Williams Happy With NY

New York Yankees' Manager As Told To Harry Grayson

It was common knowledge at the conclusion of last season that the Yankees needed just one thing—a big pitcher.

The New York club got what it wanted from the Los Angeles Dodgers in fireballing Stan Williams, who will round out a Big Four with Ralph Terry, Whitey Ford and Bill Stafford. Williams is only 28, enthusiastic about joining the World Champions and I expect him to be a substantial winner for several years.

We further bolstered our pitching by making Bill Kunkel our first draftee in 11 years. I remember the right-handed Kunkel, who is also 26, as a stalwart relief pitcher for Kansas City two years ago. The Athletics shipped him to Toronto last season, where he was 6 and 1 in 15 games with an earned-run average of 2.35 for 46 innings.

To obtain Williams we had to give up Moose Skowron, so the attention at our Fort Lauderdale training base this spring will be on young Joe Pepitone. There is no reason Pepitone can't make it at first base. He has indicated that he can handle the bat, possesses power, has defensive skill and runs well. But promise and performance are not necessarily identical.

If Pepitone doesn't make it all the way, we can fall back on Dale Long and Hector Lopez, a major league hitter whose position could be first base.

With Tony Kubek and Bobby Richardson as a double play combination, Clete Boyer at third base and probably Pepitone at first, we'll be strong defensively as well as offensively in the infield, where we are further protected by versatile Phil Lutz.

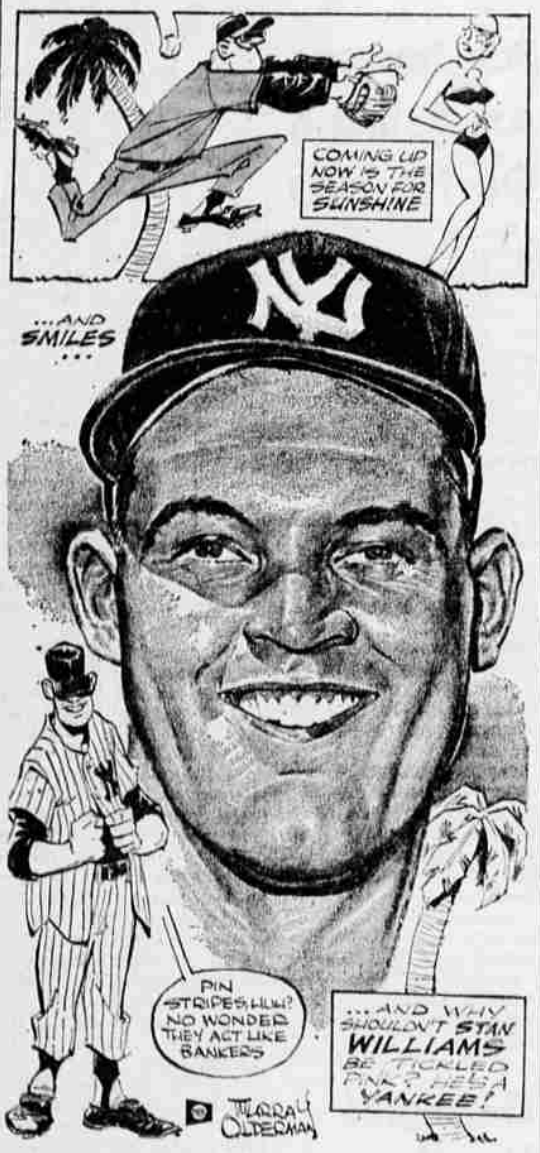
And where could you find an outfield combination excelling Tommy Tresh, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris?

Behind the plate, Elston Howard is backed up by Yogi Berra, now a part-time coach, and Johnny Blanchard.

The addition of Williams will help our middle and finishing relief pitchers as well as our spot starters. Jim Coates, Bud Daley, Hector Brown, Jim Bouton and Roland Sheldon scrap for the middle relief and spot starting jobs. I'm hoping that Luis Arroyo and Hal Reniff come back strongly to aid Marshall Bridges with the ball pen chores. Kunkel could figure here, too.

Last season did not produce the top performances that some Yankees had in 1961, so I believe I am not overly optimistic when I say there may be some improvement this trip, plus a couple of new faces. We start with the advantage of having Tony Kubek all the way along the route.

Overall the Yankees are young and still the team to beat.



Ex-Yank, Wilcy Moore, Dies At Oklahoma Home

HOLLIS, Okla. (UPI)—Wilcy Moore, 1927, had been taken critically ill in Fort Worth, Tex., a week ago. He died at his home where he had returned to convalesce.

Services will be held in the Hollis First Methodist Church at 3 p.m., Sunday.

Moore's career was meteoric and relatively brief. He pitched in the majors from 1927 through 1933, five years with the Yankees and two with the Boston Red Sox, and had a 51-44 lifetime won-and-lost record.

Tiger-Fullmer Bout Slated

LAGOS, Nigeria (UPI)—The third world middleweight championship bout between champ Dick Tiger of Nigeria and ex-champ Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, will be held in this country in June or July, it was announced Saturday.

The announcement followed a meeting here among Chief J. M. Johnson, Nigeria's minister of labor and welfare whose jurisdiction includes sports; Marv Jensen, manager of Fullmer; British promoter Jack Solomons; and Jersey Jones and Bobby Diamond pilots of Tiger.

Site of the bout, according to the announcement, would be the outdoor Liberty Stadium at Ibadan.

Solomons, Jensen, Jones and Diamond arrived here by plane Thursday to hold their conference and to inspect the Ibadan site suggested by the government.

The government is willing to guarantee 65,000 pounds (\$125,000) of the costs. The four visitors toured Liberty Stadium and the Navy Gymnasium facilities at Ibadan University and agreed they liked what they saw.

Mets-Phils

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—The New York Mets equalled their entire victory total for the 1962 spring training season Saturday when they beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-1, behind the strong pitching of Al Jackson and Carlton Wiley.

The victory was the Mets' 12th in 21 games this spring. Their spring record last year was 12-15.

Tigers-Reds

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI)—Bubba Phillips continued his lousy hitting Saturday to pace the Detroit Tigers to a 5-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

The Tiger third baseman, who singled twice and tripled in four trips to the plate Saturday, now has 16 hits in 23 at bats in his last six games.

Cubs-Red Sox

MESA, Ariz. (UPI)—Infielders Ron Santo and Ernie Banks slugged home runs Saturday as the Chicago Cubs whipped the Boston Red Sox, 9-4, for their third successive Cactus League victory.

Santo, who is now hitting .330, connected for a three-run homer off Bill Monbouquette in the third inning when the Cubs batted around for five runs. Banks got his homer off Jack Lamabe with the bases empty in the seventh and also had a pair of doubles in his first two times at bat against Monbouquette.

Pirates-A's

FORT MYERS, Fla. (UPI)—Pinch-hitter Don Clendenon's single in the 11th inning gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 3-2 victory over the Kansas City Athletics Saturday.

The Pirates scored two runs in the first inning off John Wyatt. Wyatt and Dave Thies held Pittsburgh scoreless until the 11th. Al McBean became the first Pirate pitcher to go nine innings.

Snider Deal

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers advised the New York Mets Saturday they want a few more days before deciding whether they will sell their veteran outfielder Duke Snider.

Buzzy Bavasi, Dodger general manager, told Mets President George Weiss on March 29 that he would "make him a proposition within 10 days" about a deal for Snider.

Angels-Colts

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI)—The Los Angeles Angels, behind the shutout pitching of Ken McBride and Dan Osinski, lashed 13 hits off three Houston pitchers and blanked the Colts 8-0 Saturday in a Cactus League game.

McBride pitched eight innings, giving up only five hits, and Osinski pitched the final frame, yielding only two hits.

Maxwell, Crampton In Second Place

WILMINGTON, N. C. (UPI)—Little Jerry Barber, despite three fateful holes, fired a two-under-par 70 Saturday to retain the lead in the \$22,500 Azalea Open golf tournament at the end of the third round.

Barber, one of the oldest and smallest pros in the 15th annual event, posted a 54-hole score of 207, one stroke better than Australian Bruce Crampton and chunky Billy Maxwell.

Crampton fired the day's low round, a seven-under-par 63, to come from far back in the field.

The 137-pound Barber, who fired rounds of 69 and 68 earlier, picked up six birdies. He holed putts of 45 feet on the second hole, 20 feet on the fourth, 15 feet on the sixth, 25 feet on the ninth, and 35 feet on the 12th.

On the par-four 14th hole he dropped his approach shot just 15 feet in front of the cup and rattled down a 15-foot putt for his sixth birdie.

But he ran into trouble on the seventh when he missed a three-footer and three-putted for a bogey five.

Barber, a 47-year-old Los Angeles pro, drove his tee shot out of bounds on the 11th and was forced to take another shot. It cost him a two-stroke penalty and a double bogey six on the par-four hole.

He bogied the 16th when he missed an eight-footer.

Gambling Law Guilt Admitted For Boxing

PORTLAND (UPI)—Five Portland men pleaded guilty in Federal Court Wednesday to charges of conspiracy to violate federal gaming laws. The charges stemmed from alleged operation of a numbers racket.

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Don Drysdale Pitches Dodgers To Victory, May Get Opening Spot

Durable Don Drysdale, 1962 winner of the Cy Young Award, has a great conversation piece to help Los Angeles Dodgers manager Walt Alton make up his mind for an opening day pitcher.

Drysdale, a 25-game winner last season and the National League's strikeout king, went the nine-inning route Friday in defeating the Kansas City Athletics, 12-1, on six hits.

The big righthander displayed his peak exhibition season power on the mound when he shut out the A's except for a lone run in the third inning. During the 1962 grand, Drysdale compiled a 2.84 earned run average.

Los Angeles ripped the serves of Dave Wickersham and Ed Rakow for 16 hits. Dick Tracewski led the Dodger assault with three singles and a double, while Willie Davis drove in three runs with three hits.

Cards Down Yankees

The St. Louis Cardinals handed the New York Yankees their 13th defeat of the Grapefruit League season, 3-2, when Bill White homered off Whitey Ford in the seventh inning to break a 2-2 tie.

Eddie Mathews hit the first homer in the new Municipal Stadium at West Palm Beach, Fla., as the Milwaukee Braves beat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2. Warren Spahn, Hank Fischer and Frank Funk issued seven hits for the Braves. Spahn went 6-2-3 innings but retired when a hot smash by Pete Ward bruised the veteran hurler's index finger on his pitching hand.

In a six-inning game following regular team play, the White Sox B squad beat a Milwaukee second team, 7-5.

Rocky Colavito whacked a homer, two singles and drove in three runs to lead the Detroit Tigers to an 8-5, 10-inning win over the New York Mets. The Tigers rattled three runs off Met pitching in the 10th, climaxed by Colavito's sacrifice fly.

Washington went 17 innings before nipping Minnesota, 3-2, on a throwing error by the Twins' Bernie Allen and a sacrifice fly by the Senators' Marv breeding. Minnesota slugger Harmon Killebrew was hit on the head by a Tom Cheney pitch, but X-rays proved negative.

Homers Pace Phils

Home runs by Johnny Callison and Wes Covington highlighted a five-run rally in the eighth inning that spirited the Philadelphia Phillies to an 8-5 decision over the Cincinnati Reds. Clay Dalrymple also homered for the Phils.

Jim Gentile's 400-foot homer helped ruin Vern Law's first spring appearance as Baltimore stopped Pittsburgh, 5-2. Milt Pappas pitched shutout ball for five innings to take the victory.

Gay Geiger belted two homers for the Boston Red Sox as the San Francisco Giants lost their fourth straight Cactus League game, 10-7. Roman Mejias and Frank Malzone also sent solid shots over the wall for the Sox.

Cleveland edged the Los Angeles Angels 2-1, on the combined four-hit itching of Sam McDowell and Joe Schaffernoth. In an earlier contest the Angels' B team squeaked past the Indians, 2-1.

Favorite Captures Sixth

HALLANDALE, Fla. (UPI)—Candy Spots, the sugar-coated colt from California, scored the sixth straight triumph of his undefeated career Saturday when he took the lead heading for the stretch and then galloped to victory in the \$114,700 Florida Derby at Gulfstream Park.

Jockey Willie Shoemaker, scoring his second triumph in the mile and one-eighth classic, went to bat in the stretch when Candy Spots appeared to loaf a bit and the handsome chestnut colt stepped out to win by four and one-half lengths over Mrs. C. D. Morgan's Sky Wonder with W. G. Hells Jr.'s Cool Prince a neck back in third.

Candy Spots, who heads north into the triple crown classic with an unblemished record, handled the mile and one-eighth in the rather slow time of 1:50.3-5. The oddly-marked Candy Spots, who had only two workouts since shipping in from California after his victory in the Santa Anita Derby, broke sixth when they left the post, with Walnut Hill Farm's Gray Pet on the head end.

Shoemaker had the colt in third place when they hit the first turn. When the field shoved its noses into the brisk breezes blowing down the back stretch, the "Shoe" had Candy Spots running second.

Shoemaker, who won the Florida Derby with Correlation in 1954, was content to let the speedy but short Gray Pet set the pace all the way to the far turn. Then he moved up and took over at the three-quarter pole, a head leader there, he had only a half-length margin on Gray Pet as they turned for home. But then the "Shoe" laid the bat against Candy Spots, golden hide and the colt ran away from a rather dull field.

GRID MEETING SET

TOLEDO, Ohio (UPI)—A meeting to outline complete details on the working agreements between the United Football League and the American Football League will be held here Saturday and Sunday.
