earlier this month.

## Colonel Admits Evaluation Team Leaned To Boeing Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Air Force colonel told senators in testimony made public Friday that he "reluctantly signed" documents putting a more favorable light on the General Dynamics Corp. design for the TFX warplane three months after the contract was awarded.

Civilian Pentagon officials overruled uniformed military leaders last Nov. 24 in awarding the multi-million dollar contract to General Dynamics rather than the Boeing Co.

Air Force Col. John L. Gregory told the Senate investigations subcommittee he made "an improvement decision" when he signed documents prepared Feb. 15 at the behest of Air Force Secretary Eugene Zuckert.

He said in testimony just released by the subcommittee that he had "some reservations" about the documents and now realizes their importance to the Senate investigation.

The documents concluded, in effect, that there was no significant difference in the ferry range or weapons capability that would give Boeing a clear advantage over General Dynamics.

Gregory was co-chairman of the evaluation group, which recommended Boeing as the prime contractor for the all-purpose supersonic Air Force-Navy fighter plane, which eventually is expected to cost more than \$6 million to produce.

He was questioned at length about the documents prepared after the award.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara sent the documents to the subcommittee to be used as the basis for questioning witnesses. Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., agreed to use the data, but dispute quickly erupted when Gregory disavowed them.
