Kness Gets Eight-Year Jail Term

J. D. Kness, 38, who pleaded guilty to assault with a dangerous weapon in the wounding of his estranged wife, Gloria, at Bly, Feb. 26, was sentenced to eight years in the Oregon State Penitentiary, by Judge David R. Vandenberg in circuit court Monday.

Kness shot his wife four times in a running gun battle with her at the Bly home of Mrs. Doris Bell, his mother-in-law. Kness was hit by one of the 19 bullets that were fired in the battle between the pair.

After the wild shooting fracas, Kness brutally beat Mrs. Bell in her bedroom and was finally subdued when Buddy, his 12-year-old son, struck him over the head with an ashtray knocking him unconscious.

In November, 1962, Kness was arrested by city police after he held his wife and four children at gunpoint in a car parked on Main Street. He later went to the Salem state hospital for psychiatric examination and was released when the results were negative.

OLCC Leads Liquor Raid

The Oregon State Liquor Commission with the assistance of city police confiscated dozens of cases of illegal liquor and a slot machine at the Pastime Tavern, 804 Klamath Avenue, at 3:55 p.m. Saturday.

The "bootlegged" whiskey was found locked in a storeroom along with the gambling machine. The commission agent discovered the liquor when he went to the tavern to "inspect sanitary conditions."

When he told Otto Erlanson, proprietor, that he wanted to see what was in the locked storeroom, Erlanson said it was a restaurant not the tavern. Erlanson finally unlocked the door and the liquor was disclosed.

No charges have been brought against Erlanson yet, the district attorney's office disclosed.

Translator Delay Seen

A spokesman for Video Utility Corporation, has announced that a letter received from the Federal Communications Commission, dated March 18, 1963, advised that due to the opposing petition filed by Station KOTI-TV, this city, the application for translators to serve Klamath Falls may be delayed for an additional four to six months.

Local interests have sought for some time to establish the installation of translators to serve the Klamath Basin by bringing in other national broadcasting services, additional programs and equipment to serve all parts of the Basin.

The letter from FCC in part follows: "A petition to deny the applications filed by Video Utility Corporation has been filed by the Southern Oregon Broadcasting Company, licensee of Television Station KOTI Klamath Falls.

"For this reason your applications, the petition to deny these applications, and related responsive pleadings must be presented to the commission for its consideration. Commission rules require that applications must be processed as nearly as possible in the order in which they are received, it appears that it will be at least four to six months before your applications are reached in the processing line. You will be advised immediately upon commission action on the application."

Video advises that the plan to bring improved television service and programs to the Klamath Basin, will be carried to a "successful conclusion so that the people of the Klamath Basin may have a multiple source of television."

Milk Price Bill Questioned

SALEM (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said today that some provisions of a minimum milk price bill now before the legislature may not be constitutional.

He said "A serious constitutional question" would arise if an attempt were made to apply the language of the bill to regulate the price to be paid to out-of-state producers.

Thornton said the problem could be erased by adding an amendment to the measure, HB1576, stating that the measure would not apply to interstate commerce.

Molester May Provide Death Clue

PORTLAND (UPI) — A 44-year-old laborer was being questioned about the kidnap-slaying of 6-year-old Mona Rae Mynard following his arrest Saturday on charges of molesting two girls who were playmates of the dead child.

Joseph Walton Holmes was arraigned Sunday on two charges of contributing to the delinquency of minors. The case was continued until Tuesday to give him a chance to consult an attorney. He was being held under \$10,000 bail.

"The fact that he lived practically next door to the Mynard girl and that these are the same types of cases makes us want to investigate further," Multnomah County Dist. Atty. George Van Housen said today. Otherwise, he would offer no comments on the case.

The Mynard girl's body was found Dec. 31, two days after she disappeared while on an errand for her mother.

Holmes was one of many persons questioned by Multnomah County sheriff's deputies shortly after the slaying. He was arrested Saturday by Clackamas County Detective Robert Wampler near Oregon City on a secret indictment which charged him with molesting a 7-year-old girl and a 10-year-old girl.

Weather Roundup

April came to Oregon today with chilly temperatures but an immediate flood threat was gone and the weather man promised sunshine before more heavy rain comes.

Bend recorded a low of 15 above early this morning and Redmond had 17. Readings in the 20's were common elsewhere in Eastern Oregon and Astoria on the coast had a 31 while Medford reported 30.

The weather bureau's river forecast center in Portland said all streams of northwest Oregon were falling except the lower Tualatin which was expected to crest this afternoon.

The Willamette was down nearly a foot at Corvallis after reaching 13.7 Sunday. Flood stage there is 20 feet.

Forecasts called for partly cloudy skies Tuesday with sunshine and temperatures near 60. Chilly readings were predicted again tonight, though.

More rain is coming later in the week.

Hills in the Portland area were whitened by hail late Sunday.

Also near Portland a 40-yard split appeared in Barbur Boulevard. Heavy rains last week were blamed.

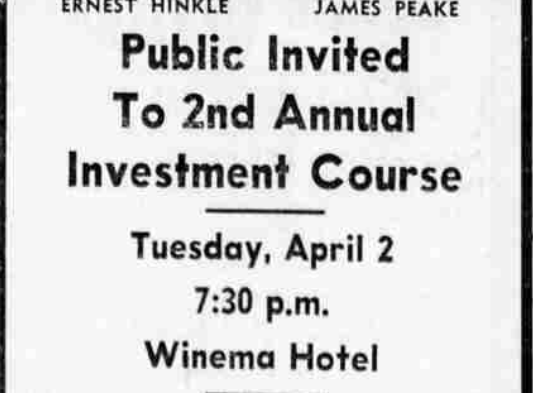
